Area Men Attend Shrine Meet Here

Masonic Hall in Matador was the site of a dinner meeting, held Wednesday, April 5th for area Shriners of Khiva Temple. Attending were Potentate's Aides and Special Representatives from Floyd, Briscoe, Cottle and Motley counties. Also in attendance were the membership committee and members of the divan of the temple, including illustrious Potentate, Noble Mel Kruse of Amarillo.

Presiding at the meeting was Noble Doug Pitts of Matador. Potentate Kruse made the principal address, pointing out that Khiva Temple is advancing on a broad front this year to do more for humanity, especially crippled children, in Khiva Temple's jurisdiction.

Have You Noticed?
For several weeks now the Tribune has been experimenting with a new and more expensive type of newspaper stock. It is called rotonews. So far only one subscriber has noticed the difference.

It is a harder, smoother paper and costs about \$15 more per week to use (purchased in small quantities). Purpose of the change was to improve the quality of the print (sharpness) and the reproduction of halftone pictures.

The Tribune has not made a definite decision to quit the use of the brand of newsprint on

which the weekly has been printed for more than 20 years. The new paper has some disadvantages. It picks up extra static when through the press and folder. Also it must be run a shade lighter to prevent offset (one sheet inking another) since the harder paper absorbs ink much slower.

This issue contains both kinds of paper. The center sheet or insert is the old type paper and outside four pages are printed on the new paper. Have you noticed?

El Progreso Club Hears First Of Two Programs On Texas At Meeting Thursday

Mrs. G. E. Hamilton was hostess to the El Progreso Study Club as it met Thursday of last week, with Mrs. Elbert Reeves as leader of the first of two programs on Texas. The next will be given April 27.

Mrs. Reeves opened the program with the caption, "Mountains, forests and plains; what a lordly heritage to claim. That's Texas!"

Mrs. D. E. Pitts was the first speaker on the program with the subject, "Texas Under Six Flags." She mentioned General Houston as the outstanding figure in the early history of the state, which at that time included the area which now composes Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico and Wyoming, as well as that of Texas.

She said many old landmarks have been preserved and that the capital at Austin has itself changed less than most of the cities.

"We have a varied and interesting state, and one with a short history," she declared, "it is only a little over a hundred years old. It has not had time to develop in education, art and literature as have some of the older states."

riched our culture." She stated that many books and articles have been written about the Texas Rangers, and that Stephen F. Austin was the first author of note to be born in Texas. The early poetry was almost void of merit, she said, and described it as "extremely sentimental and sometimes morbid."

Later history, she said, has produced Grace Noll Crowell of Dallas, who was honored as Texas Poet Laureate; and William Sidney Porter, (O. Henry) who did more than anyone else to put Texas literature on the map.

Katherine Ann Porter, who has been awarded many honors, is considered Texas' greatest short story writer. Mrs. Pipkin cited J. Frank Dobie, president of Texas Folklore Society as one of the great writers of this age, and Grace Erdman and Tom Lea among others, who have enriched present-day society.

Special Music By Girls
Mrs. John Fish accompanied four high school girls as they sang, "Texas, Our Texas," and "Eyes of Texas." They were, Ida Fair, Linda Ray Thompson, Vada Nichols and Gwen Killingsworth.

She said the first symphony orchestra was brought to this state by the Germans and that Dallas was the first city in Texas to organize one. Dickens Pioneer Claimed By Death

Dickens County's oldest citizen and last charter member of the county's organization in 1891 was claimed by death recently. He was Larmon Grant Crabtree, who died March 20 at the age of 96.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday, March 22, at 3 p.m. in the Dickens Baptist Church, conducted by his son, the Rev. Victor Crabtree, who was assisted by Rev. Robert Fields, Dickens Baptist pastor, and Rev. H. T. Harris of the Whiteflat Baptist Church. Burial was in the Dickens cemetery.

Mr. Crabtree came to this area from Lampasas County in 1890 and had made his home since that time, in the old Draper community. He voted in the first election held in Dickens County and served as deputy sheriff under Jeff Harkey. For 16 years he served as a commissioner.

He was also the last surviving charter member of the Dickens and Friendship Baptist churches. He taught a Sunday School class for 40 years in the Friendship Baptist Church and had been a deacon for 63 years. He also served a number of years on the school board.

His wife preceded him in death. Surviving him are three daughters, Mrs. H. C. Jackson, Dickens; Mrs. Ben Ferguson,

Tucson, Ariz.; and Mrs. John Speer, Amarillo; one son, Rev. Victor Crabtree, Spur; one sister, Mrs. L. A. Medlin, Big Spring; 7 grandchildren and 24 great-grandchildren.

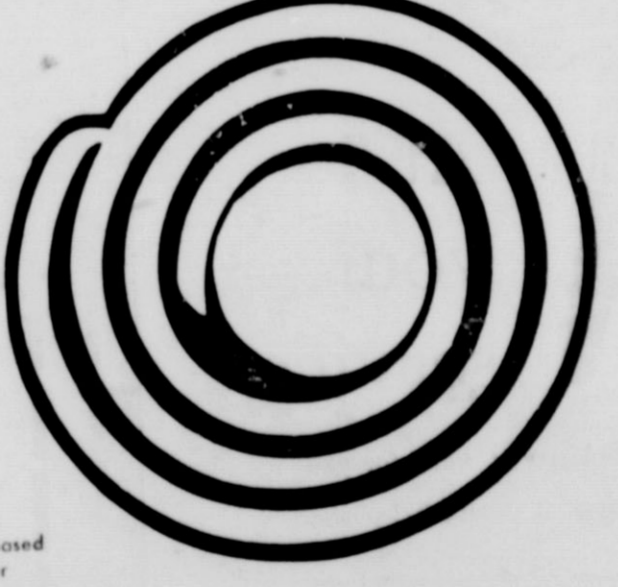

WHEAT GROWERS SHOULD WATCH FOR GREENBUGS

Motley County wheat growers are cautioned to be on the look out for greenbugs. They may be noted by light spots appearing in fields. To date, a few light infestations have been found in Motley County, but in surrounding counties they have built up to damaging numbers.

Greenbugs reproduce rapidly at temperatures between 55 and 65 degrees, and beneficial insects do not reproduce very rapidly at temperatures under 65. At least five counts should be made in a field, and when 100 bugs are found per foot of row, controls may be warranted.

under democracy rule and a third billion are undecided. But many of these undecided are leaning toward communism because the democracies are not telling their story to the world. "Communism takes from man his belief in God, his individuality, his hopes and his dreams. It offers him nothing but slavery. In contrast democracy offers him faith in God and everything that makes life worth living."

Formby pointed out that Khrushchev recently said that communists will rest content only when the whole world goes communist. In 1953 Stalin and Mao of China set the year of 1973 for the target date of taking over the United States. They plan to do it without firing a shot. Lenin preached that it was too difficult to follow capitalism directly with communism, so socialism has to come in between for a few years.

"Freedom loving people will have to make some sacrifices to win the battle against communism, but we can do it with faith in God and telling the story of democracy everywhere."

Approximately 70 Shrine members from Floyd, Dickens, Hall, Potter, Hansford, Briscoe and Motley Counties attended the meeting.

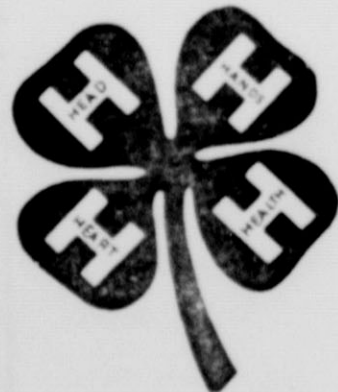
