New Census Report Shows Count Down

THE QUALITY of the people in Motley County is high, but the census people take a dim view of quality when they start counting. There are 1,121 fewer of us high quality Motley County people than 10 years ago.

Here in Matador the nose count dropped from 1,325 in 1950 to 1,201. In Roaring Springs the loss was from 435 in 1950 to 396.

But the population loss in Motley County was no greater than other counties in the area. Childress County population dropped from 12,123 to 8,371. Hall County had 10,930 in 1950 as compared with 7,241 in 1960. Memphis dropped from 3,810 to 3,329. Turkey from 1,005 to 795. Cottle County dropped from 6,099 in 1950 to 4,194 in 1960, and the city of Paducah decreased from 2,952 in 1950 to 2,330. Collingsworth County dropped from 9,139 to 6,222.

With the advent of oil and the breaking up of the Matador Ranch, it is generally believed that the population of Motley County is on the increase. New homes are being built in both Matador and Roaring Springs and available houses are in short supply.

There is a shifting of population to the urban areas because of schools and other facilities. One rancher said this week: "It is easier to live in town and drive to the ranch, than to live on the ranch and drive the kids to school."

"Farming is Now America's Greatest Frontier," Says FFA Banquet Speaker

"Farming was once scorned, but the situation is now reversed," Teddy Carruth, principal speaker at the annual FFA banquet, declared Friday night. Carruth is vice president of the state organization of Future Farmers of America. He is a student at Tech, Lubbock, and one of the most dynamic speakers ever to address the organization.

"Farmers are honored among men," Carruth said, "and Future Farmers are trying to meet the needs of the nation as it enters its greatest population growth... it is evident that we will deplete our entire stock of surplus... the 385,000 boy members of FFA are learning to produce more food for their nation through the employment of advanced science."

"Farming is now America's greatest frontier," Carruth said, "it is a challenge to young leaders like these." He closed with this parting thought: "If what you did yesterday is still important, then you are not advancing." The speaker was introduced by Guy Campbell.

New Test Is Started

A NEW WILDCAT west of Roaring Springs was spudded in early this week, to try the area where E. E. Moss & sons of Lubbock had previously made two tries.

The new well is known as the No. 1 E. E. Moss & Sons and is being drilled by M. H. McKinney, Midland. It is 1 1/2 miles southwest of Roaring Springs townsite and 3 1/2 miles west of West Roaring Springs (Permo-Penn) Field in south central Motley County.

The new wildcat will be drilled to 4,700 feet. The exploration spots at 1,200 feet from north and east lines of Sec. 1, Block O-3, T. N. Graulee survey. It is about one-half mile south and west of the well drilled by E. E. Moss & Sons and on their lease. Before the last Moss well drilled in the area was abandoned, drillers struck an air pocket which exploded with tremendous force, resulting in some equipment damage but no injuries.

BULLETIN!

The Tribune was informed late yesterday from a private but entirely reliable source, that No. 2 J. A. Hamilton well in the West Roaring Springs Field promises the most important discovery since oil was first found in Motley County.

Tests show the production may be Wolfcamp sand, at about 300 feet shallower than nearby Moss well, to which it is an offset.

Nearest Wolfcamp oil is believed more than 100 miles away. Oil has been found at 3,856-66 feet, about 300 feet above the Permo-Penn production. The Perkins-Prothro discovery has shown 100 feet of oil on test, after perforation.

This means that benefits paid to retired persons, disabled persons, survivors of deceased workers, and other qualified individuals amounts to the largest single payroll in this county, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office.

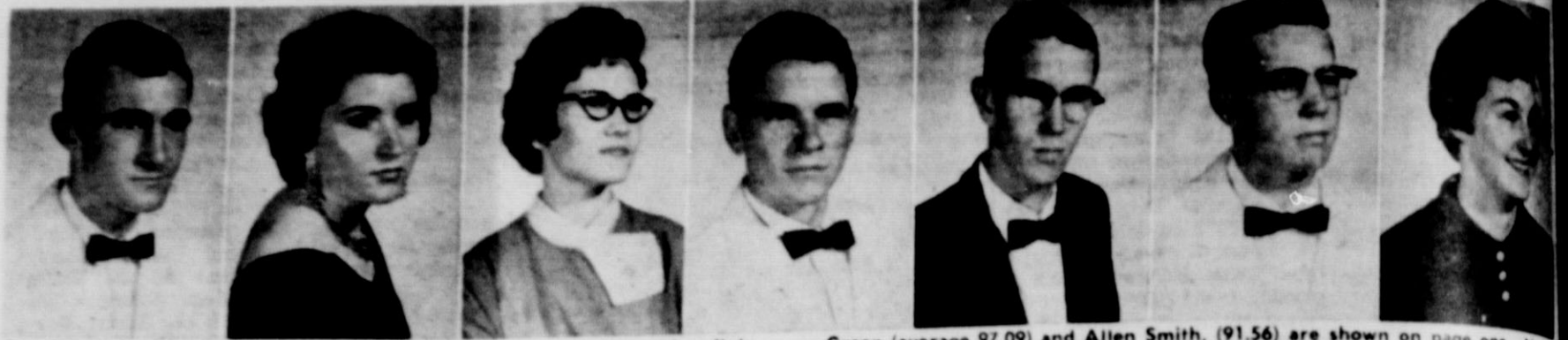

 The council also reminds the public that it is a violation of city ordinances to keep livestock within the city limits, if the animals create a nuisance to neighbors.
 The council said some complaints had been received and asked that the owners of animals keep premises clean and check with neighbors to determine if the livestock are infringing on a citizens right to a clean neighborhood.
Hire Dog Catcher
 The City has employed a dog catcher and all stray dogs with out tags will be impounded. The dogs will be kept three days and then destroyed. Owners may reclaim their dogs by paying \$1 per day, plus 50c per day for feed. Dogs must also be vaccinated if they have not recently received a rabies shot.
 An appeal is made to property owners to render taxes at the city hall, to save extra expense of assessing.

Sound Waves Used To Clean Watches

There is a big noise at Marvin Hunt's Jewelry at Vaughn Drug but it doesn't attract any attention, except perhaps a nosy news reporter or a few friends. They don't hear anything except a buzzing sound.

The noise is a new ultrasonic machine to clean watches through the use of sound waves. The new high frequency ultrasonic machine which operates at one million cycles per second, cleans a watch perfectly in three to four minutes.

The unit, which looks like a table model radio, has four stainless steel cups, partly filled with cleaning solution. The watches are placed in the cups in which they are cleaned and dried without removing many delicate parts.

The manufacturer of the machine claims that no other method, regardless of cost, will clean a watch more perfectly than the high-frequency sound waves.

Action in the cleaning pot resembles that of boiling liquid, but there is very little heat - only that generated by the machine.

Mr. Hunt said what actually happens is that the transducer mounted in the bottom of the pot, is emitting one million sound vibrations per second causing millions of tiny bubbles to start racing toward the top through a fine wire mesh basket containing the watch being cleaned.

Second Primary Ballots Ordered

Ballots for the 2nd Democratic primary election Saturday, June 4th, have been ordered by County Chairman Duke Lipscomb. Only two names will appear on the ballot. They are: Lloyd W. Davidson of Travis County and W. T. McDonald of Brazos County, run off candidates for the office of Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals.

With no county or district candidates, the vote is expected to be light. Lipscomb said the County Committee felt that in fairness to the two candidates, the election should be held.
