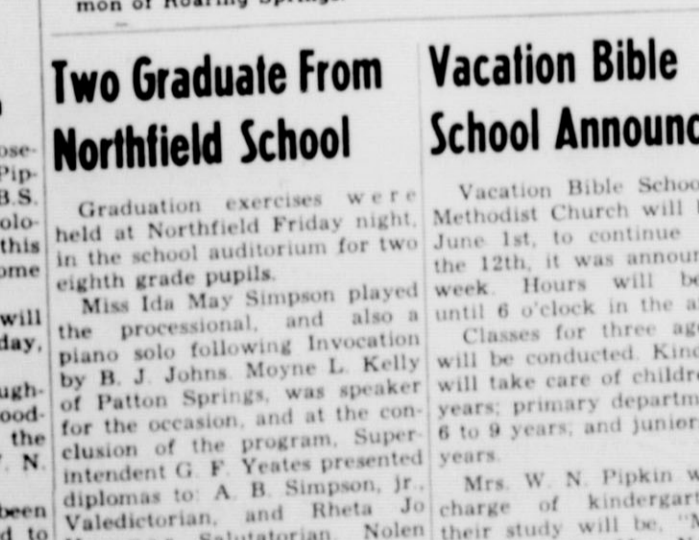

### Precipitation Here Measures .75-Inch

GENTLE RAINS broke into the dismal West Texas weather picture Friday and Saturday, refreshing the outlook and restoring faith in the hearts of farmers, ranchers and businessmen. The rainfall which left a registered .75-inch here (many rain gauges reported more), extended over a large part of the Panhandle, but except in isolated areas, the amount of moisture received was considered light.

Altho the rain was extremely welcome, it has not broken the drought in Motley and adjoining counties. Four or five inches of "soaking rains" will be required to bring the soil's moisture content up to normal, farmers declared.

The rains were lighter south of Matador and Roaring Springs reported less than one-half inch, and reports from the Dickens and Spur areas also indicate lighter precipitation. On the other hand much heavier rains fell north of Matador and some reports said some parts of Flomot received 1 1/2 inches and more. One report reaching the Tribune Tuesday said it was still "too wet to plow" in some Flomot fields.

### Planting Time At Hand

Farmers say ample time still remains in which to receive the needed rainfall but the situation is uncomfortable and is being reflected in business. May is usually considered a "rainy month" and two-thirds of it has passed without sufficient moisture falling to bring the year's average to normal. It is cotton-planting time and the county's economy is hanging in the balance of favorable rains within the next few weeks.

### Strange X-Disease Danger May Lurk In Old Lube Oils

Farmers and ranchers are warned to use extreme care in discarding old lubrication oils beyond the reach of cattle. Experts are convinced old oils of certain types cause the mysterious x-disease which last year destroyed many head of valuable cattle. A detergent used in the oils caused the disease and a minute amount proves fatal.

The detergent has been discarded by all but one major oil company it was declared, and most present lubricating oils are free of danger. Old oils in automobiles or tractors, or kept in storage, may contain the fatal detergent.

Old oil should be burned as soon as it is discarded or buried, if more convenient it should be kept entirely from areas where cattle may have access.

**World of Joseph Reveals**

**WORLD'S FIRST FOOD ADMINISTRATOR  
LED BY GOD, GRADUATES ARE TOLD**

The world's first "Food Administrator" was a God-fearing, young man who became a leader because he sought the source of greatness in his life—the leadership of God.

The life story of Joseph, as told Sunday night by Rev. Harris, pastor of the First Church of Whiteflat, disclosed this pattern for success in the High School graduates' Baccalaureate address to the High School graduates in the First Baptist Church.

Reading from Genesis 39:1-6, Harris used as his text, "LORD was with Joseph," and contrasted his life with that of his eleven brothers. "The difference in their lives was God," he pointed out, listing seven reasons for a life of success as exemplified by Joseph: Godly inheritance, business fidelity, resistance to temptation, Divine favor, Providential circumstances, and a life honoring God.

The greatest thing that can happen in any life is to let God lead it, and to the very best of ability, try to follow His leadership. Rev. Harris asserted, "God is not going to lead you in the wrong direction, and you man will ever suffer for going right. Don't be afraid to set your goal high, then let God possess your future. You are thinking now of your future, but the future isn't dark, if you will let God light the way for you."

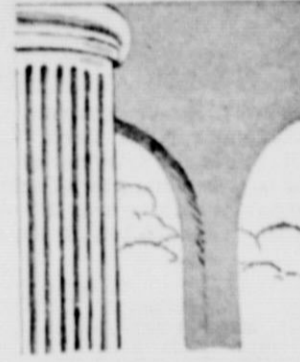

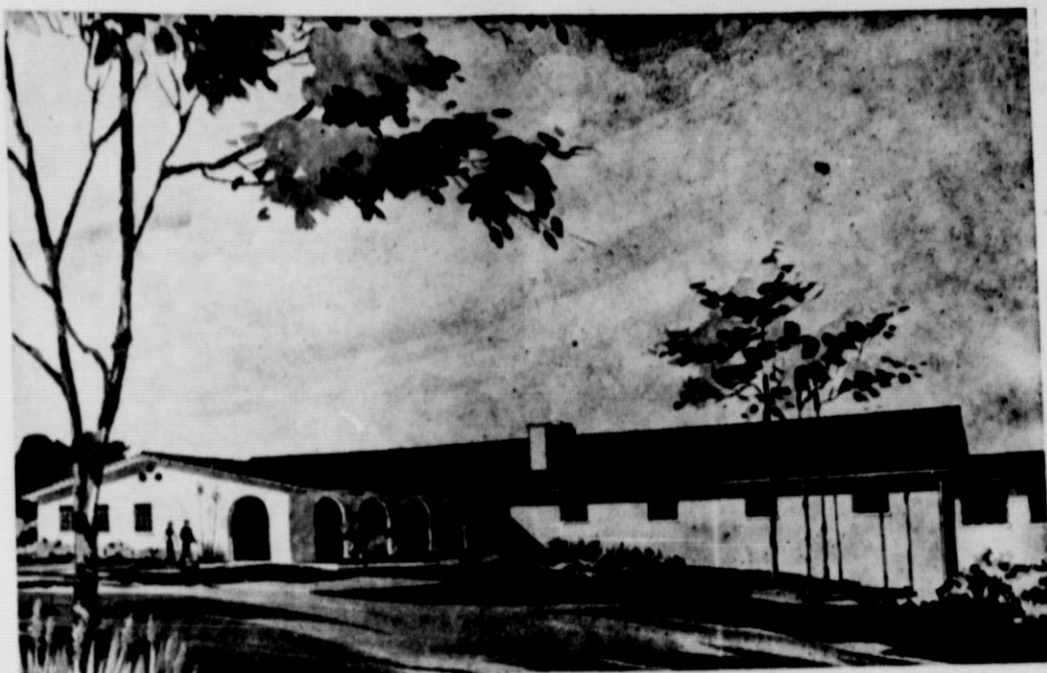

### "Go On Hoeing Your Garden" Flomot Class Told In Commencement By Judge Chapman

Graduates of Flomot High School, Thursday evening, May 14, heard a dynamic address by Hon. Alton B. Chapman, of Floydada, District Judge of the 110th Judicial district. "Go on hoeing your garden," he admonished his young listeners, their parents and friends, as he spoke to them on a subject of "Opportunity versus Security".

Judge Chapman was principal speaker at Commencement exercises for the graduates held in the First Methodist Church.

"While hoeing his garden, St. Francis of Assisi was asked what he would do if he were told he would die at sunset that day. He replied, 'I would go on hoeing my garden'... the same answer applies today, in the face of unsettled conditions—of possible atomic war," Judge Chapman asserted.

"So many young people are saying today that there is no use of their going to college, planning a career, having a baby, painting a picture, writing a song, or beginning a novel, since the atomic war is just around the corner. St. Francis put the answer to these troubled young minds in a simple metaphor: 'Go on hoeing your garden.' The

task is still here... the house to build, the book to write. If the future looks dark, so did it in 3000 B.C. and so did it the morning before the first Christmas. And however dark it seems to be, however dark it is, we shall meet life better if we have fulfilled the present to the best of our ability."

Judge Chapman reminded the youth that they have been brought up under the highest standard of living for America ever known to the world, and that they will make a mistake if they think they will accomplish anything worthwhile without work. "The person with an educated mind and an ignorant hand is only half-trained," he declared.

# District Judge Alton Chapman is Club Speaker

## Dangers of Alcohol and Narcotics to Youth are Stressed

graphic terms, speaking on a program on "Health" before members of El Progreso Study Club Thursday, May 14, Hon. Alton B. Chapman of Floydada, District Judge, stressed the effects of alcohol and narcotics on Texas youth. The meeting was in the home of Mrs. W. W. Clements, and leader Mrs. H. E. Campbell, Jr. Mrs. Chapman accompanied her husband here for the occasion and twenty-seven members attended.

A drug addict is a person who has developed a physical dependence upon a drug to the extent that he cannot voluntarily stop using it," Judge Chapman explained to his listeners after being presented by G. E. Hamilton of Matador.

"It is no respecter of age, sex, race or social position," he said, "and teenagers will willingly take the risks to get money with which to buy the stuff to satisfy their craving, once they have become addicts."

On the other hand, as heroin is as dope addiction, as addictive as it is becoming to the youth of our land, it still does offer the hazards of alcoholic beverages," he declared.

**Heroin is Legal**

"There are good reasons for the statement," he explained, "that traffic in narcotics is illegal, while traffic in alcoholic beverages is completely legal, except in a few places like the area around us here in West Texas, where even here it is completely legal to possess it for one's personal use."

"Then, the use of narcotics is considered harmful and distasteful in good society, and the effect in it must of necessity be resisted by criminals. But the use of alcoholic beverages as a beverage in the home and as a social drink is considered by many people in many, many of our better homes, to be not only harmless but the socially proper thing to do."

"Because of these ideas we have in the U. S. now an estimated 50 million social drinkers at least a million identified alcoholics, and possibly 2 or 3 million over-drinkers, who can be classified as borderline prospects for alcoholism."

**The Assassin of Youth**

Narcotics most commonly used in Texas youth and those which offer the greatest hazards to addiction include the "white powder" group, such as cocaine, made from coca leaves, and referred to by addicts as the "snow bird"; the morphine group and the opium group, among which is heroin; and toppling these is marijuana, which is becoming one of the narcotics

seed and is grown principally in Turkey. It is an opium derivative and cannot be legally imported into this country because the medical profession found that heroin has no special advantages over morphine and offers much greater addiction hazards. Therefore, heroin reaching the United States must be smuggled in by criminals. A pound of it is worth about \$300 in Turkey and that same pound, on the streets of American cities will sell for \$75,000 to \$100,000.

"For these profits men will risk prison, will steal, kill and commit all manner of crimes. Heroin is so terrible in its effects that physicians have hesitated even to talk about it or write about it, yet, suddenly it becomes easy for young people to purchase, especially near schools in large cities."

"How does a youngster become an addict? you ask. "Alcoholism and drug addiction have this in common: Both begin with the desire for a cheap thrill, a desire to be one of the crowd. Most alcoholics begin as social drinkers. Most youthful heroin addicts started with innocent appearing marijuana."

"At least 50,000 men, women and children are prisoners in this twilight world. It has no morals. There are no laws except the laws of greed and selfishness. It promises nothing except a fleeting pleasure and then the pain, misery and suffering of the demand... anyone may enter who wishes. Each year an alarming number of people either wander in or are lured into this other world. Many deliberately choose to go there."

"The average dope addict spends at least \$10 per day for narcotics and there is estimated to be from 50,000 to 300,000 users, at least 50,000 of whom are addicts. This means that the narcotic underworld, taking the minimum figure quoted, takes \$500,000 a day or \$182,000,000 per year in tribute to the U. S. alone."

"The time seems to have come when physicians, luncheon club ladies groups, churches, and all other worthwhile organizations must take cognizance of dangerous and illegal narcotics if we are to be successful in asking young people to use common sense when someone suggests to them or dares them to take a few puffs on a reefer."

**Signs of Addiction**

"Here are a few signs you may look for in the early stages of teenage addiction: 1. The youngster becomes sleepy, apathetic, secretive, cranky, and unreliable; 2. He loses interest in his school work, his hobbies, and sports; 3. He locks himself in the bathroom for long periods; 4. He takes articles of value from the home; 5. He wants to quit school and usually does; 6. His arms may be covered with the marks of a hypodermic needle."

"A few facts every man, woman and child should know about narcotics are: 1. Heroin addiction almost always begins with the use of marijuana and the use of heroin cannot be voluntarily stopped; 2. It takes a period of only 14 to 30 days in the use of heroin to make one an addict; 3. The use of heroin begins by sniffing the powder and after the first vomiting attack sniffing gives a "big bang";

4. This "big bang" lasts only a short time and the user then shifts to injections; 5. It is similarly difficult to stop the use of other narcotics smuggled into this country as contraband or that may be legally available but forbidden to be sold except by prescription; 6. Since it costs from \$10 a day up for heroin the boy turns to stealing from his family and then to more serious theft. The girl user turns to shoplifting or prostitution, or both."

**Teach Evils of Alcohol**

"We have certain known, undisputed facts concerning evils of alcohol, and those facts should be taught by the three basic foundations of our civilization... the home, the school and the church. Alcohol is a progressive nerve depressant, an irritant habit forming drug with anesthetic characteristics... alcoholism is the end result of drinking and is our fourth public health problem. About one drinker in fifty becomes an alcoholic and no person knows when he starts drinking if he will be one of the fifty who becomes an alcoholic."

"The alcoholic invariably involves himself and family in a series of crises which usually require the attention of social agencies and economic help from friends and organizations."

"Alcohol, as commonly used today, causes more disease, disability and death than any other cause of ill health which is wholly in the power of the individual to prevent."

"More than 9 billion dollars was spent on alcoholic beverages in America last year, while less than 5 billion was spent on all primary and secondary education."

"I do not claim to know all the answers to this problem, but I can tell you at least three things that will help to eliminate the evil: 1. You can refuse to patronize bootleggers. When there ceases to be profit in it, there will be no traffic in it; 2. You can teach scientifically to your children the evils of alcohol; 3. You can refuse to use it yourself. Observance of either one or all these rules will contribute something toward the evils of alcohol."
