## TRAIL DUST Vets Draw For Acreage In Coop Ranch Project

Opportunity is often reached through solid masonry walls where no entrance was intended, and found sulking in the lap of necessity. Sometimes it is stirred on failure and deep spasms of heartbreak, or produces a fever of tragic impulses which frequently lead to the brink of oblivion. The man who decides to wait out opportunity's knock had best obtain a wheel chair for the final days of his vigil.

One of the most original ranching plans ever conceived in this ranch country has passed the talking stage and taken shape here. Approximately 30 veterans have agreed to buy a 9-section ranch about ten miles west of Channing, on Rita Blanca creek.

During a meeting held in the courthouse Monday evening the proposed purchasers drew lots for the various quarter-sections. One section on which is located a valuable ranch house (near the center of the spread) was kept out of the drawing and will be purchased by the group outright and without the aid of a veteran's loan. The ranch is watered by the living water of Rita Blanca creek.

The one momentous "if" is the approval of the Texas Veteran's Commission loan. According to the plan each veteran would receive title to 160 acres of ranch land but the tract would be kept as one unit for leasing purposes.

The deal, if culminated according to plans, will make it possible for each veteran to become the owner of a quarter-section of land which "will pay for itself in the next 40 years." Each veteran will be required to pay cash in the neighborhood of \$330 one member of the group declared. The land is priced about \$32 per acre. Present lease of grass, and oil lease will make the annual payments. One-half of the mineral rights will go to the new owners.

## Wason Named Commander

Billy Wason was elected Commander of the Motley County Veterans of Foreign Wars post at a meeting Tuesday evening, to assume leadership for the organization's new fiscal year.

Wason, a native son of Matador, is a partner in the grocery business with Charlie Meador, and has been active in VFW work since the post was formed here shortly after the close of World War II.

He said yesterday that while he promises no miracles during his administration, he will devote his most sincere efforts in maintaining VFW's policy of service to veterans and their families, and assuming community responsibility.

The veteran's organization has a substantial and active membership and is supported in its projects by an enterprising Ladies Auxiliary.

## City Host To Lions Zone Meet

Officials from five Lions clubs, region four, zone two, met here Tuesday evening for the third and final conference of the civic organization's fiscal year. Clubs represented were Plainview, Roaring Springs, Silverton, Floydada and Matador, with Zone Chairman Fred W. Mercer of Silverton in charge of the meeting.

The group of 15 Lions met at Bob's Cook Shack for a steak dinner and later retired to the Fleming Post American Legion building for the meeting. Chairman Mercer said he had not received a single complaint from Lions International during the entire year because of faulty or delayed reports. He paid high tribute to the secretaries of the zone clubs for their efficient work, and also for the fine spirit of cooperation he had received while serving as zone chairman.

Most prominent Lion attending the zone meeting was Deputy Governor Jim Ed Waller of Plainview, who is a candidate for District Governor at the District 27-1 convention to be held in Amarillo, April 22-23-24.

Banker by Profession Lion Waller, who in private life is cashier of the Hale County State Bank, was born and reared in Plainview. He attended Wayland college and the University of Georgia, entered the armed services as a Marine flyer in 1942 and after serving four years (one year in the South Pacific) he was discharged in 1946. He was a captain in the Marines when released from the service.

### SOIL GROUP PLANS FOR STATE LEADER

O. F. Armstrong of the State Board of Soil Conservation will be in the area for four days beginning April 5th, and officials of the Upper Pease Soil Conservation District have completed plans for a series of meetings and addresses.

James E. Taylor, chairman, said interest in soil conservation has gained unusual momentum during the recent high winds and that he expects much valuable information to be gained through the visit of the state board member. "Many of our current water problems could be solved if the soil and water programs recommended by the soil conservation district were placed in operation on most of the land", Mr. Taylor declared.

Mr. Armstrong will speak at Northfield school at 11 a. m. and Cee Vee school at 2 p. m. on Monday, April 5; at Matador High school, 11 a. m. and Lions club at 12:30 p. m. Tuesday, April 6, and on the same day will meet with the local Upper Pease board at 2 p. m. and will confer with Motley County preachers at 3:30 p. m. He will be in Roaring Springs, Wednesday, April 7, and will speak at the high school at 10:30 a. m. and will meet with the Roaring Springs Lions club at 12 o'clock (noon) Last meeting of the series will be at Flomot, Friday, April 9, when he will speak at the high school at 11:15 a. m.

### Formby And Reeves Make Public Reply To Lions Letters

ROAD contracts totaling in the neighborhood of half a million dollars are being planned for Motley county, according to a letter received this week from Highway Commissioner Marshall Formby of Plainview. The letter is in reply to the approximately 60 copies of letters mailed last week by members of the Matador Lions Club, requesting Governor Allan Shivers to use his influence in helping allocate highway construction to relieve the drought emergency.

Original letters were mailed to Gov. Shivers and copies were mailed to Commissioner Formby and Rep. Elbert Reeves. Both Formby and Reeves have requested the Tribune to publish their replies to the mass-letter pleas. Both cite the impressive amount of highway construction and repairs already "in the works" for Motley county.

Commissioner Formby's letter is as follows: "Dear Douglas: I have 59 copies of letters which my friends in Motley county have written Governor Shivers, pointing out the need of some kind of a work program to aid in your present unemployment program.

"Many of the letters are from personal friends in your county and I appreciate their sending copies to me, however, there are so many letters it is impossible for me to answer them personally. I will appreciate the services of the Tribune in acknowledging receipt of the letters.

Understands Situation "No one understands the drought situation better than I do and I will certainly do everything in my power to help expedite the State Highway road work in Motley as well as other drought-stricken counties in West Texas.

### YOU CAN FIX IT



#### Basic Know-How

Basic know-how about such apparently simple matters as driving a nail and setting a screw can make things a lot easier for the handyman.

Always drive a nail on a slant when possible. It makes a much stronger bond than when driven straight. Screws will go in more easily if their threads are rubbed with soap. A screw that won't hold because its hole has become enlarged, can be given a firm bite by filling the hole with Plastic Wood.

Let the Plastic Wood harden several hours.

Countersinking nails and screws makes a neater job. Use finishing nails and countersink them with a nail set. Screws can be countersunk in holes, drilled about 3/16-inch deep, and slightly larger than the head of the screw. Cover nail and screw heads with Plastic Wood, filling holes a little over full. When Plastic Wood has hardened, sand smooth and flush with the board.

Staggering nails so that no two fall on the same line of grain lessens the chance of splitting the wood. To protect screws from rusting when used out-doors, dip them in a thick paste made by mixing powdered graphite with linseed

### Two Soil Agencies Will Cooperate In New Relationship

Administrators C. M. Ferguson and D. A. Williams of the Federal Extension Service and Soil Conservation Service, respectively, have released a joint statement dealing with the relationship of the two services. "We regard," they said, "this statement as a significant expression of the cooperative relationship between the two agencies."

Their statement follows: "The conservation and proper care and development of our soils is basic to the economic well-being of families now farming and ranching and those who are to follow. It is essential to the future of the Nation's food supply and to the continued expansion of efficient food and fiber production to meet our ever-growing population needs."

The reorganization of the Soil Conservation Service is designed to carry forward a more effective national program and to strengthen the work in each State. It does not change in any way the functions of the SCS in carrying out a national program of soil and water conservation primarily through soil conservation districts. The Soil Conservation Service and the Extension Service continue to have the responsibility for effective cooperation at county, State and national levels. Both services will look to the State experiment stations and to the Agricultural Research Service of the Department for improved technology through which to assist local people in handling their programs.

Both Ask Support  
The work of the Extension Service and the Soil Conservation Service will succeed only with the enthusiastic, whole-hearted support and efforts of farm and ranch people. Both require the continued development of well-informed leadership in soil conservation districts, farm organizations, planning committees, and other such groups.

The use of the soil and water resources must dovetail into a program to provide a base for sound farm management, cropping practices, livestock management, machinery requirements, building needs, and marketing opportunities, while at the same time conserving and improving those basic resources.

Best Interest Farmer, Rancher  
These objectives will be accomplished only through the closest possible kind of teamwork between the technical assistance of the Soil Conservation Service and Extension's teaching, through demonstration and other means of education, to encourage farmers to adopt farm practices consistent with the sound use of land and water resources. Such teamwork will result only from harmonious inter-agency relations. These relations do not occur by chance. They develop and come to full fruition

Kansas City, Mo., March 18—John C. Russell, Matador, Texas, today was named to membership in the American Hereford Association, the world's largest purebred registry organization, with headquarters in Kansas City, Missouri.

One hundred and twenty-nine Hereford breeders were placed

on the Association's official roster during February. The Association maintains active accounts for more than 70,000 breeders of registered Herefords over the nation.

The Hereford Association last year recorded a new world record of 560,794 purebred calves, an increase of 12,376 over the record established during the previous fiscal year. Hereford calves registered last year were more than two and a half times the total registrations of other major beef breeds combined.

## Retarded — Or Just Hard of Hearing?



Children with hearing trouble repeat their grades four times as often as children with normal hearing.

At least two-million children in the United States have impaired hearing and the hearing of more than 20-million others in the 5 to 17 age bracket is receiving virtually no attention, according to the American Hearing Aid Association. (There are about 34,775,000 school-age children in the U. S. Fewer than 300 cities and only 21 states require periodic hearing tests in public schools.)

Most parents whose children suffer a slight loss of hearing don't discover it in time to prevent a greater and more serious loss. Parents should watch for such tell-tale signs of hearing loss as inattentiveness, awkward listening posture, excessive fatigue, slowness in learning, shyness in playing with other children and voice peculiarities.

From 50 to 60 percent of all hearing impairments among children can be corrected if discovered early enough.

"We will let a small contract for some work in the April letting, and we are fast completing plans for two or three other projects in Motley county. A reworking and re-widening of bridges on US 70 in your county is going to cost \$230,000 and we hope to let this contract this spring.

"We also plan to spend about \$209,000 on a farm-to-market road in the northwest (Flomot-White Star area). Other plans are being made for a road that comes south from Northfield towards Matador. We are working on all plans as rapidly as possible.

"In letting these contracts we will ask the contractors to give preference to the hiring of local labor whenever possible. So, to my friends in Motley county, I want to again express my appreciation for your letters, and assure you that as a member of the State Highway Commission, I will do everything in my power to serve your best interests.

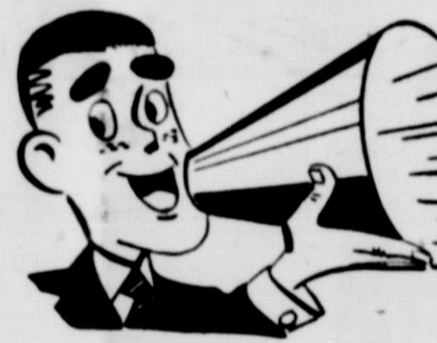
