## City Revokes Contract

The Matador City Council met last Thursday morning, June 13, at the City Hall Conference Room for their regular monthly meeting.

Those present were Mayor Gary Lancaster, Councilmen L. B. Campbell, Joe Smith, Lewis Bostick, John Briscoe and Doyle Rose. Also present were Bill Jameson, Gary McKay of Todd Engineering, Inc. of Abilene and Nell Berryman, City Secretary.

Mr. McKay presented blueprints of the water improvement system which the council has been working on for some time. Lancaster presented the one bid for the work which had been received for \$103,273.00. McKay informed the council that this was equivalent to approximately \$8.00 a foot and considered it a very good bid. Funds of \$164,000.00 for this project have been obtained through a grant.

Nell Berryman then informally requested that this line include her home which was not on the blueprints presented. Berryman continued in great detail about the condition of the water line going to her home and other specifics showing Mr. McKay on a city map.

After a discussion of time frames this process will take after the "red tape" is completed, the council unanimously accepted this bid from Rhode Pipe of Silverton.

One other bid came in by phone during this meeting but was much higher than the accepted one.

employee, and paying the monthly bills. Mrs. Berryman read the bills aloud to the councilmen and approval of paying approximately 21 statements was given by the council.

### City Dump

Bill Jameson reported that the dump had been cleaned recently but that another town, which is using Matador's dump, is not being neat about their usage. A representative of the city (Matador) will meet with the City Council of this neighboring Motley County town to discuss what arrangements can be made to avoid this in the future.

### Tax Collector's Contract Revoked

The Matador City Council was then informed that the tax collecting firm the city signed a contract with would like to be paid their 15% of collected back taxes which have been paid since the contract was signed.

Nell Berryman, secretary told the City Council, "The firm has not collected anything. I have collected them." (This was based on the fact that some of the tornado victims eligible for funds had delinquent taxes which had to be paid before they could receive money from the tornado grant and the tax firm will get 15% of these back taxes.)

Berryman was reminded by one councilman that the firm must have something to work with (delinquent tax roll) before they could collect. The contract the city signed with the firm read that they (the firm) will be provided the delinquent tax information.

Berryman informed the council that she herself did not have time to compile this information on a so-called "delinquent tax roll". Councilman Campbell reiterated the fact that a delinquent tax roll is needed.

The council discussed alternatives such as consolidation with all other taxing entities, a temporary employee, etc.

Berryman reminded the city council several times that "I told

you so" concerning the signing of the contract. She continued and pointedly stated, "All those firms are crooked."

Campbell again stated that the firm had not been furnished a delinquent tax roll and the city still needs to give them that.

Forrest Campbell of the Motley County Appraisal Office was asked to join the meeting and consider compiling the tax information for the City Council. Forrest Campbell told the council that he thought the arrangement with the firm was a waste of money. He circulated a map indicating all the lots in Matador having unknown owners and those having owners with unknown addresses (approximately 47 lots) and quoted figures on their approximate total value which was very small.

L. B. Campbell stated that there was still a need to free some of this property in that if another industry should approach the City Council that they would at least have something to offer them.

Forrest Campbell agreed to compile the tax roll for the city using Berryman's card file of delinquent taxes.

The conversation turned back to if the firm will be of benefit or not. Councilman Rose said, "I think we are giving them money. I can't see where they are going to do us any good. They aren't going to collect anything hard."

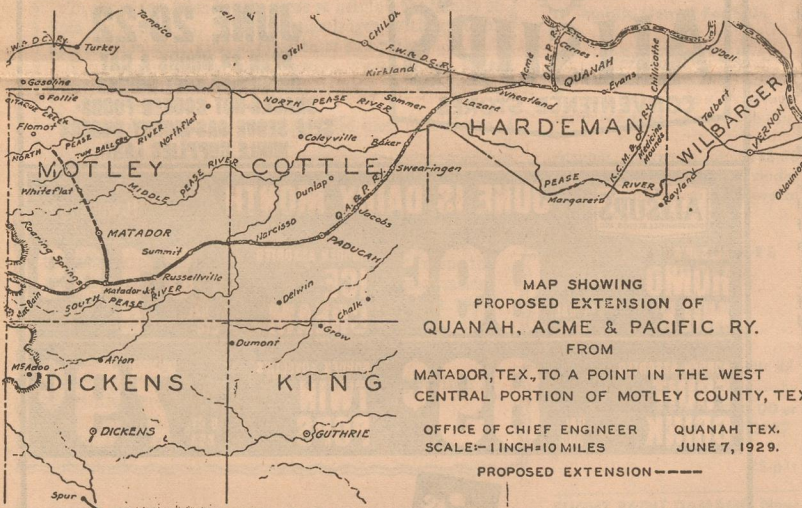
After a general consensus of all present a 4-part motion was made by Councilman Campbell:

- (1) pay the firm the 15% now due on what has been collected since the contract was signed,
- (2) Hire Forrest Campbell to make delinquent tax roll,
- (3) give 30 day notice to revoke tax contract
- (4) initiate procedure to combine city tax records with county and their entities. Councilman Bostick seconded the motion and it was passed unanimously.

### Meeting Adjourned

After a discussion of the Fire Department insurance coverage, cleaning budget increase for Fire Department, demolition of several structures in town and new garbage dumpsters, the meeting was adjourned.

## A Red Letter Day For Roaring Springs

Surrounded by his friends and neighbors in a circus-like atmosphere, the nine year old boy eagerly watched for the arrival of the train. From the newly constructed depot, the only permanent building so far, others looked to the east for any sign of the expected engine. In a nearby stocktank floated a three hundred pound block of ice in a diminishing sea of lemonade.

About 4 o'clock on June 19, 1913, Little Jack Luckett thrilled to the screaming of the train as it pulled into the proposed townsite of Roaring Springs, heralding its official opening. Aboard the special from Quanah were hopeful settlers, anxious to the first to bid on lots at the auction. And bid they did. Within the next five weeks, eager buyers purchased lots valued at \$24,000 from the Roaring Springs Townsite Company.

Little Jack, later he was to go by Hugh, recalls that "Rag Town," the tent city used by railroad construction workers during the building of the forty-mile railroad line from Quanah to MacBain Switch, was soon replaced by more substantial buildings. Among one of the first of the fifty buildings soon to be erected and open for business,

was a cotton gin. A well stocked lumberyard, bank building and church followed quickly.

The boy was greatly influenced by his father, Jack Luckett, Sr. whom he remembers, along with Sam Chalk and A.J. Cooper, as being instrumental in the development of early Roaring Springs. Mr. Luckett, a wagon boss on the Matadors, quit his job when he married school marm Leonora McClure in 1902. He promptly went into the mercantile business, eventually owning five different businesses and extensive property.

At one time there was a movement about to move the courthouse from Matador to Roaring Springs, with a lot reserved for that possibility. But then, as now, the influence of the northern and middle parts of the county combined to dash the ambitions of the southern community.

### Obtaining the Railway Was Costly

As part of the bonus and concessions asked for by the Quanah, Acme, and Pacific Railway for building the railway line, the Matador Land and Cattle Company, Ltd., agreed to pay about \$3,840 for each mile that crossed their property and give a three mile right-of-way from the center of the tracks, water privileges, land for depots

and sidings, and two (later increased to three) townsites.

The cattle company and the railway were to share equally in the proceeds from the townsite proceeds. The Matadors agreed to sell 60,000 acres of their range, valued at \$10 an acre, for 600,000 shares of preferred stock and 600,000 shares of common stock. The Q A & P received 600,000 shares of common stock.

Samuel Lazarus as promoter and investor asked that the ranch pay a lump sum of \$125,000 and enlarge the townsite acreage, while allowing Q A & P to lay rails rated not less than 60 lbs. By December of 1912 a compromise was reached with the cattle company paying the reduced amount of \$85,000. By 1916 over 9,812 acres were sold to homeseekers and farmers, with 27,500 acres sold in the peak year of 1917. The final total of 60,000 acres under contract to Lazarus was completed in 1923.

## County Commissioner Indicted By Grand Jury

The indictment, which is a public record, stated: "one (1) head of cattle under value of \$20,000 from owner, to-wit: the one who had a greater right to possession, thereof, James Dale Palmer, etc."

In an interview Tuesday at the Tribune office, Billy Hand made the following statement: "I shot a crippled calf that had been run over by an automobile to get it

out of its misery and rather than to waste the meat, I gave the calf to the work crew at Quail Pipe. I offered to pay the Matador Ranch \$500.00 for the calf but they filed charges on me for theft but I am not a cow thief."

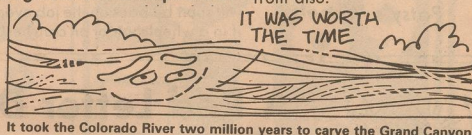

## County Agent's Corner

### Grasshopper Survey

A survey of the grasshopper hatch on rangeland was made in much of this area May 13-23, 1985. The results of that survey are in now. Very heavy numbers of grasshoppers were found in Motley, Childress, Cottle, Dickens, Hall, Briscoe, and King Counties.

The possibility of getting a spray program with USDA, APHIS, PP&Q support is limited, but not impossible. Shackelford and Throckmorton Counties had one in 1982. For a USDA supported control program there must be (1) 10,000 acres of rangeland committed to the program, (2) no more than 20%

crop acreage, and (3) the area must be relatively free of brush and mesquite. (Which may be hard to find.)

This third factor could possibly be overcome if some of the area has been sprayed, or the brush is not too thick.

There was some money allocated for rangeland grasshopper programs this year, and a program has been established in Briscoe and Swisher Counties.
