STAMFORD RODEO PROMISES TO BE 'WILD AND WOOLY'

A truck load of the wildest broncs from the Sitting Bull Indian Reservation of the Black Hills of South Dakota will be brought to Stamford for the Texas Cowboy Reunion which will be held this year on July 1st, (Saturday), 3rd and 4th.

The bucking broncs and bulls will be furnished by Adrian Parker of Saint Jo, Texas, who says, "I have found that Northern horses are meaner than Texas horses; they bite and lay down as well as kick and paw."

The outstanding horse in the bunch is an Indian pony, "Apple Jack," described as a wild paint-brown, with glass eyes which has been ridden only once in his life and then by an unqualified rider. "No one has ever been able to shoe this horse," says Parker.

Also in the lot of stock is "Montana," a big blue mare that was out 41 times in 1960 and never ridden; and a Brahma bull "Muerte," who has been ridden one time in 72 tries.
