Funeral services were conducted at 2:30 p.m. Saturday at the First Baptist Church in Muleshoe. The Rev. Bobby Lacey, pastor of the Longview Baptist Church, officiated and burial was in the Muleshoe cemetery.

Mr. Kincanon was born August 19, 1912 in Paradise, Texas, and moved at the age of five, with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. C. Kincanon, to the Northfield community, where he grew to manhood. He later lived at Turkey and moved from there to the Needmore community where he had lived 11 years.

Luck Takes Swat At Motley Eagles For Championship

LUCK last week took a swat at the Motley Eagles in Baird in the Region V playoffs of the Junior Texas Teenage Baseball for state championship. Faced with defeating the two strongest entrants on the first two days of the playoffs, the Eagles won the first in a marathon 11-inning struggle, but lost the second and title contention.

Keith Teague of Floydada, playing with the Eagles, hurled a three-hitter and struck out 19 batters in the superb 11-inning performance, defeating the tournament favorite Ranger 4-3.

Teague was the mound here and Richard Campbell was the batting star, getting four of Matador's eight hits, including two doubles. His last double drove the two winning runs in the top of the 11th.

Ranger drew the first blood in the first inning when a dropped fly and a single produced a run. Ranger scored again in the 5th on a pair of walks and a single.

The Eagles threatened in almost every inning but were unable to push across any runs until the 7th. With one out, Larry Lawson and Johnny Smith singled. Louis Moore was hit by a pitched ball to load the bases. Tim Green then hit a roller to short and Lawson scored as Moore was forced to second.

Smith then scored on a balk to tie the score 2-2 at the end of the regulation seven innings. The Eagles threatened in the scoreless 8th, 9th and 10th innings, leaving two men on base in each inning as Teague continued to set Ranger down in order.

MASS POLIO IMMUNIZATION for the residents of Motley County may be the next major project of the Matador Lions Club, it was disclosed Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the club held in the Methodist Church basement.

Lion Randall Whitworth announced the proposal being considered by the club and referred the subject to Lion Dr. J. S. Stanley. Lion Stanley said he had contracted authorities and that it would possibly be September 16 (or later) before the new Sabin oral vaccine would be available, due to the many mass immunization in progress at present.

Interest In Rodeo Mounts

INTEREST in the annual Motley-Dickens County Old Settlers rodeo, held in connection with the three-day celebration, is gaining momentum, according to John Stotts, rodeo manager. He said inquiries from rodeo contestants over a wide area had been received. Programs for the rodeo have been printed by the Tribune.

A meeting of Old Settlers Association directors held at Roaring Springs last week shaped plans for the reunion. This will be the 39th annual celebration.

Law enforcement officers have said that stricter control over drinking on the grounds will be in force this year, with outside officers aiding in the enforcement, if necessary. Some complaints have been registered in recent years.

Old Settlers rodeo has drawn large crowds with many declaring it to be one of the best in West Texas.

The usual program will be held this year, including a parade at 10 a.m. Thursday morning, August 23, memorial services at 11 a.m. and a program Tuesday afternoon. Two dances will be held each of the three nights and three rodeos are on schedule. A carnival of rides will provide entertainment for children and adults.

Perfect? Attendance Awards

Several of the 19 Lions members to receive perfect attendance awards failed to attend the Tuesday luncheon.

Rainfall Followed by Blistering Heat

HEAT moved into Texas after the soaking rains of July. The mercury climbed to 106 Monday, following 103 Sunday and 102 Saturday. Blistering southwest winds drove the blowtorch heat across the Panhandle much of the time.

Rain-soaked fields and range lands dried up rapidly and farmers said the dry weather would help eliminate the danger of cotton pests.

Many ranchers say range conditions have never been better at this time of the year. Grass is green and abundant throughout the ranching area (an unusual condition for August).

Matador residents are fighting the rapid growth of weeds and grass following the cessation of the rains. The hot, dry weather has not apparently started to restrain the growth of obnoxious vegetation.

Mosquitoes Menace

Another unusual result of the wet weather is the swarms of mosquitoes that are especially hungry. The pests come out at twilight and have caused many residents to wage a war against

waterholes, containers filled with rainwater and other breeding places of the insects. A plague of flies has also appeared since the advent of heavy summer rainfall and has resulted in extra measures in attempt to effect control.

The mercury reached 106 Tuesday and 104 yesterday. Weather forecasters have not promised any break in the heat wave in the immediate future.

**CITY ORDINANCE**

AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE BUILDING AND USE OF PRIVIES, SEPTIC TANKS, AND CESS POOLS IN THE CITY OF MATADOR, AND PROHIBITING THE USE OF CERTAIN TYPES IN CERTAIN AREAS.

Section 1. The term "sewer limits" shall be defined to mean within 250 feet of the line of the sewer system presently operated by the City of Matador.

Section 2. On or after September 1, 1962, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to build, use, operate or maintain within the sewer limits as herein defined, any cess pool, septic tank, or dry closet privy.

Section 3. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the above provisions of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction be fined in any sum, not less than \$10.00, or more than \$200. Each day the law is violated shall be a separate offense.

### Readers Urged to Study Amendments

Last week the Tribune started publication of the 14 proposed Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the general election, November 6. The Tribune urges study of the amendments which are being published in newspapers throughout the state.

(The printing is from mats and smaller than Tribune type, but the same mats were sent to all newspapers as a means of conserving space.)

A brief digest of the proposals follows:

No. 1 on the ballot (HJR 25)—Provides workmen's compensation insurance for the employees of all political subdivisions.

No. 2 on the ballot (HJR 9)—Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from \$47,000,000 to \$52,000,000.

No. 3 on the ballot (HJR 22)—Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins counties.

No. 4 on the ballot (HJR 46)—Provides for a state program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs.

No. 5 on the ballot (HJR 51)—Creates hospital districts and limits their power.

No. 6 on the ballot (HJR 36)—Authorizes retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for 12 years or more.

No. 7 on the ballot (HJR 13)—Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the legislature.

No. 8 on the ballot (HJR 7)—Establishes a ceiling of \$2,500,000 per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

No. 9 on the ballot (HJR 70)—Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus county and permits the Legislature to authorize the creation of two hospital districts in Brazoria county.

No. 10 on the ballot (HJR 12)—Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a public school board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivision thereof.

No. 11 on the ballot (HJR 25)—Authorizes resale of repossessed lands in the Veterans Land Fund, to any buyer, after having been first offered for resale to veterans.

No. 12 on the ballot (HJR 19)—Delegates limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tide-water limits thereof.

No. 13 on the ballot (HJR 6)—Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, major portion of which is in Dallas county, shall not be abrogated, amended or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorize the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

No. 14 on the ballot (HJR 32)—Provides for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government.
