## Mavericks Win 3rd Successive Season

CHAMPIONS THREE YEARS in succession is the record rolled up by the Matador Mavericks when they defeated Quitaque (at Quitaque) Thursday night 32-22, and ended the 1959 season. It was the Mavericks' sixth straight win this season and their 18th straight win in the past three years. Coach J. E. Edwards and his charges have met other grade school teams in this district during the three seasons of contests.

In the game Thursday night fullback Robin Brown opened the scoring with a one-yard plunge over left guard. The Quitaque quarterback ran the following kickoff 70 yards for a touchdown and also scored the extra points.

David Rattan put the Mavericks back in the scoring business when he ran 40 yards around right end for a tally. Rattan passed to Brown for 42 yards and a touchdown in the second quarter. In the same quarter Brown went eight yards for another touchdown and scored the extra points, bringing the score to 26-8.

Quitaque controlled the ball during the entire third quarter, finally scoring on a four-yard run by the halfback. The quarterback passed to the right end for the extra points.

Rattan closed out the Mavericks' scoring with a five-yard run around left end in the fourth quarter.

Quitaque's quarterback scored the final touchdown of the game with an 11-yard run. The win was the Mavericks' second over Quitaque this year. In the first game the Mavericks won 22-16.

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## School Carnival Net over \$1,000

## COUNTY GINNING TOTAL NOW 5,225

Total ginning in Motley County yesterday at noon was 5225 bales from the 1959 crop, according to a survey made by County Agent Bill Palmeyer.

Two gins at Flomot had a total of 3,358 bales, the one gin in Matador 552 bales and one gin in Roaring Springs 1,266 bales. The Whiteflat gin had about 50 bales.

It is estimated that about one half of the crop has been harvested, varying according to the communities.

Rains last week that registered 7.1-inch in Matador brought the cotton gathering to a stop, but fair weather and wind yesterday dried out the fields to some extent.

Cold weather was forecast last night which again may slow down the harvesting.

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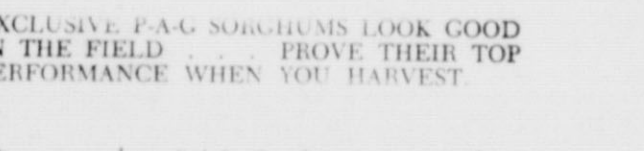
