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

Agriculture Outlook **Declared Favorable** 

Domestic demands for agricultural products in Texas are expected to be good in 1961, says John McHaney, extension agricultural economist at A &M College. Even if there should be a small change in consumer incomes, it will not affect the domestic market for farm products

to any great extent. If the recent economic declines are long-run and become more severe than is now expected, they could have a depressing effect on the domestic market for agricultural products, but

this is not likely in 1961. McHaney also says that the volume of agricultural exports during the present fiscal year, July 1, 1960 to June 30, 1961, will likely equal or exceed the record high established during the past year. Progress continues to be made in lowering trade barriers against farm products imported from the United States and government programs continues to play a major role in the agricultural economy of the

Overall prices received by farmers in the U. S. and Texas in 1961 probably will not change much from those received in 1960, but prices received for individual commodities will change. The extent of these changes will depend on economic factors affecting such commodities.

Through the years, farm and ranch debts in the U.S. and have continued to increase, but this debt is only about 13 percent of the value of farm assets. Equities of farmers and other owners of farm assets are high in relation to farm debts, and this is favorable,



CONUMENT ON SAN JACINTO BATTLEFIELD, above, is near the grave of Dr. Wm. Junius Mottley, for whom Motley County was named. Dr. Mottley was born n Virginia about 1812. Larry Sealy, from a Houston In 1833 or 1834, he matriculated in the medical college of Transylvania University. At the time he listed his home as Greenburg, Kentucky. The college has no record of his receiving a degree, and it is generally assumed he left for Texas before degrees were conferred on March 18, 1836. Earlier in 1836 he was appointed surgeon for the post at Goliad, where he is known to have furnished his own surgical instruments, valued in excess of \$125. Dr. Mottley was a delegate from Goliad to the Washington on the Brazos convention of 1833. There he was one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence. When the convention was dissolved, he hastened to rejoin the military forces, serving as aide-de-camp to Thomas J. Rusk. Mortally wounded in the battle of San Jacinto, Dr. Mottley died the night of April 21, 1836, and was buried on the hattlefield. His heirs could not be located and his donation certificate for military services was sold at auction. Motley County, created in 1876, was named in honor of Dr. Mottley. An error in spelling is responsible for the discrepancy. The above photograph was made last June by Burrell Tipton, editor of the Dayton (Texas) News.
