Mr. Pallmeyer estimated that under the prevailing hand gathering rate it will cost a farmer approximately \$40 to harvest a bale of cotton and get it to the gin. He said a good mechanical harvester under favorable conditions could harvest from 12 to 15 bales per day in good cotton.




