

Shipping Changes Mail Service Aids Delivery

Postmaster General Arthur E. Welford has announced shipping improvements in mail transportation that will mean faster service for Matador, Lubbock and 123 other communities in the Amarillo and Lubbock metropolitan areas, covering over 37,000 square miles.

The program at a glance of postmasters in Amarillo, Geo. A. Gray, Regional Post Office Director, said that 40 people in the 40 Texas communities would benefit by better service.

The program is designed to bring infrequent delays in mail transportation and other shipping changes are being made in the Tribune circulation department to speed up delivery of papers outside of the immediate area. At present the subscriber stencils which names are printed on papers, or on single papers, are being regrouped according to instructions from the post office. The change will result in fewer confusions may result in all details are worked out and the changes are completed.

The distribution errors, which letters mailed at destination collection boxes or in the post office before 5:00 p.m. business day will be delivered in the first delivery at any point in the areas on the following business day.

Mr. Gray said, "I've proved the mail pattern is highly successful. Approximately 600,000 first-class letters originate on an average business day in post offices within two metropolitan areas. Approximately 66 per cent of mail is destined for points in the area. We have tested the newly changed operations and highly gratifying results. All Service Improved."

Mr. Gray pointed out that mail for

and from offices outside the area, all over the United States, will be expedited by the new arrangement. Accelerating the flow of mail in the metropolitan areas, it was explained, is part of the vast postal program which has next-day delivery between any two cities in the country as its long range objective. The revised mail pattern is based on the establishment of sectional centers to which mail from outlying offices is brought for consolidation, distribution and onward dispatch for connection with trunk line facilities, principally at Amarillo.

These sectional centers have been established at Amarillo, Childress, Lubbock and Plainview.

Post Offices near one of these sectional centers will send their mail to that point for processing. Fast non-stop service over the highway then will carry the mail to Amarillo and Lubbock for dispatch to destination. Special connections have been established via fast truck service north of Amarillo.

Some towns could not be brought within the plan because of the distance involved; however, slightly earlier mailing would assure the mailer the benefit of metropolitan area service.

Mobile sectional centers, which consist of mail distribution cars in trains and buses, equipped for en route distribution, are also utilized in the program.

Six Routes to Levelland

The plan required an intricate pattern of interlocking schedules, with connections being made within a matter of minutes at many places. For instance, a letter from Roaring Springs to Levelland travels over six different routes, including one train; it is transferred at five different locations.

Mr. Gray explained that the next-day delivery depends on the conscientious attention of postal employees as well as the closely integrated time table which governs the area's postal units and the transportation linking them together.



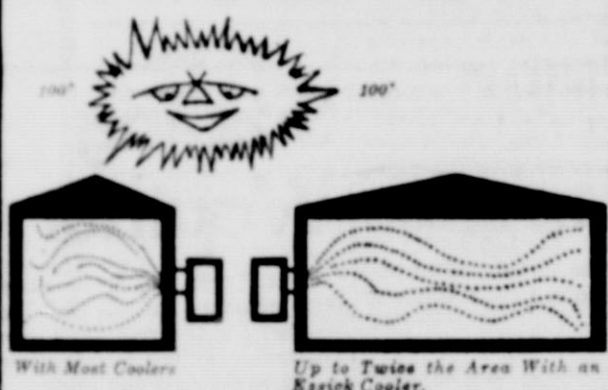

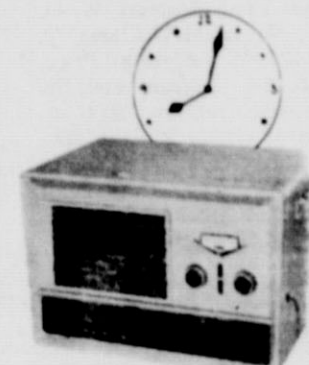
