Community To Pool Needy Family Gifts

Christmas Council Is Organized Here

CHRISTMAS engulfed this community Monday night, bringing together the churches, civic clubs and service men's organizations in a united effort to spread gifts to the needy in the most effective manner.

The spirit of giving and the generous heart of the community were reflected in plans to organize the strength of the community and pool the resources available for charity purposes. The mass meeting was held in the American Legion building and every organization in Matador, including the Negro churches and schools, was represented.

J. E. Edwards served as temporary chairman and Mrs. Glenn Woodruff as secretary, during the discussion period, in which a proposal was adopted to form a community body and name a committee to serve as a central screening group. Mrs. Woodruff was then unanimously elected as chairman of the committee, with Mr. Edwards and Randall Whitworth as secretary members, and Community Christmas Council selected as a name for the organization.

Committee To Make Survey
Duties of the steering committee will be to make a survey of needy families, after names are submitted to them, and then work with leaders of the churches and various clubs and other organizations in planning proper distribution of donations, which may be in the nature of money, food, clothing or other gifts, made by individuals or the clubs and churches.

The several church bodies as desiring to take charge of the churches in a denominational segregation, insofar as they were able, with the overflow being absorbed by the other organizations and the churches having only a few families on their lists, but able to care for more.

Rev. Walter O'Kelly, pastor of First Methodist Church, declared his congregation had planned a "White Christmas" offering for Sunday night, when gifts of food will be brought to the church to be distributed to needy families. In the meeting Monday night, he expressed willingness that these gifts be turned over to the Community Christmas Council for distribution.

To Avoid Duplication
Rev. Berry Watson, pastor of Landmark Baptist Church, declared that his church had already taken action toward helping needy families by providing them transportation to his church for a Christmas offering, and Mrs. Roy Smith, president of the V. F. W. Auxiliary stated that her organization had already contributed toys, which they would divide with the community organization.

Principal aim of the organization is to avoid duplication of gift baskets to needy families, which has occurred in previous years, when the organizations and churches acted as separate agencies for spreading Christmas cheer.

Motley Pioneer Dies In Georgia

P. C. Pederson, 80, of Clifton, Texas, pioneer of Motley County died last Monday in the home of a daughter, Mrs. Y. A. Oliver in Thomaston, Ga. Friends here learned this week. Funeral services were set for Thursday afternoon in Clifton, with burial in the Clifton cemetery.

A son, Hugh Pederson, of 3608 Van Buren, Amarillo, was recovering from major surgery at his home and was unable to attend the funeral.

Also surviving is another son, Rufus J. Pederson of Richland, Wash., and two other daughters, Mrs. R. M. Wheeler of Big Spring, and Miss Lora Pederson of Austin.

Of Swedish descent, Mr. Pederson was born March 2, 1872 in Bosque county, near Clifton and came as a young man to Motley county. During the late 90's he operated a blacksmith shop which was located where the Modern Cleaners plant now stands. He served for a number of years as Superintendent of the Methodist Sunday School. His wife was a Motley County girl, one of nine daughters in the Anderson family living at Dutchman creek.

The Pedersons left here in 1916, moving to Say, Okla., where they lived for a number of years. Mr. Pederson was accompanied back here on a visit in November, 1950, by his son, Hugh of Amarillo, Mrs. Wheeler and Miss Lora Pederson, and attended Homecoming at the Methodist Church.

To Employ More Hello Girls

Two additional towns, Turkey and Quitaque, will receive toll service out of Matador within the next two weeks, it was announced here Monday by G. D. Shelley, of Lubbock, district manager for the General Telephone Company.

A crew of five men is now engaged in installing four new switchboards in the First State bank building and additional lines to Turkey and Quitaque are in the process of being completed. The two towns will receive dial telephones and the exchange offices will be discontinued.

Mrs. Allie Cox, chief operator and cashier for the telephone company here said the two towns will mean approximately 500 more phones to service toll charges. She declared that additional operators would be employed here to augment the personnel of nine. The new boards are known as the common battery type. Two will be used for local service and two will be used for long distance service.

Matador's strategic location motivated the company's decision to place the toll center and master office here. Mrs. Cox declared. In addition to the new lines to Quitaque and Turkey, other new lines are being completed to Lubbock, Falls and Quanah.

Company officials expected the installations to be completed and the new services to start about January 1st.

Official Count Released On Vote

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12—The official vote for president on Nov. 4 was a record-smashing 61,547,861.

General Eisenhower's winning popular vote total was 33,275,449. Governor Stevenson, the loser, got 27,311,316. Other parties polled 308,996.

Eisenhower's plurality was 6,616,233.

The total for president was 11,727,549 more than the previous record of 49,820,312 in 1940. It exceeded the 1948 vote of 48,688,289 by 12,859,572.

The figures were disclosed Friday in an Associated Press tabulation of the final official findings.

Hospital Patients To Have Real Christmas

Patients at the Wichita Falls State Hospital, 2,725 too often forgotten men and women who come from homes in Sixty Two North Texas Counties, have been promised a real Christmas this year.

The promise has come from the social service department of the Woman's Forum in Wichita Falls... a promise built on the hope that men, women and children with a dime or a dollar to spare will buy a small gift so that each patient, young and old, will have a remembrance from a friend on Christmas morning.

The project was announced by Mrs. Nell Hutcheson, chairman of the Forum department, who said that members of several clubs and Sunday School classes in Wichita Falls have already reported that they are sending gift to the hospital instead of exchanging with each other.

Gifts May Be Mailed
Friends of the hospital outside of Wichita Falls can mail gifts either to the Forum or to the hospital—Box 350, Wichita Falls—Mrs. Hutcheson said. If the gift is wrapped, it should be marked "for a man" or "for a woman." Unwrapped parcels are welcome, however.

In addition to the individual gifts the department is hoping to provide one big and badly needed present for the women patients—equipment for an auxiliary beauty parlor.

Is Vital Department
The hospital, with 1,454 women patients has only a very small show where seven employees battle a tide of 80 patients a day with only six hair dryers and one permanent wave machine. One of the most vital departments in the institution, the shop is equipped to give only passing attention to less than half the patients.

A slovenly, badly upset woman who has lost all interest in herself and her surroundings can often be jarred out of her despair by a simple process of making her conscious of her appearance. The patient allowed to become sloppy in appearance usually loses interest in other things.
Money donated to the beauty shop fund will go to set up another on one of the hospital wards, Mrs. Hutcheson said, in order to provide facilities for not only more women but to give operators time to give each patient more than brisk, assembly-line attention. Donations

There's something about a turkey that makes him a welcome guest in the house when the family gathers for Christmas. He is a regal bird alive, of course, and he's one that loses little grandeur when he has been cooked a golden brown and served astride the biggest platter in the house. And when he is cornbread stuffed, he's fit for even Santa Claus.

ROAST TURKEY WITH CORN BREAD STUFFING
1 16-lb. turkey
2 teaspoons salt
1 cup chopped onion

2 cups bacon fat or margarine
4 1/2 quarts broken corn bread (or part bread)
4 teaspoons salt
2 teaspoons poultry seasoning
1/4 teaspoon pepper
3 eggs, well beaten

Rub inside of oven-ready turkey with the 2 teaspoons salt. Cook onion in half of the bacon fat or margarine until soft, but not browned. Melt remaining fat and add with onion to corn bread. Mix well. Add seasoning and egg and stuff into turkey. Skewer, truss, rub skin with soft margarine or shortening, and place on a rack in an open roasting pan. Cover with clean white cloth moistened with melted margarine or shortening. Roast at a low temperature (300° F.) for 4 to 4 1/2 hours, basting as needed.

Bishop Martin heads united churchmen who meet biennially as a council. Interim matters are handled by a 85-member General Board, representing the several groups. The Denver session is the first meeting of the 500 official delegates and about 1,500 other church leaders since the formal organization in 1950. It is the most representative group in U. S. Christianity.

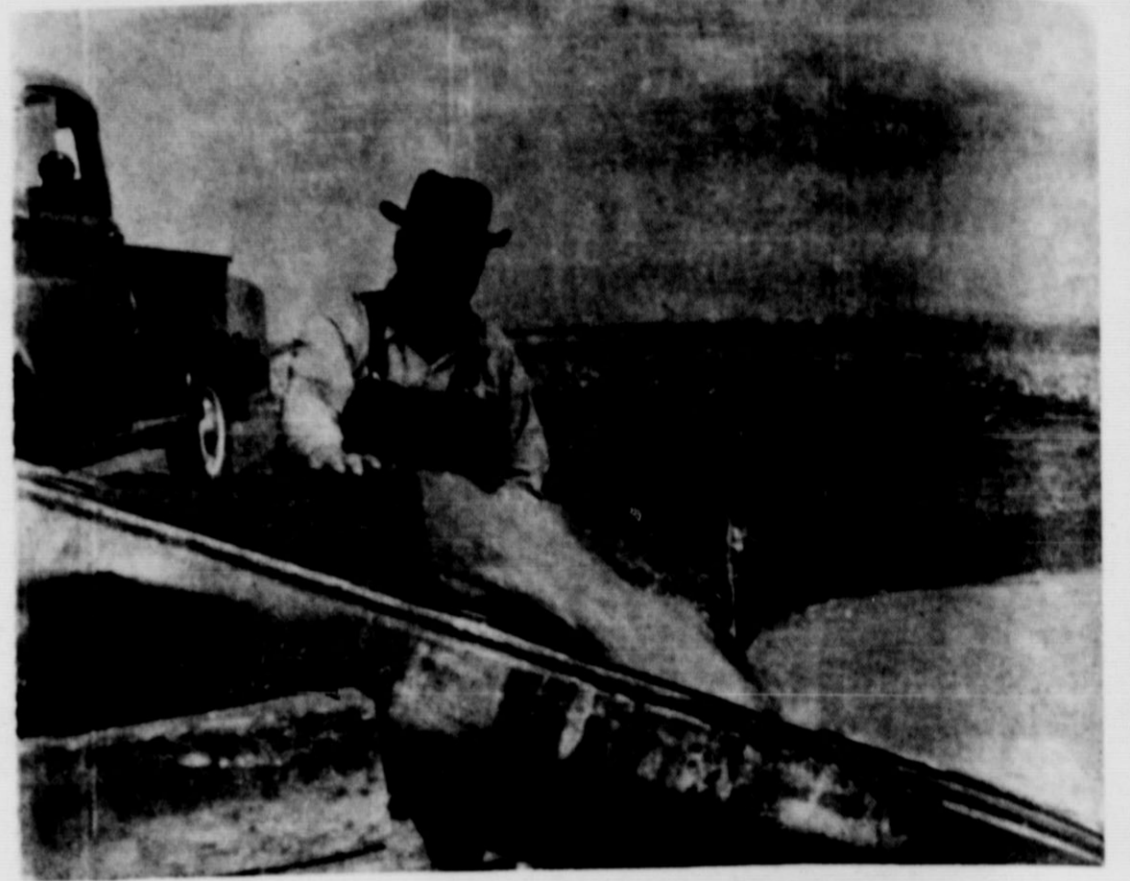

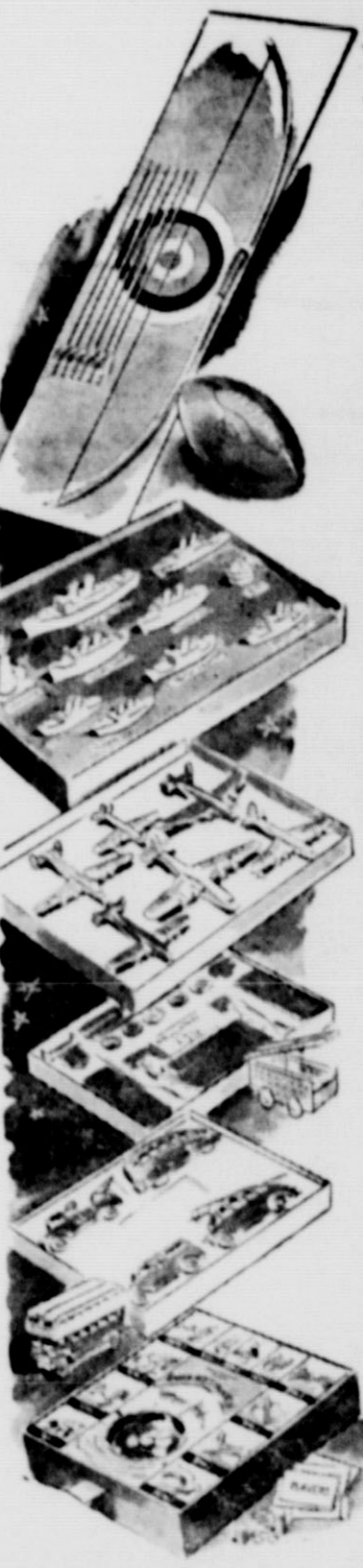
Carbon Monoxide Is Silent Enemy

AUSTIN, Texas — "You can't see it, you can't smell it, you can't taste it and yet it can kill you," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, referring to carbon monoxide. A silent enemy, it strikes its victims in closed rooms, garages and cars where wood, coal, gasoline, or natural gas is burning.

Some victims of this silent killer never knew their life was in danger. As others died, they may have realized that the killer was at hand, but were helpless to do anything about it. They were so benumbed that they could not get out into the fresh air; they couldn't walk or even stand up. Those who escape death, once this silent killer permeates a closed room, garage or automobile, are rescued by someone who discovers their plight.

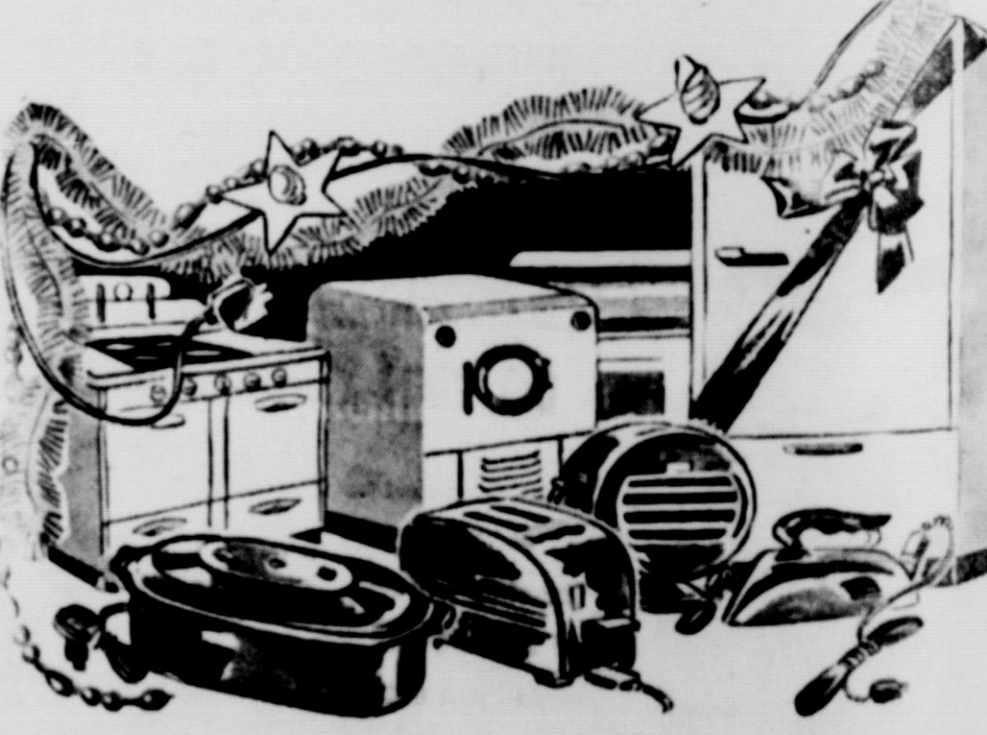
Carbon monoxide is given off when wood, coal, gasoline or natural gas is burning, but not all the gas is burned. Its danger is greatest in cold weather because people tend to close their houses and cars so tight that no fresh air can circulate. When this happens, carbon monoxide accumulates to a dangerous concentration. It kills because it prevents the victim from getting enough oxygen.

To help prevent such deaths all stoves should be vented, keep heated rooms ventilated, do not leave gas heaters burning while you and your family are asleep, do not entirely close

Rain and Sleet Sweep Across The Panhandle

A Northwestern swept into the Texas Panhandle early today, bringing rain which later changed into snow, in its wake. The moisture was welcomed by stockmen and farmers, altho the cold weather will affect livestock, especially the sleet.

Highway traffic on US 70 slowed its pace as the rain began freezing in the early afternoon. Radio reports said a rash of accidents had been reported as result of the storm.

No official reading was obtained here but some rain

gauges registered one half inch precipitation in the afternoon, about the time the rain began freezing. It is probable that in the neighborhood of three-fourths-inch had fallen here at sundown (Thursday).

Ice On Phone Lines

Trees, wires and projecting objects were quickly coated in ice after the rain began to freeze. Reports from the telephone company said extreme danger existed to service if the freezing continues through the night.

Power lines were also burdened with ice but no reports of impairment of service had been reported at an early hour.

Weathermen said the moisture would continue through Friday and that all sections of the state would receive rain. In some areas as much as two inches of moisture had been registered.

The rainfall is declared to have relieved the drought over a wide area of the state.

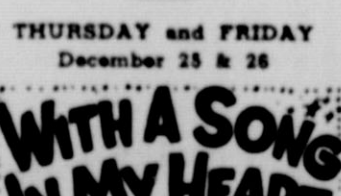
