Lions 'Carla' Food Receives Response

WORD GETS AROUND. During more than a third of a century Matador Lions Club has been recognized as an outstanding civic organization. Its latest tribute is from a native son, Houston Schweitzer, now an employee of Humble Oil & Refining Company at Baytown.

Following the devastating hurricane "Carla" Matador Lions voted to send a shipment of groceries to the stricken area. The truck that was scheduled to pick up the food failed in some manner to come to Matador. Lions President Billy Wason called a District 2T-1 official and asked his instructions. He was advised to send the food-stuff to "Carla Relief Fund, Houston Lions Club, Houston, Texas." ICX Motor Freight Lines carried the supplies without charge.

The following letter, dated November 10, and signed by Houston Schweitzer, was received last week: "Dear Members: You can imagine my surprise a couple of weeks ago when I found at my church, a great stack of boxes loaded with food and all tagged with the attached label. (Matador Lions Club). The occasion was a meeting of the official board of St. Mark's Methodist Church, Baytown.

"The people in attendance examined the boxes and the common question was 'where in the world is Matador, Texas?' This was my opportunity to tell this group, many of whom had lost either part or all of their possessions to hurricane Carla, what a big heart was in the little West Texas town of Matador. How they had a Lions Club that over the years, 30 or more to my personal memory, had arisen time and time again to help the unfortunate, the poor and the needy. A club that has always symbolized to me the role that a civic organization can play in a community.

"I recalled some of your projects—glasses for a needy child, food and clothing for a stranded family, inspiring students in the local school to strive for better grades by honoring and encouraging them."

William Robert (Bob) Knierim, 87, who built and owned Bronte's first electric power plant, died Monday in a hospital.

He had been a resident there more than 55 years and was a former mayor of Bronte. He was an uncle of Mrs. Frank Pohl of Matador.

The Coke County pioneer built the first telephone line into Bronte from Sweetwater and operated the telephone office in his grocery store.

Mr. Knierim was associated for many years with the Texas Water Control Board. Water rights on the Upper Colorado River were held in his name for many years.

Surviving are his wife; a daughter, and a son. His brother, C. L. Knierim (Mrs. Pohl's father) also resides at Bronte.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Tuesday in First Methodist Church with burial in Fairview Cemetery.

ESTELLINE boys downed Paducah 37-35 here Saturday night to win the title in the Lions Annual Invitation Basketball Tournament. Paducah girls defeated Matador 32-29 to win the top place in the girls finals.

In consolation play Roaring Springs topped Patton Springs 49-42 for the boys' crown and Turkey walloped Estelline 55-31 for the girl's championship. Estelline downed Turkey 48-37 to reach the boys finals, while Paducah took a 41-21 victory over Matador to gain the finals.

In the girls division Paducah bested Estelline and Patton Springs, while Matador bounced Roaring Springs 52-30. Teddy Barnes and Rolfe Woolen of Estelline, Bill Heatly and Bill Neskorik of Paducah, and Gary Lancaster of Matador were named to the all-tournament boys team.

Named to the all-tournament girls team were Jan Bumpus of Paducah, Jill Scaff of Matador and Margie Mullins of Turkey as forwards, Sue Cross of Sadoe and Beverly Tobias and Sule Timmons of Paducah as guards.

Work Advances on New Phone Building

CONSTRUCTION work is advancing rapidly on the building which will house Matador's future dial telephone equipment. The announcement was made recently by W. L. Frazier, district manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest, in a special release to the Tribune. Actual construction was started November 10 by Commercial Contracting Company, who received the contract.

The building is located on Larlat Street about half way between Main and Bundy Streets. The property was purchased from Mrs. W. F. Jacobs and was formerly the location of the Bert Estes home. The new building is scheduled for completion in mid-January. Date of the cut-over to dial operation is tentatively set for July 1, 1962.

Frazier said the unattended dial equipment will bring to Matador the most modern telephone facilities. The customer will dial the desired number without the services of an operator and permit a much more rapid completion of calls.

"Before the cut-over to dial operation, new telephone instruments will be installed, all houses prewired and new telephone numbers assigned to all Matador customers," Frazier said. "This is known as the ANC or all-numeral-calling plan. Each telephone in Matador will have the three-number prefix of 742 followed by four assigned numbers. The new prefix will assign this city to the national designation plan and nowhere else in this area will the combination 742 be used."

Church and Society

Increase Is Noted In Yearly Average Of Sunday School

Although the goal of 225 in Sunday School was not attained this fall, as anticipated, at the First Baptist Church, the figure was high enough (186) that the yearly average will probably still top that of previous years.

A record attendance was attained during a campaign conducted in September, with 273 in Sunday School on the fourth Sunday of the month.

This number was reached once before by the church in 1952, on the last Sunday of a revival meeting in which Rev. Carlos Gruber led the singing. Rev. Keith McCormick was pastor.

Figures from the records of Mrs. Bob Stanley, church clerk disclose that an average attendance of 168 was maintained by the Sunday School during the past associational year, and is eight more than the previous year. According to the records, the lowest attendance this year was 111. Mrs. Stanley noted that this was the "highest" low attendance figure on record.

From an average of 112 in 1944-45 (war years) the following are yearly averages to the present time: 123, 129, 133, 138, 142, 134 (two years), 147, 132, 134, 158, 137, 145, 160 (two years), and 168.

Membership Gains

According to data compiled by Mrs. Stanley for the annual associational letter, the church recorded 35 new members the past year, (29 by letter and 26 by baptism) and lost 44, 12 by death and 32 by letter, leaving a gain of 11, with total membership of 499. Of this number, 354 are resident members and 145 non-resident.

Thirteen Christian Training diplomas and 115 Book Awards were earned by members during the year.

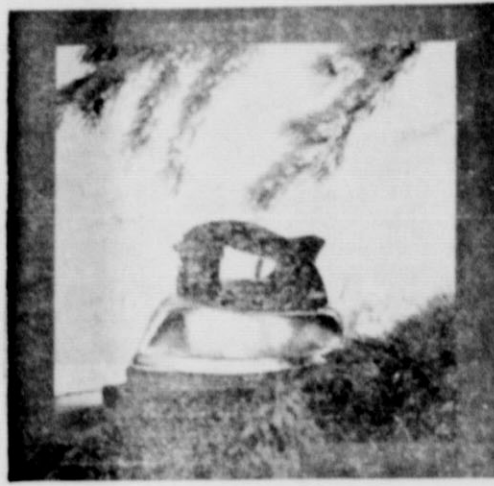

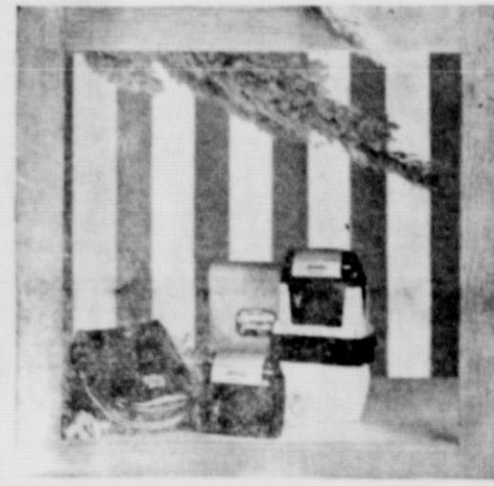

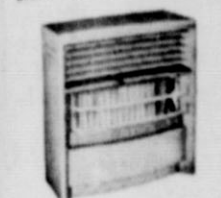

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

COMPOST SOLVES PROBLEMS

There is a safe and practical way to handle the leaves which are now falling and cluttering lawns and gardens. Why smoke up the neighborhood and create a fire hazard by burning leaves. A compost pile will solve the problem.

Making a compost pile is a simple operation. Scrap lumber or a few feet of net wire and four posts are the only materials needed. Start with a six-inch layer of leaves and for every four square feet of enclosure, sprinkle one-half cup of commercial fertilizer, such as 10-10-10, over the leaves.

After the fertilizer is added, apply 1/2 to 1 inch layer of soil, then continue adding layers of leaves and soil until the pile reaches the desired height. The top layer should be left somewhat saucer-shaped so it will hold water. In three to four months, the leaves will decompose and become excellent material for use next summer.

Heavy accumulations of leaves left on the lawn can damage grass, especially when they are wet. They may also be responsible for more disease problems. Leaves should be removed, and the extra time to put them into a compost pile will return bill dividends.

HOGS ARE PROFITABLE

For those who raise grain sorghum, and learn the principles of feeding and management of hogs, the swine enterprise in Texas can be very profitable.

It requires about 700 lbs. of grain and 150 lbs. of a good protein supplement for the farmer to produce a 200 to 220 lb. market hog, where he produces his own pigs. This amount of grain includes that eaten by the sow that raised the litter of pigs.

When market hogs are selling at 17c/lb., the farmer will get 2.70 per hundred pounds of grain. 19c hogs mean \$3.15 per hundred.

cently formed Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation in its drive to do something about the animal health situation.

The screwworm, a pest causing an estimated annual loss of one hundred million dollars, is a primary target. "Animal health," Chairman Stevens said, "is not only a concern of the producer but the economic loss also affects business and consumers. We all have a lot at stake in this program."

"We know this first program will cost several million dollars, but if we can remove the screwworm from the scene, the annual savings will amount to several times the cost of the control effort."

The meeting held in the district court room, was initiated by County Agent Bill Pallmeyer and Vocational Agricultural instructor Bill Moss.
