Together with 2nd place win-

to enter State competition May  
5-7.

The Matador High School  
track team placed third in the  
Region I track and field e-  
vents, with 36 points in the  
various events. The Region  
meet is made up of all first  
and second place winners in  
the various District meets of  
the region, and extends from  
Brownwood to Dalhart.

Andy Fish placed first in the  
440-yard dash with a time of  
53.3 seconds. Bill Crenshaw tied  
for second in high jump with a  
leap of 5'10" then won the coin-  
toss to represent the region in  
the State meet. He was in the  
Region meet by virtue of win-  
ning a coin toss when three men  
tied for first place.

Gale Stafford won second  
place in the shot put with a  
heave of 46 feet plus. Fish won  
fourth place in the broad jump  
with a leap of over 20 feet. The  
440 yard relay team composed  
of Andy Fish, Clem Edwards,  
Guy Campbell and Robin Darsey  
won fifth place in this event. The  
same quartet won fifth place in  
the mile relay to garner some  
more points.

The students and sponsors  
will leave next Thursday morn-  
ing for Austin and will compete  
on Friday and Saturday.

## Judge Elbert Reeves Urges Students To Insure Future By More Education

"THE FUTURE can be made more secure," County Judge El-  
bert Reeves said Monday night, "by high school graduates con-  
tinuing with a formal education." He was the principal speaker  
at the annual Junior-Senior banquet held in the American Leg-  
ion building. It was the third time in succession that students  
have selected Judge Reeves as speaker at Junior-Senior ban-  
quets.

Title of his address was "The  
Challenge of Tomorrow," Judge  
Reeves said the subject may  
seem vague to thousands of stu-  
dents, but that they can bright-  
en the rest of their lives by drop-  
ping out of school.

"They not only lose but Amer-  
ica will lose, if a solution is not  
found," Judge Reeves said.

"You are either a part of the  
problem or the solution to it,"  
he said in explaining that of now,  
out of every 100 persons over  
65 years of age, 67 are depen-  
dent on someone, 28 are able  
and do work, and only five are  
able to live financially on what  
they have accumulated.

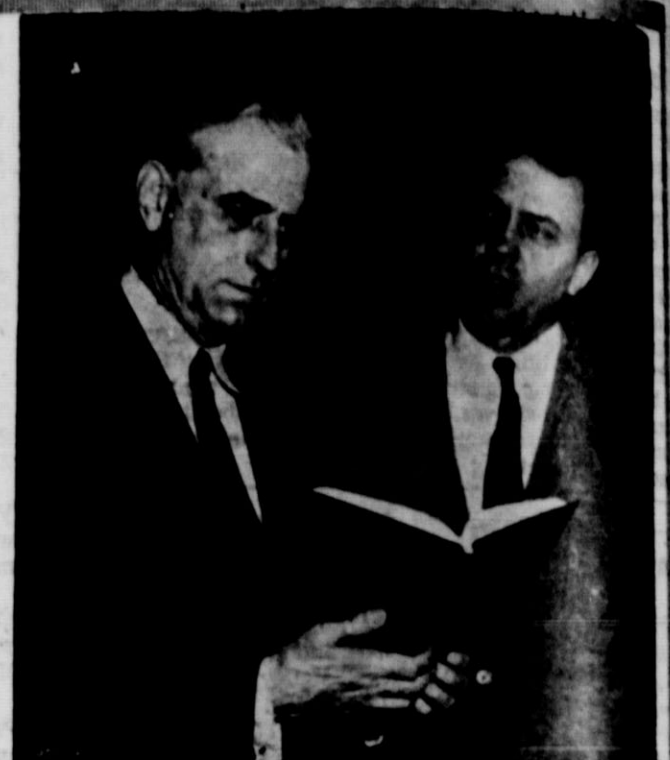
