## Livestock Ready for Saturday Exhibition

SOME OF THE FINEST LIVESTOCK grown in West Texas is going on display here Saturday at the annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show. The exhibition will be held at the school agriculture building.

A total of 26 steers is scheduled for exhibition, according to County Agent Bill Pallmeyer. He has been busy this week helping boys and girls groom their entries for the show. The lamb exhibit is scheduled for 14 entries and the hog division will have 31 animals on display.

Judging will start at 1 p. m. with the following order of classes, sows, light gilts, heavy gilts, champion female hog; light barrows, heavy barrows, champion barrow; light lambs, heavy lambs, champion lamb; light steers, heavy steers, champion steer.

An aluminum show stick will be presented to the best showman of swine, lambs and beef calves, by the Memphis Production Credit Association. Winners of this award in previous years are not eligible to receive a second show stick.

In event the grand champion barrow is from a registered sire and dam, the Hampshire Swine Registry Association will present the owner with a "Model Sow" and a one year subscription to the "Hampshire Herdsman."

If the grand champion barrow is from registered sire and dam of the Duroc breed, the United Duroc Association will present the owner with a cash prize of \$7.50, providing a picture is made of the animal.

Should the grand champion barrow be a Poland China from registered sire and dam, the Poland China Record Association will present the owner a solid bronze belt buckle.

### Ribbons and prizes to be awarded

Ribbons and prizes will be awarded all entries, with prize money collected by the Lions Clubs of Matador, Roaring Springs and Flomot. Animals will be entered by Matador FFA boys, Roaring Springs FFA boys and 4-H club members from all the county schools.

#### Rules Are Listed

- Rules of the show are as follows:
1. All animals must be owned and cared for by the individual member at least 90 days before show time.
  2. All calves must be taken off of cows at least 90 days before show time, as all are shown as dry lot calves.
  3. Only steer calves will be shown, and they must be dehorned and shown at halter.
  4. Owners will exhibit their animals unless they have more than one entry in a class, or are physically unable to show the animal.

5. No hogs weighing under 150 lbs. will be shown.

6. Lambs will be taken off of milk 90 days before show time.

7. Animals will be held in the show barn one hour after completion of the show, for the public to see. Failure to do so will result with the forfeiture of prize money.

8. Grand and reserve championship awards will be given only where there are entries in two or more classes competing for championship honors.

9. When trips are made for the sale of animals, only those who show and sell a calf, show and sell at least 3 swine and or lambs, are eligible to make the trip. When animals are sold locally or at a place different from the place of the trip, these exhibitors must share their lodging expenses.

10. Animals for sale must be loaded before prize money is awarded.

- Grand champion steer, \$25; reserve champion steer, \$15; 1st place light or heavy steer, if not grand or reserve champion, \$5; prime steers, \$12; choice steers, \$9; good steers, \$6; and commercial steers, \$3.
  - Grand champion barrow or female hog, \$3.50; first place animals, \$6; 2nd place animals, \$5; 3rd place animals, \$4; 4th place animals, \$3; 5th place, \$2; and all others, \$1.
  - If less than 5 animals are entered in a class, the bottom animal will receive 5th place money, (ie 3 in a class, 1st, \$4; 2nd, \$3; 3rd, \$2).
  - Grand champion lamb, \$6; reserve champion lamb, \$4; good (blue award) lambs, \$3; good (red award) lambs, \$2; and commercial (white award) lambs, \$1.

## Moss Well Flowing Oil



LAND DEEDED TO CHURCH — The land on which Mr. and Mrs. Ben Dillard, above, are standing has been deeded to the West Texas Assemblies of God Churches, with 135 churches in the district. The scenic 41-acre tract is located on the north bank of Tongue River about 10 miles east of Roaring Springs. The rich, almost level acreage is covered with heavy mesquite but the land will be cleared and a youth camp will be built on the site. A new road has been graded by the county to the location.

OIL is flowing from the E. E. Moss & Sons No. 2 Scott within one mile of the Roaring Springs city limits. The new well promises to be the best in the West Roaring Springs Field. A test this week produced 40 barrels of oil in 2 hours.

Storage tanks were expected yesterday into which the new well's production will flow. Production depth is said to be about 20 feet higher than previous production in the area.

Moss & Sons, Lubbock industrialists, had made three previous tests in the Roaring Springs area, one on the late Ollie Scott land where the new producer is located. E. E. Moss was formerly mayor of the city of Roaring Springs where he operated the Red Ball Gin. It was in Roaring Springs that he built the original Moss Lint Cleaner, now produced in the factory at Lubbock.

The rig has been moved from the Scott well to a new Perkins Prothro venture east of the Dutchman River bridge, to be known as the No. 1 Hamilton-Brooks.

The producer was permitted under a Rule 37 permit, and is located 600 feet from north and 100 feet from east lines of Sec. 27, Block J, H&GN survey on a 640-acre lease. It is about 1 1/2 miles southeast of the Roaring Springs business section.

### Lions Set For Show

ANY tendency toward a tense atmosphere is being caused by the calm before Friday night when the Lions present their annual show at the school auditorium. The time is 8 p. m. Except for a few "rough spots" the show is ready for the stage, according to directors Bill Seale and Forrest Campbell.

Sunday afternoon during the first rehearsal, the directors paced the floor like fathers in the waiting room of a maternity ward. They are calm now. The show will be different and entertaining. Every member in the Lions Club has been assigned to some duty in the production.

The audience can't lose. Actual value of the gifts donated for the candy sale now tops \$200 (not counting the \$30,000 in insurance given by two local agencies). On the other hand if every sack of the candy is sold, it will only bring in \$200. The prizes are worth more than the Lions can get for the candy.

#### Aerial Spraying Conditions Ideal

Ideal moisture conditions exist for aerial spraying of mesquite. It was announced last week by the local Soil Conservation Service office.

Recent rain and snow have increased the moisture supply of the soil to the best in years. This eliminates one of the limiting factors which determine if a good kill on mesquite is obtainable.

The main chemical used in controlling mesquite, according to technicians of the SCS, is 2,4,5-T which is a growth hormone. In short, 2,4,5-T causes a tree to grow faster than it can produce food. This is where moisture comes in. Mesquite trees need to have made 90 days of rapid growth prior to application of 2,4,5-T.

W. B. Wason, J. M. Hill and A. V. Stevens are a few of the men cooperating with the Upper Pease Soil Conservation District, who plan to spray mesquite this year.

Government cost-sharing assistance, amounting to 50% of cost, is available from the Agricultural Conservation Program of the Great Plains Conservation Program.

These programs are administered by the local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee and Soil Conservation Service offices.

Approximately 30,000 acres were sprayed by the combined programs last year and about the same amount is expected to be sprayed this year.
