Matadors Tie Down Steers for Bi-District Regional Game with Throckmorton Today

IT WAS CHILLY in the grandstands Friday night but the playing on Burleson Field was pepper hot as the Matador Matadors roped and tied the Rochester Steers 22-14, and rolled into their third successive bi-district championship. The Steers had defeated the Matadors 16-6 earlier in the season.

The Matadors will play their last game of the season today when they meet the Throckmorton Greyhounds in Throckmorton at 2 p. m. The winner of the game will claim the 1961 regional championship.

THE ROCHESTER GAME

The Matadors out-gained the Steers 267 yards to 165. Quarterback Gary Lancaster was the leading rusher with 128 yards and fullback Ros Bearden was next with 112. The Matadors' forward wall moved Rochester around all evening and enabled the Big Red to total 19 first downs to the Steers' 13.

Dale Dixon, Kenneth Davis, Mike Barton, and Ros Bearden made a strong defense that allowed the Steers only two long marches. The Matadors also intercepted one pass and recovered two key fumbles by the Steers.

Lloyd Martin returned the opening kickoff 53 yards to the Rochester 47 and the Matadors went on to score in 10 plays. Lancaster carried four times and Bearden five times to the 7, and Bearden went off right tackle for his score. Kenny Barton kicked the extra point and it was 7-0.

Rochester punted into the end zone and the Matadors launched an 80-yard payoff drive that ended with 9:31 left in the second quarter. The exercise took 13 plays with a 24-yard run by Bearden and a 15-yard gain by Lancaster, the longest gains. Lancaster hit over right tackle from four yards away for the touchdown and Barton converted for a 14-0 lead.

Rochester went 67 yards in 12 plays to score with 45 seconds left in the half. Billy Mc-

MISSILE PROGRAM INTERESTS LIONS

Fantastic details of one of mankind's greatest engines of war (and peace) the mighty Atlas missile, absorbed the interest of members of the Matador Lions Club Tuesday at the regular luncheon held in the basement of the Methodist Church.

Frank Praytor of Houston, communication administrator of General Dynamics Astronautics, builders of the Atlas and silo bases to house them, made the principal address. Mr. Praytor is currently stationed at Altus, Oklahoma where a number of Atlas installations are being made. He was introduced by Lion Douglas Meador.

He explained the construction, operation and purpose of the Atlas, illustrating his talk with slides. He said each Atlas has two settings for targets somewhere on the earth, and that either setting may be selected in event of emergency.

When asked where the targets were located, he replied: "Even if I knew, I couldn't tell you." An excellent fried chicken luncheon was served by members of the Matador Order of Eastern Star. It was the first time this organization has served the Matador Lions.

Flomot had ginned 5,451 bales Matador 2,531 and Roaring Spring 2,525 bales. The harvest has been delayed by continued unfavorable weather.

Thacker Supply Co. Looted by Burglars

Burglars looted Thacker Supply Co. store here some time Monday night or early Tuesday and escaped with merchandise estimated at between \$500 and \$700.

The break-in was discovered by veteran employee A. A. Harp early Tuesday morning when he started to work in the carpet department about 7 a. m. He noticed a portable television set near a window. On examination he discovered the window pane had been broken, and reported the burglary.

The robbers evidently tried to get the portable television through the window opening and found it too small. Also in

a plastic waste basket beside the broken window, were two electric toasters and an electric iron. Principal item of loss was transistor radio sets. At least 12 were taken, two with a retail value of approximately \$100 each. It is believed 30 pocket knives were also taken from the store's large stock.

It was almost impossible to determine the full extent of the theft which may be more than early estimates. Sheriff Jinks Wilson said no arrests had been made in connection with the case but that promising leads were being followed. Thacker Supply Co. has large stores in both Matador and Roaring Springs.

Bungling Burglar Robs The Tribune

This is a news story that should not be reported. It is too ridiculous. The Tribune, however, is claiming the distinction of being the first country one-horse weekly newspaper shop to be broken into by a burglar (if he is later captured and proved insane, the claim will be withdrawn).

It is not easy to tell when a country print shop has been broken into or broken out of (they naturally look that way).
