## Crops and Ranges Throughout Territory Greatly Improved by Slow, Soaking Rain

RAIN, falling as "gently as dew" early yesterday further improved this area's excellent crop prospects. The precipitation followed a cool air mass that arrived about midnight Monday. The rain fell "exactly as needed" for the rapidly growing crops which had in some instances started to "burn" in tight land areas. Cotton had also been reported as "shedding" blooms and squares as a result of the extreme heat and about four weeks of dry weather.






