Polling places in Motley county will be Moseley-Anderson Implement, Flomot; Matney Grocery, Whiteflat; Davis Grocery, Northfield; Hotel Cafe, Roaring Springs, and courthouse, Matador.

A reminder was given that wives of wheat farmers are also eligible to vote.

Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 6 p. m.

Official notices of farm allotments for the 1961 wheat crop were being mailed to farmers last week, according to Baldwin P. Davenport, chairman of the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

"Flying Object" Pierces Foot of Former Resident

C. W. Giesecke, former Motley County Judge and now Superintendent of Patton Springs School, was released early yesterday from Stanley Hospital, after being the victim of a freak accident.

An unseen "flying object" put into orbit by a power mower which he was operating, passed completely through his right foot. The "object" which was not found, left a neat hole in his shoe and sock where it went in and equally neat where it went out. X-Ray photographs showed the bone in one toe was fractured by the "object" as it passed through.

The accident occurred about 2 p. m. Saturday while he was mowing at the Patton Springs teaching. Mr. Giesecke suffered from loss of blood before receiving medical treatment. He will be forced to use crutches for several weeks.

Mr. Giesecke said he had just read a warning in last week's Tribune in County Agent Palmeyer's column, regarding the danger of power mowers.

He said he was four feet behind the mower when his foot was struck. His opinion is that the powerful blade of the mower cut a small piece from the machine, and hurled it with such terrific force that it went through his foot. He was unable to find the "object" that injured him.

Miss Sturdivant, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Sturdivant spent the past year teaching English to adult Colombians, on a fellowship from Centro-Colombo-Americano, an institution organized for that purpose.

The institution, which is self-supporting, seeks a better relationship between the Colombian and United States Government.

To supplement her salary, Miss Sturdivant did special tutoring. She has a B.A. degree in English from West Texas State College, Canyon.

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Brucellosis Meet Draws Large Crowd

Interest in brucellosis testing in Motley County drew a large crowd of livestock owners Friday night to attend a meeting at the courthouse.

Purpose of the meeting was to set a date for an organizational set-up and it was decided to test cattle the last part of October. Dr. James B. Henderson of the Texas Animal Health Commission explained the work his group will perform, and the duties of the local livestock owners in the testing program.

It was explained that 50 animals or 20% of a herd (whichever is the greater number) will be tested, but no steers or spayed heifers, or officially vaccinated heifers under 30 months of age will be included.

Dr. Henderson was accompanied by Dr. Cazier of the USDA. It was estimated that in the neighborhood of 150 farmers and ranchers attended the meeting.

More Rainfall Adds To Vexing Problem

MORE RAINS that hit here early yesterday afternoon brought the July total to almost 7 inches by 4 p. m. The additional moisture is producing a vexing problem for farmers, many of whom had been unable to get into

fields after last week's series of rains. The weeds will not wait and many fields are in need of cultivation.

Johnnie Jackson, City Water Superintendent, who maintains the U.S. rain gauge at the city wells, said he recorded 1.75 inches in a short period of time yesterday and showers were continuing. His records show 1.90 inches on July 5th, 1.25 inches on each of two days, July 6th and 7th and 77 inch on July 8. Yesterday's rainstorm brought the total for the month to 6.92 inches.

Harry H. Campbell, President of the First State Bank here and county pioneer said it is the "wettest July" he has ever known, but added, "people forget the weather and it is probable that the record has been duplicated."

A storm front moved out of the west Tuesday afternoon and brought torrential rains to much of the Plains. Hail in some areas also damaged crops. The front dissipated, however, about the edge of the Cap Rock. Yesterday's storm front moved in from the northwest. No reports of hail damage have been received from the county.

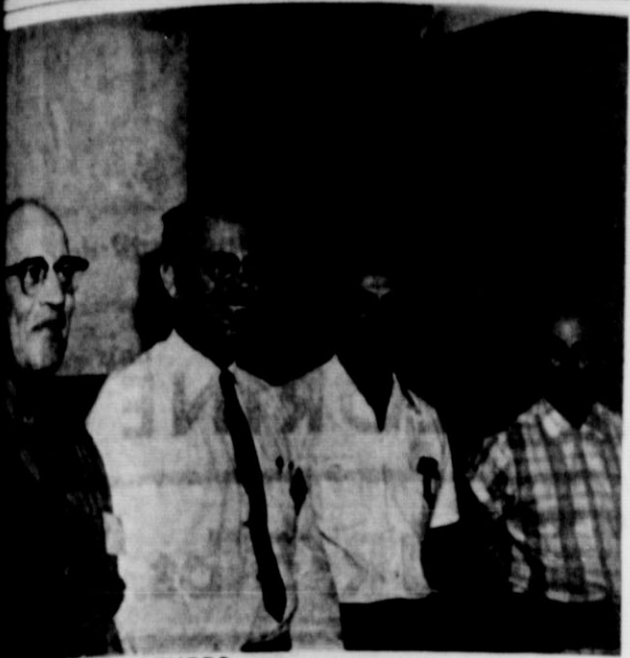
