A PIONEER circuit-rider pastor, Rev. R. L. (Uncle Bob) Jameson is dead. A man who saw this lusty country change from buffalo trails on the prairie to vapor trails in the sky, has closed his Bible and the book of his influential and beneficial life. The Methodist pastor who ministered to the spiritual needs of cowboys, freighters and the early settlers of this area was among the last of the pio-

neer circuit-riders. He died early Sunday in Malone-Hogan Hospital in Big Spring where he had been hospitalized since Dec. 7. 




