He said "It doesn't happen that we have four wet years in succession. We have had three wet years. I don't mean by that that we will have a drought but merely that we will have less rainfall in 1961 than we had in 1960."

Church Schedules Speaker For TANE

A representative of Texas Alcohol-Narcotic Education, Inc., the Rev. Raburn R. Holton, who is also an Administrative Associate of the organization and Minister of the Gospel, will speak at the First Methodist Church, Sunday, January 8, at the 11 o'clock service.

Rev. Roy Patterson, pastor, in making the announcement of the special service extends a cordial invitation to everyone, to attend.

A native of Ennis, Texas, Mr. Holton served three years in the United States Air Corps. After several years in the business world, he was called to the ministry and graduated from Wayland College, Plainview.

He took his graduate work at Southwestern Theological Seminary in Fort Worth. He has studied at the Institute of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism at Loma Linda, Calif., and at Louisville, Ky.

Under the direction of the Executive Secretary, Dr. Albert Tucker, TANE carries on from the home office in Dallas, a year-round state-wide program of alerting, educating, and organizing individuals and groups for Christian abstinence and effective action against the liquor and narcotics traffic.

With the cooperation of 19 Christian denominations TANE works mainly through churches, schools, local option movements and the State Legislature.

True said he makes forecasts purely from percentages of records. The weatherman was introduced by Lion Frank Pohl who met him at Buzz Field airport. He flew to the field in a private plane.

True said he hopes to photograph a tornado from the plane and use the film on his television program.

Answering questions from Lions members Mr. True explained the greater rainfall in this area than the Amarillo area by the fact that the moist air from the Gulf of Mexico is lifted and cools to produce rain. He said the clouds are drier by the time they reach Amarillo.

He admitted that it was difficult to forecast weather in this particular area and he said we are located in a "geographic phenomenon" and that conditions change rapidly.

Asked about the effect of the space age on weather forecasting, he said we are at the beginning, in which many advances will be made. "We have the means," he said, "but it must be perfected. We are at about the same point aviation was when the Wright Brothers invented the airplane."

Mrs. W. F. Jacobs asked as to the best position to place a thermometer and Mr. True advised the north side of the house, with the location away from the wall.

Some Motley County farmers and ranchers are paying double the amount of income tax on certain items of their business than they should be paying, by failing to take advantage of capital gains treatment when possible, according to County Agent Bill Palmeyer.

To assist farmers and ranchers with these and other problems, a meeting has been set for Thursday night, Jan. 12, at 7 o'clock in the District Courtroom.

The federal government has announced that a new oral live-virus vaccine has been developed in the past year that is valuable in the prevention of paralytic polio. The vaccine was developed by Dr. Albert B. Sabin through the funds made available by the National Foundation.

Contributors and volunteer workers during the past years are credited with making the money available for the important discovery. The first great breakthrough, of course, was developed by the Salk vaccine released to the world five years ago.

Parents of school age children are reminded to have the series of vaccine shots for polio carried out as soon as possible. It is important to have the shots before the polio season advances any further. Fewer polio cases were reported last year but the fatality rate was higher.

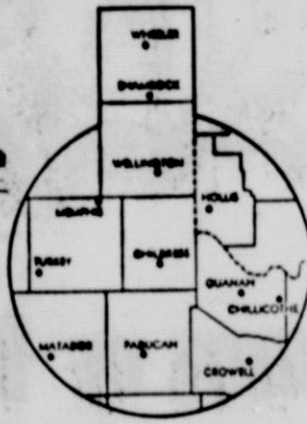
