## Resident's Father Claimed By Death

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Monday in Waco, for A. B. Fuchs, 83, father of Mrs. Joe Bloodworth of Matador.

Mr. Fuchs died at 11:45 a.m. Sunday in his home in Waco. Funeral services were held in Wilkerson and Hatch Chapel, and burial was in Waco Memorial Park.

Mr. Fuchs was born in Waco and had lived there most of his life. He was a rural mail carrier in Axtell for several years until 1934 when he retired.

His father, the late August Fuchs, was born in Switzerland but later located in Waco where he was a contractor and builder. August Fuchs built, owned and operated the State House Hotel for several years in Waco before trading the hotel for some land near Axtell and moving there in 1888.

Mr. Fuchs was a member of the Grace Temple Baptist Church at the time of his death. He had served as Deacon in the Baptist church for 41 years.

Survivors are his wife; his daughter, Mrs. Joe Bloodworth, Matador; two sons, A. R. of Waco and W. D. of Wortham; one sister, six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Meador received his BA Degree from Tech in 1949. Well known on the Tech campus, he served three terms on the Student Council, was listed twice in Who's Who on college campus, was co-author of the 1946 Varsity Show and served as Commander of Tech War Veterans Association.

During the 53rd Texas Legislature he worked for Judge Elbert Reeves as secretary when Judge Reeves was State Representative.

Since graduation he was employed as public relations manager of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, later was manager of the Ralls Chamber of Commerce and later accepted the position of manager of Lovington Chamber of Commerce.

Since going to Lovington, Meador has been appointed as Colonel Aid De Camp on the staff of New Mexico's Governor John Burroughs, (1960) and also on the staff of Acting Texas Governor Preston Smith, this year.

Joe B. Meador was born and reared here. He is the son of Joe Meador Sr. and was employed in the advertising department of the Tribune the day he was called to service at the beginning of WW II.
