Veterans' Program Honors War Heroes

"Patriotism has progressed in reverse and self-sacrifice has reverted to self-indulgence. . . we have tasted the sweetness of victory with the ashes of defeat," was the pronouncement heard by a group of citizens on Armistice night, gathered at the American Legion building.

The "Veteran's Day" program was a county-wide observance to honor the heroes of all the nation's wars, with Fleming Post American Legion and the Legion Auxiliary as hosts.

Speaker for the occasion was Rev. Gene Hawkins, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Using his scriptural text the Lamentations of Jeremiah, 1:12, "is it nothing to you, all ye that pass by?" the speaker pointed out the parallel of the situation the prophet was experiencing, to existing conditions.

"In this age of great speed, we are rushing by rather than stopping to view the ravages of desolation, difficulty and disappointment," Rev. Hawkins declared. "We are interested in saving seconds, not minutes, yet we are letting eternity slip away from us."

"As another anniversary of Pearl Harbor approaches, is it nothing to you, all ye that pass by?" Those who speak given their lives, could they have, would say, "Serve God. . . hold high the torch of Faith and Freedom for which we fought."

"Our hearts in gratitude go out to those whose blood was spilled on battlefields. . . I point you to One whose blood was spilled on a cross. Thank God tonight that we can hold high the Cross of Christ, the hope of the world and of every man."

Subdue Turks 26-12 in Arctic Weather; Bi-District Game at Paducah Friday

OFFICIALLY the Turkey season did not open until Monday but the Matador Matadors managed for some pre-season hunting at Turkey Friday night. They bagged the Turkey Turks 26-12 to win the Dist. 9 "B" championship title and send themselves into the bi-district play for the fourth time in six years. The Matadors will meet the Knox City Greyhounds at Paducah Friday night. The game is called for 7:30.

The weather at Turkey last week was ideal for an Eskimo. An arctic front had brought the mercury down to 17 degrees, but a caravan of Matador fans witnessed the victory, most of them from the warm enclosure of automobiles.

The Matadors, paced by a steady ground game and alert defense, were in control of the game throughout, altho Turkey stayed in contention most of the time.

Dink Wilson, Guy Campbell, Ros Bearden and Jimmy Green scored for the Matadors. Wilson scored on a 65-yard scamper, Campbell on a 32-yard run, Bearden on a 6-yard smash and Green on a one-yard plunge.

The Matadors took the opening kickoff on their 31 and moved to the 38 in two plays. Quarterback Dink Wilson then went up the middle (behind the fine blocking of the Matador line) and broke loose, cut to the left and raced 62 yards for the first score. Fullback Guy Campbell blasted over for the extra points. The Matadors were out front 8-0.

Turkey retaliated at once. They marched 74 yards in 12 plays to score. Buchanan broke loose to score from 12 yards out. The Matadors stopped the extra points try and the score was 8-6.

The Matadors took the kickoff and moved for another score. They moved to the Turkey 32 in five plays. Wilson then faked right, returned to the left and handed off to Campbell.

Campbell broke through a big hole, cut to his left, and raced to the end zone on a 32-yard scoring play. The extra point try failed.

No Scoring In Second

Neither team scored in the second quarter. The Matadors held the Turks on downs, lost a fumble, then forced the Turks to punt. Score at the half was Matadors 14, Turks 6.

The Matadors cranked up a 48-yard march in the third quarter. Ros Bearden scored on a 6-yard run. The extra points try again failed. Score at the beginning of the fourth quarter was 20-6.

Recovering a Turks fumble on the Matador 39, the home team launched its final scoring attack. Nine plays later the Matadors were on the Turks 40, faced with a fourth and five situation.

Fullback Guy Campbell took a pitchout, raced to the left and fired a pass downfield. Left End Buddy Davis was hit by a Turkey defender and the ball bounced over his hands, to be grabbed by Bill Crenshaw, who went for an apparent touchdown. Turkey, however, was charged with pass interference, giving the Matadors the ball on the 8-yard line. Green carried twice, going to the one the first time and scoring the next time. Extra points try failed.

Still game, the Turk's Buchanan scored the final touchdown from eight yards out. The Turks' extra point try was a failure.

Admission to the game at Paducah Friday night will be 50c for students and \$1.50 for adults. Matador fans will be seated on the west side of the field.

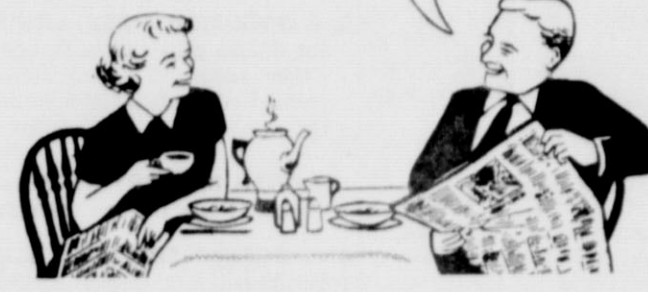

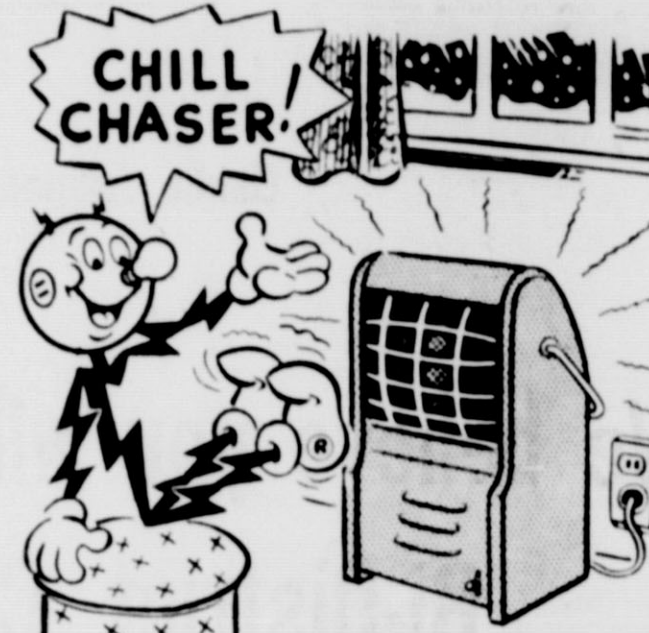
