Turkey Implement Destroyed By Fire

FIRE early Saturday destroyed the Turkey Implement Co., a subsidiary of International Harvester Co., with damages totaling \$60,000.

Fire units were called from Turkey, Quitaque, Flomot and Matador shortly after 8:30 a. m. to fight the fire which rampaged out of control until three walls of the building collapsed about 9:30 a. m.

Among the equipment destroyed by the blaze were one new tractors, 3 customers' tractors, a refrigerator, washing machine, deep freeze and other tractor equipment.

Witnesses said a series of explosions, resulting from butane and gasoline inside the building, hampered firemen's efforts to quell the blaze. After the fire was extinguished only the north wall of the building remained intact.

The building is located in downtown Turkey. Owners of the firm are David Guest and Jay Eudy, owner of the building is Mrs. J. E. Barnhill.

Firemen said probable cause of the fire was a welding torch which had apparently ignited butane which had settled inside from the tractors.

FHA Chapter Hears Fabrics Authority

Matador Chapter of Future Homemakers of America at a recent meeting, heard an authority on fabrics discuss "Teen-age Consumer, a national FHA project."

Speaker was M. B. Melton, department manager of the piece goods department at Sears, Roebuck and Company's store in Lubbock who was invited here by Mrs. A. L. Fair, Home Economics instructor. The meeting was held in the home economics room at 10 a. m. Wednesday, March 15.

Mr. Melton announced at the outset that 10 million teenagers spent 4 billion dollars on clothes and other goods in 1960. Because of this fact, businesses have created items which are in demand by this age group. He revealed there are two types of selling, that to housewives, and that to teenagers.

Mr. Melton explained that regardless of the numerous brand names given to them, there are only four groups of synthetics. Acrilics, nylons, rayon and acetates, and arnel and cottons. Chromspan and other solution dyes are correcting the fault of fading in the synthetic fabrics, he said.

In answering questions on fabrics, Mr. Melton said that although improved synthetics continue to be popular, cotton is still King. Some of the bad features of synthetics are their inability to match the colors present in cotton, and their aversion to hot irons. However, he pointed out that they wash and iron (on low heat) more easily.

Fashion Trends Noted
Dresses are definitely shorter, he continued, and may be getting even shorter. Daytime dresses tend toward straight lines while evening wear leans in the direction of the bouffant. Dainty cotton checks trimmed with lace are the fashion news for the after five outfits.

From the shoe department the word comes that soon to be "The Look" will be the flat-toed, square-tipped shoes. The pointed toe is still popular, but will slowly go out to be replaced by this

style. Shoes with jewels are properly worn in the evening, Mr. Melton said.
The color trend in fabrics is for loud, bold patterns and broad stripes. "Mad prints" are fashionable for sports wear. Peasant prints and border designs are still best sellers. In direct contrast to the bright colors are the feminine pastel checks and basic browns, blacks and beiges which are always fashion-wise.
Mr. Melton stated that although the bright spring colors will be seen much at Easter season, very soon afterward the black and whites will be shown. These colors will be featured in prints, stripes, and checks.
The fashion note on jewelry is to see how little can be used in the daytime. With suits, the chunky beads are being matched. Taking the place of jewelry are scarves and flowers in all shades.

Mr. Melton displayed sample materials and distributed fashion booklets in connection with his talk. He concluded by stressing the fact that no one should select clothes merely because they are in fashion, but should pick styles that are suited to the individual.
