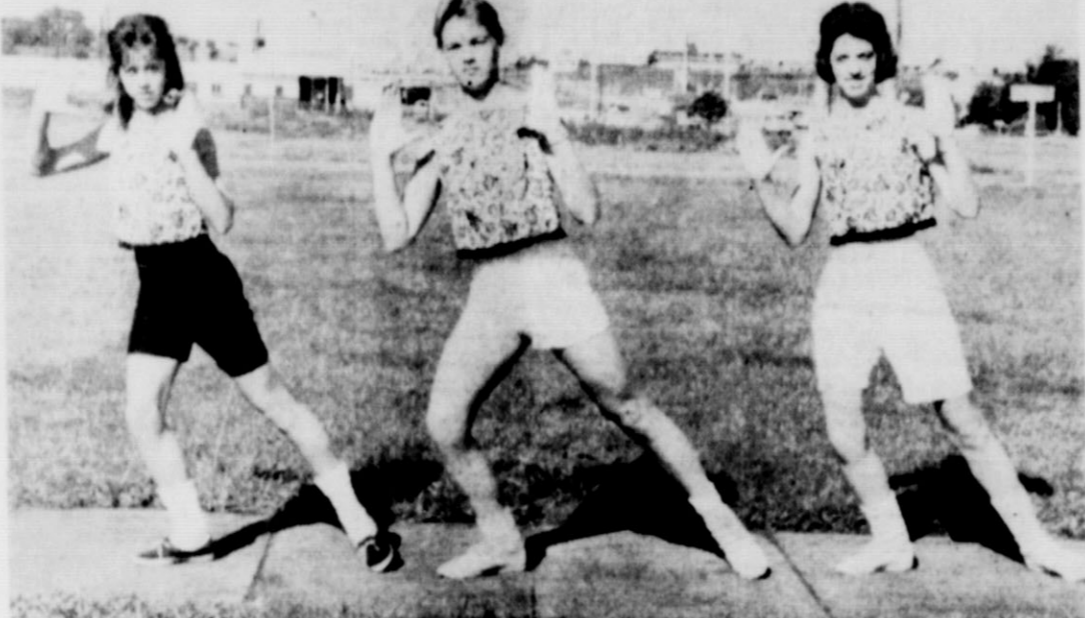

### MGM May Shoot Film in this Area from the Novel, "Twilight of Honor"

It may be Hollywood has suddenly become aware of the Texas Panhandle. Reports state two series, "Route 66" and "Rawhide" are planning to shoot in the Panhandle and last week the Amarillo Citizen reported the following:

Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's motion picture version of Al Dewlen's best-selling novel, "Twilight of Honor," very probably will be filmed in Amarillo. The studio learned from reliable sources last Wednesday.

William Perleberg, who will produce the story for MGM, and George Denker, who will write the screenplay, have confirmed they will visit Amarillo about September to pick up local talent and scout for shooting locations. Mr. Perleberg was quoted as saying, "I think it might be a colorful and do some shooting around Amarillo, instead of trying to simulate the locale in the studio lot."

The film is to be given major budget and a large budget. Perleberg is an Academy Award winning writer. He is presently making "The Hook," a Perleberg-Seaton production starring Kirk Douglas, a New York, is an attorney turned writer. He is the author of the hit play, "A Far Country" and also did the screenplay for Perleberg's current production.

Dewlen, contacted at his home in Amarillo by The CITIZEN, confirmed that filming of his best-selling novel here in Amarillo is a distinct possibility.

The author said he has been in contact with Denker concerning plans for the script. "Mr. Denker has said the producer is planning to do the picture in the Amarillo area, and that their visit here will be to determine if the idea is practical and advisable. It appears to me that Amarillo needs only to make a couple of favorable overtures, and we'll have it," Dewlen said. He added with a grin, "Maybe we ought to try catching up with Claude."

Paramount is presently filming "Hud Bannon," a modern western, at Claude.

Dewlen's novel, a smashing success which won the McGraw-Hill \$10,000 Fiction Award, was the January 1962 Book-of-the-Month Club selection and rode the national best-seller lists for three months, was purchased by more than last winter. The book, Dewlen's third, has just been published in Britain to rave reviews and was issued in a French translation in May. Two additional editions, one planned to coincide with the motion picture release, have been set by New American Library. His previous novels were "The Night of the Tiger," which also was a book choice and sold to pictures, and "The Bone Pickers," which is

soon to be re-issued from McGraw-Hill.

If "Twilight" is shot in Amarillo, it would become the third feature film produced in this area in recent years. A picture called, "The Sundowners," and starring Robert Preston, was made in Palo Duro Canyon a short time after World War II.

Mr. Dewlen, who lives at 4605 Matador Trail, was a newspaper man of several years experience, before taking up creative writing as a profession.

Dewlen was recently honored in New York and Chicago in connection with the book. He was the principal speaker for the annual banquet of the Society of Trial Lawyers in Honor of the Judiciary at the Mid-America Club in Chicago. The event was attended by 500 attorneys and sixty-seven judges. He spoke on "Censorship."

### Baptist Men will Hear Tulsa Pastor

Dr. Hultgren is considered one of the leading preachers of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Camp will begin at 6 p.m. with a conference of all church brotherhood presidents with Robert Chapman of Dallas, Associate Brotherhood Secretary of the State Convention. This will be followed by a barbecue supper at 7 o'clock, to be followed by the general assembly at 8 o'clock at which Dr. Hultgren will speak. Singing at the general assembly will be led by Beryl Lovelace, music director of the First Baptist Church, Littlefield. Lovelace will also present the special music.

The meeting will be presided

over by District Attorney John B. Stapleton of Floydada who is the District 9 Brotherhood President. Dr. Franklin E. Swanner of Plainview, District Missions Secretary, and Rev. John E. Rankin, pastor of Amherst Baptist Church, Amherst, and District Royal Ambassador Leader, will both appear briefly on the program.

District 9 of the Baptist General Convention of Texas is composed of approximately 200 Baptist churches on the South Plains and in the lower Panhandle.

When controls are necessary, he told the farmers, timing, using the correct amount of insecticide, coverage of plants and intervals between applications are all keys in a successful control program. For example, in late season boll weevil control, the plant must be covered with insecticide for 16-21 days, as this is the life cycle of the weevil.

If only one or two applications are used, less than 50% of the weevils will be controlled, as many are still in the bolls in the form of larvae which can not be reached. This can be done by using four to five applications at five-day intervals however, while the two applications are not economical.

In many cases one application of early season control can be very effective in weevil control. Weevils start laying eggs when the squares are about one-third grown. If adult weevils are present before the plant has shown this growth, most of the overwintered weevils will be killed.

The entire field need not be sprayed, as weevils move in from their hibernation quarters, and feed on the terminals of plants until there are squares for them to puncture and deposit eggs. Weevils do not move until their feed supply is exhausted, therefore the justification for spot spraying.

Thomas also presented a chart on the growth and fruiting habits of the cotton plant.

When weather conditions are good and no insect damage results, the plant puts on 86% of its blooms the first four weeks after the time the bloom is noted. Of this number, 94.1% of the blooms the first week are set, 77.7% of the blooms the second week set, 43.1% of the blooms the third week set, and 20.7% of the fourth blooms stay.

The bolls which mature from the blooms the first four weeks amount to 85.7% of the total crop, with 96.5% of the harvested crop resulting from the fruit set the first four weeks after the

bloom is noted. This clearly points out the importance of saving the early forms. (This information sheet may be secured from County Agent Bill Pallmeyer.)

Many other valuable tips on insect control were also presented, and may be obtained by contacting County Agent Pallmeyer.

Only one overwintered weevil was found, one lygus bug, several aphids, and some fleahoppers were noted, with the weather given credit for the absence of insects, but with favorable weather, insects can build up to damaging numbers.

The only way the farmer can prevent these infestations from building up to damaging numbers is to watch his field, and apply controls if warranted.

myself immediately, so the program can be explained fully. There is no charge for the birds, and deliveries will be made late this summer.

Some farmers are becoming alarmed by finding weevils in trees and on posts near cotton fields. In many cases this is the cottonwood weevil that does not feed on cotton nor damage it in any way. The way to distinguish between the cottonwood weevil and the boll weevil is to note the front legs. The boll weevil appears to have a spur on each front leg, while the cottonwood weevil does not. In some areas farmers have sprayed to control this insect that can't damage cotton.

Mrs. H. D. Marshall of Matador noted some worms were eating the leaves on mesquites near her house, and wondered if they would damage other plants. From the report I received, this worm is the Melipotis indomita, or similar to the army worm or cutworm. Their feeding habits are limited almost entirely to the mesquite, and therefore should not present a problem.

For members to qualify, there must be a minimum of 160 acres; and the land must be available for three years to develop the habitat. If supplemental feed is necessary, it must be provided, with all released birds provided feed for two weeks after release. In some cases shelters must be provided to protect the quail against their natural enemies, and no hunting of the released birds will be allowed until one year after the birds are released, as they are not fully mature, and will not reproduce until the following year. 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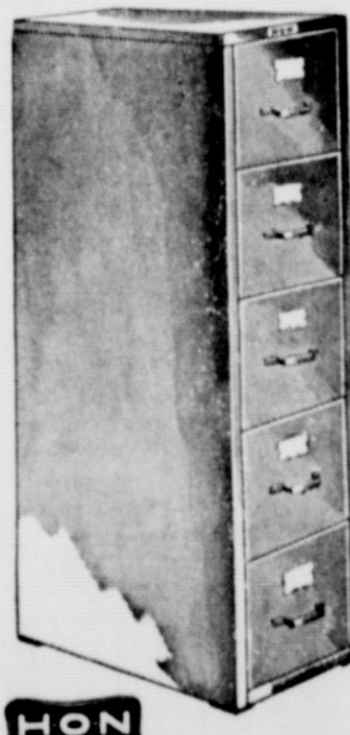
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## ROGER VINSON IS NAMED REPORTER FOR SCOUT CAMP

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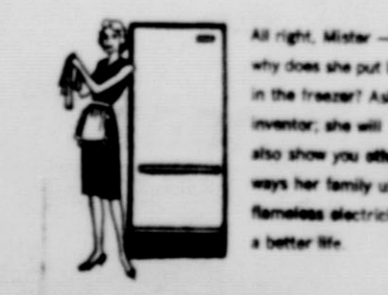


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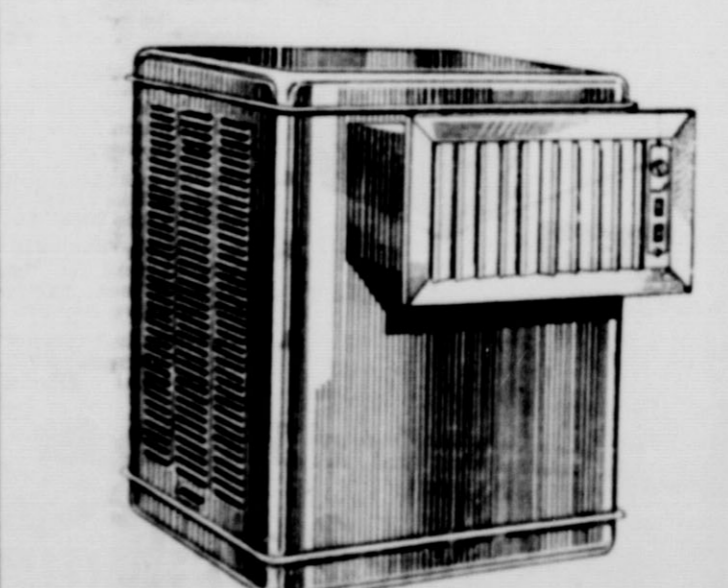
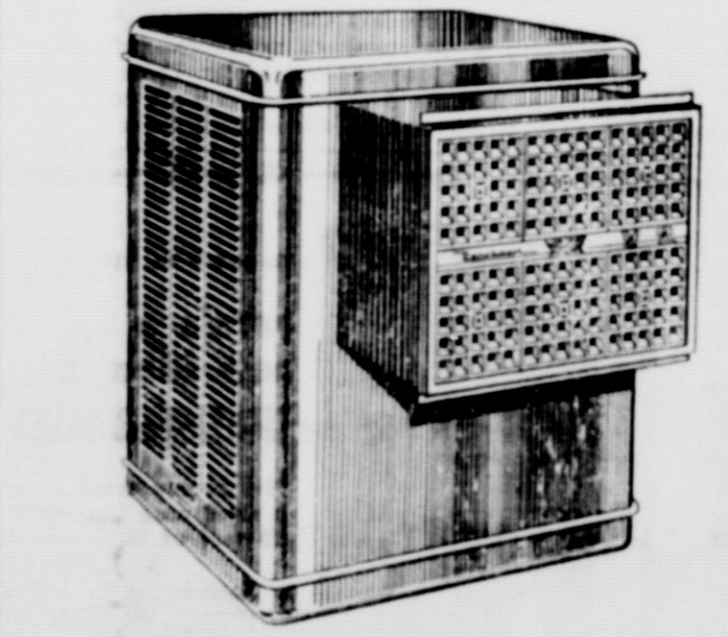
