A review of the outstanding Broadway play, "The Miracle Worker" by William Gibson was presented by Miss Sue Glenn, Thursday when El Progresso Study Club met in the home of Mrs. Forrest Campbell for its March 23rd meeting. Mrs. W. D. Lipscomb was program leader.

The leader introduced the program with the quotation, "Use what talent you possess. The woods would be silent if no birds sang but those which sang the best."

She stated that the truth of this aphorism would be borne out in the program, and presented Miss Glenn, who in her own gracious manner told of a girl and a child who, together created one of the great stories of the world.

The child was Helen Keller

and the girl, her teacher, Annie Sullivan. Miss Glenn, who with her sister, Mrs. J. L. Woodruff had attended the stage production in New York, unfolded the story of a modern miracle the miracle of the century, and brought to her audience, a realistic portrayal of the characters.

When at 19 months of age, Helen Keller lost sight and hearing and with them, all the resources of language, she was doomed to live as an animal, and shackled in mind and spirit she was a wild thing of rages and despair.

Annie Sullivan, herself blind in childhood, grew up in a state almshouse with derelicts and outcasts until she was in her teens. When she went to teach Helen, she was 21 years old and her task was staggering, to put a deaf, mute and blind child in touch with all that man has known and written.

Miss Glenn told in a very dramatic way, how this girl and the child struggled against and with each other to a final triumph.

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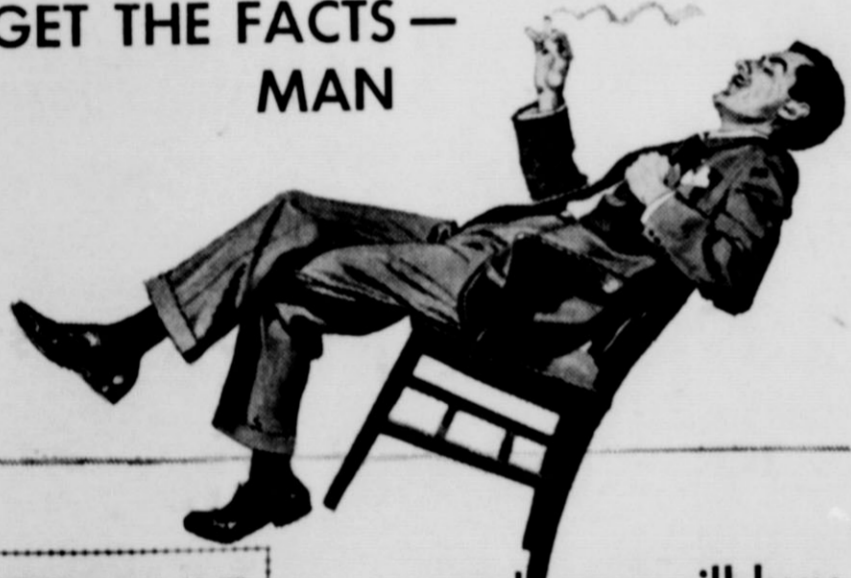
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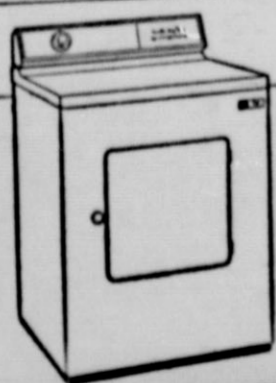

Approximately 18 women were present and a large number who were not able to attend, sent gifts. Mrs. George Kindle, mother of the honoree was a special guest.

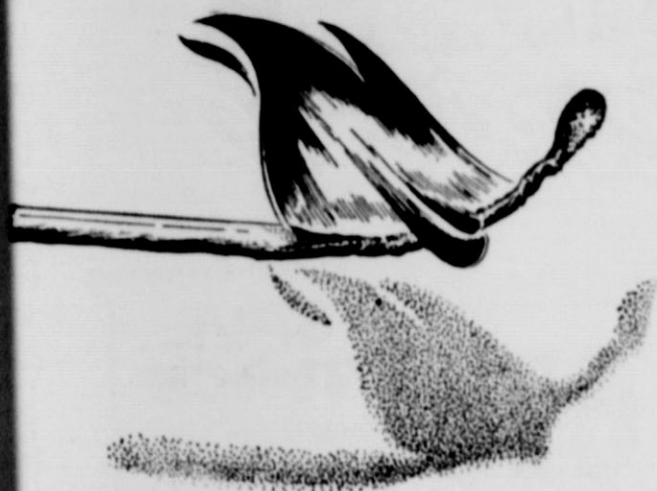
