Forrest Ragland Is Victim In Accident

Forrest Ragland, 67, prominent north Dickens County farmer and rancher, and resident of the Roaring Springs and Afton areas for more than 45 years, died about 8 p.m. Friday as a result of a highway accident. Mr. Ragland suffered fatal injuries while at the wheel of his pickup when he drove onto State Highway 70 and was struck by an automobile. The accident occurred about 7:15 and the area pioneer died in Crosbyton Hospital, where he had been taken for treatment. His body was brought to Eudy-Seale Funeral Home here.

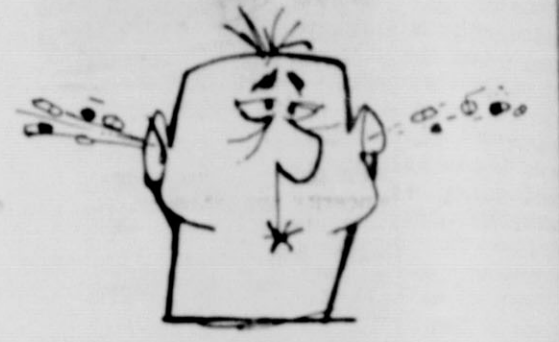

Livestock Survey Cards Scheduled

Postmaster Charlie Scaff reminds rural patrons of the Matador Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week survey cards will be placed in a sample of boxes belonging to farmers and ranchmen.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Scaff explains. "It's important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the letter-drop. This way, USDA gets a true sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

"Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Scaff concludes.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

HOME GARDENERS SHOULD CHECK POWDERY MILDEW

Home gardeners are advised to check their plantings for signs of powdery mildew, a fungus disease which attacks many flowering and ornamental plants. The plant disease is normally present at this time of the year in many areas of Texas, according to Harlan E. Smith, Extension Plant Pathologist.

Some of the more commonly grown plants which should be watched for mildew are roses, violets, chrysanthemums, honeysuckle, phlox, zinnias, live oak, crape myrtle, euonymus and hydrangea.

Unless the disease is controlled, the plants may lose their foliage and thus fail to make normal growth and production. Contact your county agent for information on how to treat the various plants. Applications of sulphur, Karathane or Phalton are recommended and are available in insecticide-fungicide combination spray or dust.
