OLD SETTLERS MAKE PLANS FOR 30th REUNION

'Cotton John' Is Scheduled

PIONEERS from most of the cattle-raising area of West Texas will meet at Roaring Springs Pioneer Park next week to celebrate the 30th annual meeting of Old Settlers of Motley and Dickens counties.

A meeting of directors held at Pioneer pavilion Saturday outlined the two-day program and completed plans for most of the constantly-increasing attractions. A carnival is scheduled to open on the grounds Monday and a dance has been scheduled for Wednesday evening (August 26), according to an announcement made yesterday by B. C. Cox, manager of the dance program. He said a Children's orchestra had been engaged for the Wednesday evening (two-day) dance.

Including the pre-reunion dance, three "young people" dances will be held. Two regular "old timers" dances will be held under the pavilion.

Outstanding speaker scheduled for the Thursday (first day) program is J. Garland "Cotton John" Smith, prominent Amarillo radio station KGNC farm and ranch announcer. He will speak Thursday at 1:30 p. m.

Equal pioneer parade (no motor vehicles) will be held on the streets of Roaring Springs beginning at 10 o'clock. Memorial services for pioneers of the two counties will be held at 11 AM. Ladies of Roaring Springs will present a program at 2:30 Thursday.

Plans have been made to offer a prize for the oldest dress worn to the reunion.

Local Man Named To High Post

John A. Hamilton, native son of Matador, last week was recommended to fill a vacancy which exists in the Dallas US district attorney's office.

Heard L. Floore, incoming district attorney for the Northern District of Texas, said that Frank Potter, outgoing district attorney whose resignation became effective Saturday, had concurred in the recommendation.

The recommendation was sent to Atty. Gen. Herbert Brownell, US attorney general, for final action, according to the Dallas Times Herald.

The newspaper said that a request for Mr. Hamilton's name to be acted on as quickly as possible accompanied the recommendation.

John Hamilton, 44, is the son of pioneer attorney G. E. Hamilton of Matador. He is a former SMU student, served as district attorney for the State 110th Judicial District from 1937 to 1943 when he entered the Navy.

He attended Texas Tech from 1926 to 1929, SMU from 1929 to 1930 and the University of Texas from 1931 to 1934 where he obtained his law degree. While at UT he was awarded the school's highest legal scholastic honor by being named a chancellor.

Heavy Rainfall Sweeps County

Last traces of the great drought of 1953 were erased from the farms and ranges of Motley county this week when a series of heavy rains swept the region.

Official rainfall here in Matador for Monday and Tuesday totaled 2.11 inches while other sections report much heavier precipitation. Some sections of the Floomot community report over five inches and an area east and northeast of Matador received over three inches according to reports.

Row crops that had started to twist and burn from the excessive heat are growing rapidly and farmers believe the county may produce one of the largest feed crops in its entire history.

Floomot community which has most of the cotton is assured good crops. From Matador south the cotton is very scarce but young feed is rapidly replacing the long-barren fields.

Range conditions have also greatly improved since the fine rainfall which filled many earthen tanks and brought new life to the important grass.

Some farmers have estimated that in the event of late frost the grain crops will bring the county's economy a long way back in the direction of normalcy.



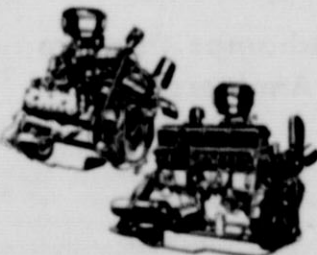


