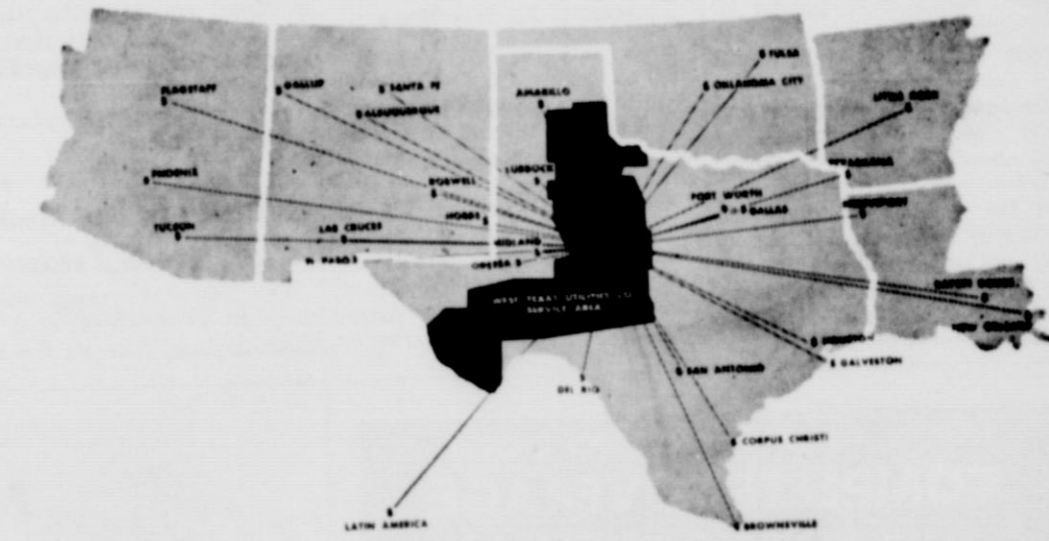

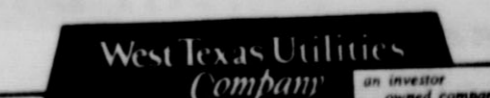

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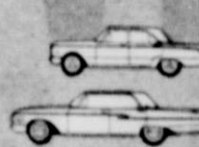

Twelve precious pictures of homecoming events, class reunions and personal pictures were destroyed in the processing. They were dunked in the hypo before going in the developer. That is fatal treatment to photographic film.

Two of the 14 exposures to be developed were salvaged because photographer Douglas Meador has only twelve holders. When the unfortunate dozen were taken from the "soup" totally blank, he decided the ratio of "goofs" was higher than usual and investigated.
