Postal Department Proposes Increases

Proposed increases in money order and special delivery fees starting July 1, 1961, have been announced by Postmaster General J. Edward Day.

No changes in special delivery fees for first class mail are planned.

Special delivery fees for second, third and fourth class matter will be increased by 10c in each of the non-first class fee brackets.

The increases for this service are expected to yield about \$2.5 million in additional postal revenues, based on current special delivery volume.

Money orders up to \$5 and over \$50 will be increased by 5 cents. The new money order schedule will combine the pres-

Maurice Reilly Promoted to Colonel in Air Force

A Matador High School graduate (class of 1938) who is making the military his career, recently was promoted to the rank of full Colonel. He is Maurice Reilly, son of Mrs. Pauline Reilly of Boulder, Colo., and the late M. J. Reilly for many years manager of Matador Land & Cattle Co. headquarters here. Following is a release to the Tribune from the Air Force Public Relations department:

Maxwell AFB, Ala. — Col. Maurice R. Reilly, USAF, currently a student at Air University's War College, Maxwell AFB, Ala., was promoted from Lt. Colonel to the rank of full Colonel effective March 20, 1961. Col. Reilly and his wife, Marian, hosted a party for the faculty and students of the War College at Maxwell's Officers Club on the evening of the 20th.

Before entering the service Col. Reilly was a longtime resident of Matador, Texas. He attended the University of Colorado (1940-43) interrupting his education to enlist in the Army Air Corps. After completing flying training in April 1944, he served in various Training Command assignments before being assigned overseas in 1945 to the Asiatic-Pacific Theater of operations. Col. Reilly served in the last months of the war as a B-29 pilot with the 73rd Bomb Wing on Saipan.

After the war, Col. Reilly returned to the University of Colo-

rado completing his work for the B. S. Degree in Civil Engineering in 1947. He accepted a commission as a Regular Officer in the USAF in 1947 and served successively as a civil engineering staff officer at Langley AFB, Va., (1947-8) and with the Far East Air Forces in Japan and Okinawa (1948-51).

Upon his return to the states, Col. Reilly was assigned to Purdue University as a graduate student in Civil Engineering receiving the M. S. Degree in 1952. Subsequently he served as an instructor in civil engineering at the USAF Institute of Technology, Wright-Patterson AFB, Dayton, Ohio (1952-56). In 1956-7 he attended the Command and Staff College graduating in 1957.

Before coming to the War College in Aug., 1960, Col. Reilly served with the Joint U.S. Military Group in Madrid, Spain.

Col. Reilly holds the rating of Command Pilot and has logged more than 3500 hours in the air. His awards and decorations include the Bronze Star Medal, Air Force Commendation Ribbon, Army Commendation Ribbon, Good Conduct Medal, American Campaign Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal, Army of Occupation Medal with Japan Clasp, National Defense Service Medal, Korean Service Medal, Air Force Longevity Service Award with 3 Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters and United Nations Service Medal.

Col. Reilly is married to the former Miss Marian Riley of Boulder, Colo., whom he met when he was a student at the University of Colorado. Now they have three children, Suzanne 15, Elizabeth 13, and Matthew 9. Currently they are residing at 250 Fleming Road, Montgomery, Ala., but are anticipating a move to Wash., D. C. in June since Col. Reilly has been assigned to the Directorate of Civil Engineering, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations, Hq., USAF.
