Funeral services for Miss Maggie Bryan, 81, pioneer resident of Matador since 1900, were held at 3:30 p.m. Sunday at the First Baptist Church.

Rev. Gene Hawkins, pastor, officiated and was assisted by Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister. Burial was in East Mound Cemetery under direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Howard Edmondson, Forrest Campbell, J. L. Woodruff, M. S. Patton, Pat Sheridan and Elbert Reeves.

Miss Bryan died suddenly at her home here early Saturday morning. Her death was discovered about 8 o'clock by her sister, Mrs. T. E. Cammack who shared her duplex home, and the latter's daughter, Mrs. Grace McDowell of Plainview, who was spending the week end with them. She suffered a heart ailment, and was a patient in Trauma Hospital for several months during the winter.

Born Margaret Bryan, July 16, 1879 in Bell County, Texas, "Miss Maggie" as she was more familiarly known, came here from Erath County, with her family, comprising her mother and two sisters.

She was employed in the mercantile business for several years and then became a partner in the Western Dry Goods Co., with T. B. Edmondson. The pioneer firm changed hands in 1944 and Miss Maggie continued in the business until 1950, when she retired. She died April 15, 1961 at the age of 81 years, 8 months and 29 days.

Miss Maggie was of an unassuming nature, commensurate with her Christian character. She was converted in early girlhood and joined the Matador

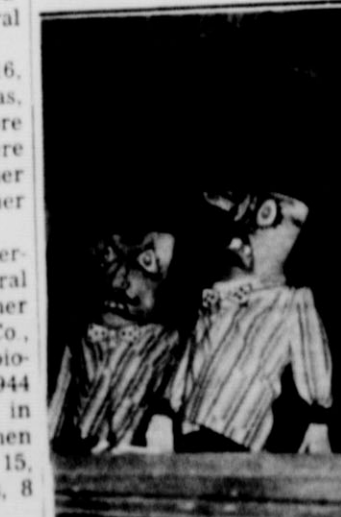

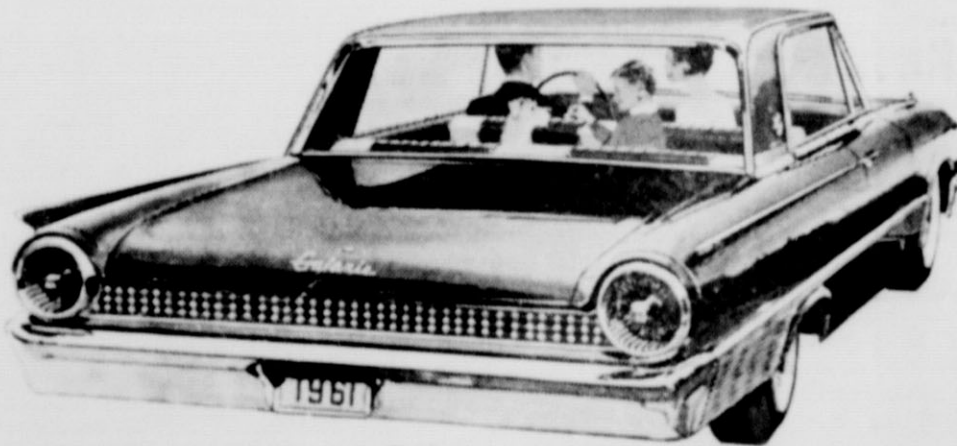

County Agent Bill Pallmeyer Gives New Feed Grain Plan Highlights

By Bill Pallmeyer

In general, the new program provides for payments to producers who divert corn and sorghum acreage to conservation uses. Only those producers who participate will be eligible for support prices for 1961 on their normal production of these two crops. In addition, and grain sorghum producers who participate, will be eligible for support on other feed grains, oats, barley and rye.

The announced national prices for corn are \$1.20 per bu. average for all grades; grain sorghum, \$1.93 per hundredweight for No. 2 or better; barley, 93c per bu. for grade No. 2 or better; oats, 62c per bu. for grade No. 3; and rye \$1.02 per bu.

Negotiable Certificates

Payments will be in the form of negotiable certificates for which producers may receive grain or a cash equivalent. Co-operators who wish to receive the cash equivalent of grain at the support price may ask the Commodity Credit Corp. to act as their agent in the marketing of the grain. As agent, CCC will advance the payment to the producer as soon as he signifies that he will cooperate in the program.

Growers who participate in the program will reduce their corn and or grain sorghum acreages by a minimum of 20% below their acreages for the 1959-60 period. For diverting acreages equal to 20% of their base or 20 acres, whichever is the larger, producers will be eligible for a payment equal to 50% of their normal production on their diverted acreage times the county support price. Actual payment computation will be based on a payment rate per acre for the county times the acreage diverted and a productivity index for each farm, which will reflect its normal production.

There is also a provision for

further reductions at a higher payment rate. This additional reduction can be any amount up to 20% more, and as an added incentive, the higher rate will be 60% of normal production. Payment rate is computed in the same way as the minimum compliance payment rate. This increased rate applies only to the second 20% of diverted acres.

Must Go To Conservation

Acreage diverted from production must be put to a conservation use, in addition to the acreage devoted to conservation use in 1959-60. In general these will include permanent type rotation cover of grasses and legumes or small grains; water storage; wildlife food and cropland in volunteer natural cover or in procted summer fallow if approved. The diverted acres cannot be harvested or grazed in 1961, with the exception of castor beans, sunflower (tame), safflower, and sesame. If these crops are planted for harvest, no payment is made on the diverted acres, but grain is eligible for support price.

These and other factors will be presented in the meeting on Thursday, April 20th in the District Courtroom. Time of meeting is 7:45 p.m.

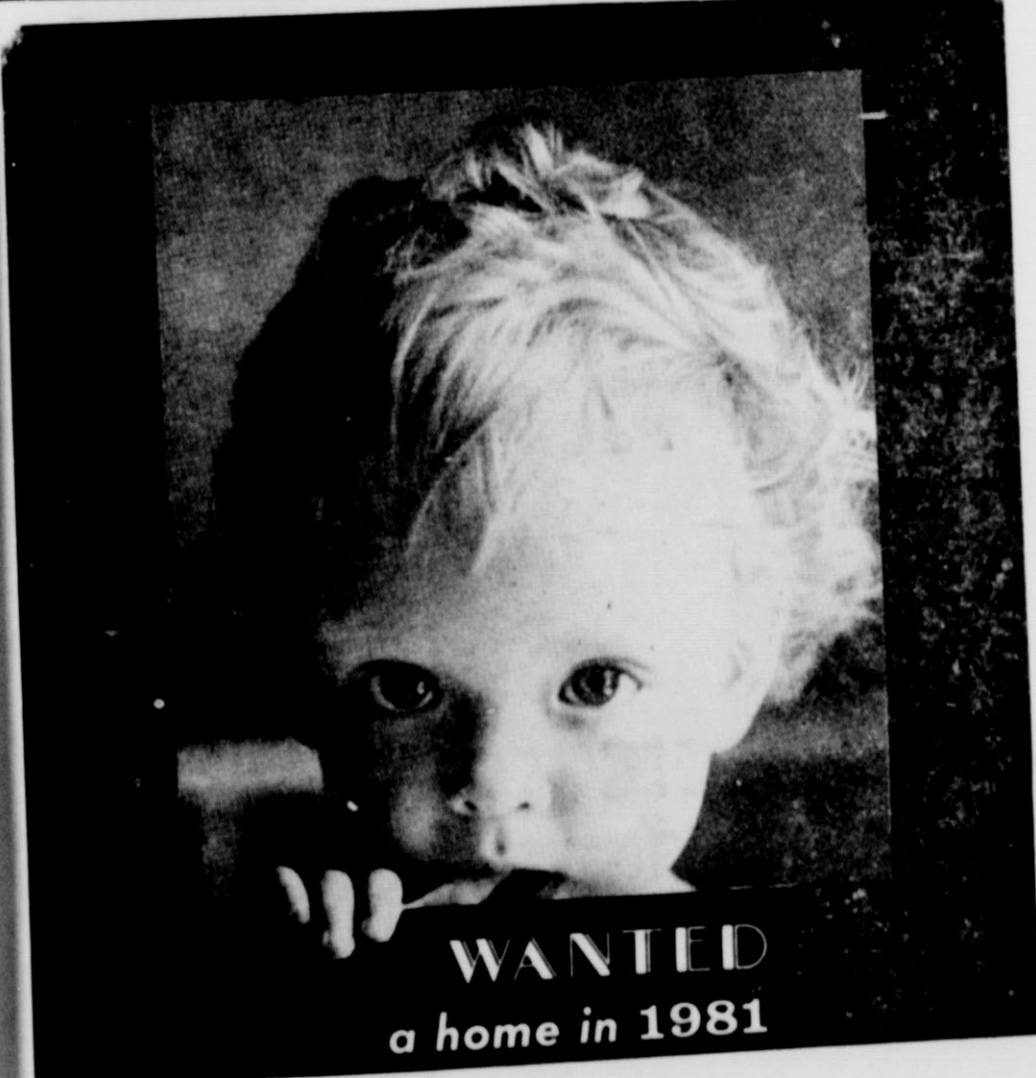

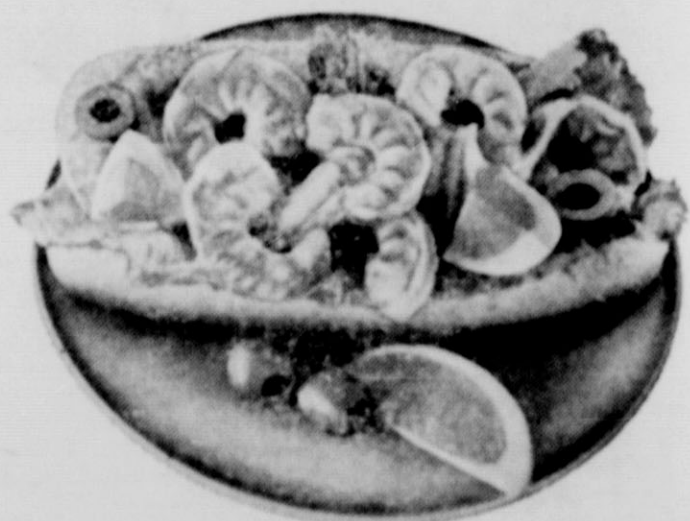

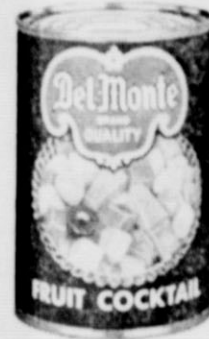
