

Heavy Rains Soak Panhandle

RAIN was falling in Matador at 4 a. m. this morning to bring the estimated total to more than 5 inches since early Tuesday.

More than 12 inches of rain had fallen in the area of Slaton early Wednesday morning, causing extensive damage and washing out a section of Sante Fe railroad track.

Rain fell in Matador most of the night, but no damage has been reported. The total may exceed the Tribune estimate. The following rain story was set into type previous to Wednesday.

Heat that had held the Panhandle area in its grip for four days, was broken by rains early Tuesday morning. The 4th of July did not pass in Matador without rain, but it was barely a trace at midnight.

Within the next two hours, however, the rainfall here registered 1.90 inches.

The mercury had been in the high 90's to over 100 previous to the rains. Part of the time the heat had been accompanied by high southwest winds. Many Matador residents reported running air conditioners all night for two or three nights.

Farmers said cotton was growing rapidly, but that feed stuff and pastures had begun to need rain.

Lions Speaker Says Free Men Improve

"WHEN MEN are free they strive toward perfection and in a free land the only way to make progress is through change," Rev. Roy Patterson said Tuesday in an address before the Matador Lions Club. "It is said that the only permanent thing is change." Rev. Patterson said, "and free men put their minds and hands to the task of making their community a better place to live."

Rev. Patterson, pastor of the First Methodist Church here, was principal speaker at the civic club's regular luncheon meeting held in the Methodist Church basement.

"The world can not last half free and half slave," Rev. Patterson said, "and the spirit of communism can not dwell in a land in which the people are dedicated to the principles of freedom." He discussed the power of emotional drive which free men possess, in directing them to greater accomplishments. He warned, however, that emotional outbursts can cause one to lose direction.

OLD LAKE YIELDS TOP WHEAT CROP

The best wheat harvest reported in Motley County for 1960, was produced on land once partly covered by lake. J. H. (Red) Renfro who operates the Gray farm in the Fairview community about five miles southwest of Matador, produced 39½ bushels of wheat per acre on 79.9 acres.

Soil and water conservation practices in a system of terraces built a number of years ago, have made it possible to farm most of the large lake. The terraces bring in water from pasture land and spread it over farming land in such a manner as to make farming possible.

Heavy rains still cause part of the field to flood, Renfro said, and some of the old lake area had a poor stand because of heavy watering.

Also some of the most fertile farming land in the county is in the Fairview area, pioneers used to call it "Poverty Flat." Because of the rich soil, dry weather used to "burn up" the crops quickly. It was in this area that the best "dry land" wheat was harvested in 1960. The variety of wheat sown was Concho.

BRUCCELLOSIS CURB MEETING PLANNED

A meeting for the purpose of organizing the work of brucellosis testing in Motley County, will be held Friday, July 8, at 8 p. m. at the court house. Announcement was made this week by County Agent Bill Palmeyer.

Dr. James B. Henderson of the Texas Animal Health Commission will be present at the meeting and will explain the work his group will perform, and the duties of the local livestock owners in the testing program.

Eighty-six percent of the livestock owners in Motley County have requested that the county be designated as a "brucellosis free" county, Palmeyer said.

"As all owners of livestock must have animals tested, the purpose of the meeting is to plan an order of testing, and clear up questions that owners might have," he explained.

All livestock owners are urged to attend the meeting. The better the program functions, the quicker work will be completed in Motley County, and the less tax money expended, Palmeyer declared.

COUNTY AGENT ALLMEYER SAYS:

ROTARY LAWN MOWER IS BETHEL WEAPON

Did you know that the rotary power lawn mower travels at speeds up to 10 miles per hour and is capable of throwing sticks, stones or other objects at considerable speeds? Imagine what would happen if you were hit by one of these fast-flying objects.

Lawn mowers are now used by a majority both in town and on the farm. Along with their increased use has come a closely related increase in accidents involving both operators and bystanders. Most accidents have been due to carelessness or lack of knowledge on the part of the individual.

Ulich, extension agricultural engineer, offers these suggestions on how to operate your lawn mower safely and efficiently.

Disconnect spark plug before working on mower.

Use a sharp blade doing a cutting job and requires less power.

Operate mower with shields removed.

Remove rocks and debris from the area before mowing.

Refill the gasoline when engine is hot or

power as slow as possible to do good work.

Children and pets away from mowers.

Be certain of sure footing when mowing on steep slopes.

Never leave engine running when mower is unattended.

Make sure mower is steady and under control before starting engine.

Always be aware of the hazards involved when you are using a power mower. Don't get caught napping.

SILAGE AS A CASH CROP

Several West Texas farmers found in past years that forage sorghums grown for silage was more profitable as a cash crop than grain sorghum. The silage was sold in the field to ranchmen or cattle feeders. The farmer produced the crop and the buyer took care of the harvesting and storing.

In an article in TEXAS AGRICULTURAL PROGRESS, Paul T. Marion of the Spur Experiment Station cites one case where silage, contracted in the field for \$3.50 per ton, grossed \$45.85 per acre. Other farms in the area grossed only \$30.00 per acre for their grain sorghum, and had to stand harvesting costs out of that.

10 Years Could Mean Less Than Two

Texas Laws on Crime and Punishment Confuse Accused and Those Who Judge

(John B. Stapleton, District Attorney of 110th Judicial District embracing Briscoe, Dickens, Floyd and Motley counties has submitted the following article on the Texas Parole System. "I know from the many questions asked me that the people generally have a great deal of interest in this matter," he said, "and they do not understand just how the Parole System operates. I believe this article will answer their questions.")

One is readiness of the offender for parole, particularly his personal habits. Another is the nature of his offense and the circumstances under which it was committed (a murder in a fit of passion is not given the same factors of trusts (Strangely murderers.)

Readiness of Community

Then, the board must consider readiness of the community to receive the parolee—which usually is not very good in cases of narcotics addicts, habitual drunkards, embezzlers and violators of trusts (Strangely, here is little opposition to murders.)

Fourth consideration naturally is the combined opinions of prison officials about a prisoner's prospects.

Under the law, the board must not release one if there is risk that he will not conform, if his release will cause disrespect for the law, if it would have an adverse effect on prison discipline or if there is need for additional physical or mental care of vocational training.

In addition to the routine considerations of cases and the hearings requested in death penalty or other exceptional cases, board members make tours of the prison system every four months of the prison system every thought to deserve hearings out of order.

Some of the prisoners request hearings; some get them because board members are not ready to act on written records and want personal interviews. In some cases, members of families have asked hearings; in others, prison officials have.

The way in which prisoners can earn their credit on sentences also is provided by law. Each prisoner enters with a clear record and is allowed to earn "good time" of 20 days extra for every month of "straight time." If he becomes a trusty, he gets another 10 days' credit and gets a month extra for every month served.

Once a year, he may give blood for the blood bank, and earn another 30 days of credit.
