

# KENNEDY IS ELECTED PRESIDENT

## Nixon Leads County, Loses Texas, Nation

EIGHT YEARS of Republican administration was brought to an end Tuesday as 65 million voters went to the polls in 50 states and elected Democratic John Kennedy as the next President of the United States. A Texan, Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, hit the political jackpot by being elected to two offices. He was swept back into office as Senator and elected Vice-President.

The nation voted Democratic, and Texas voted Democratic but Motley County gave Republican candidate Richard Nixon a majority of 41 votes. Nixon received 480 and Kennedy 439. Many Panhandle counties voted for the Republican Vice-President who sought the nation's top office.

The election was a photo-finish and kept news and television men up all night Tuesday night waiting for sufficient electoral votes to give Kennedy the victory.

**Large County Vote** Motley County had a large general election vote. The total was 1,027 but the highest number of votes for any single office was received by Sheriff Jinks Wilson. He received 911. Many ballots were voided because voters indicated more than one candidate for an office.

Totals were Kennedy-Johnson 439, Nixon-Lodge 480, Daniel 822, Ramsey 804, Wilson 811, Lyndon Johnson 647 (Tower, Republican candidate for Senator received 273), Robert W. Calvert 876, Smith 878, Greenhill 881.

McDonald 851, Robert S. Calvert 833, Sadler 822, James 833, White 829, Denton 892, Walter Rogers 889, Willborn 895, Ehrle 887, Stapleton 902, Wilson 911, Travecek 906, Clyde Gilbert 490, T. B. Simpson 53, Geo. Cullin 489.

Statewide all four constitutional amendments were approved. The vote in the county was No. one, 186 for; 298 against. No. two, 332 for and 194 against. No. three, 159 for and 372 against. No. four, 260 for and 256 against.

On December 25, 1939, Mr. Jacobs was married to the former Miss Vivian Estes at Matador. To this union was born a daughter, Laura.

Stray dogs are reported overrunning Matador and complaints have brought the city council to issue a warning that unvaccinated and unregistered dogs will be exterminated.

Dr. J. T. Westbrook, veterinarian of Paducah, will be in Matador Friday, November 18, between the hours of 1 p. m. and 4:30 p. m. to vaccinate dogs.

A city ordinance prohibits stray and unvaccinated dogs from being loose in town. Owners of unregistered dogs will be given an opportunity of a brief period to pay pound fees and vaccination and license fees, otherwise the animals will be exterminated, according to a notice made public this week.

### Community Chest Has Loan Feature

Community Chest paid out \$4 on local cases, paid the Boy Scout South Plains fees of \$240, paid \$80 to the Salvation Army, \$277.91 to the American Red Cross and provided \$300 national funds to the local Salvation Army.

Community Chest works on a loan basis at present with cases, and allows limited amounts until subsistence checks are received. The destitute cases are granted.

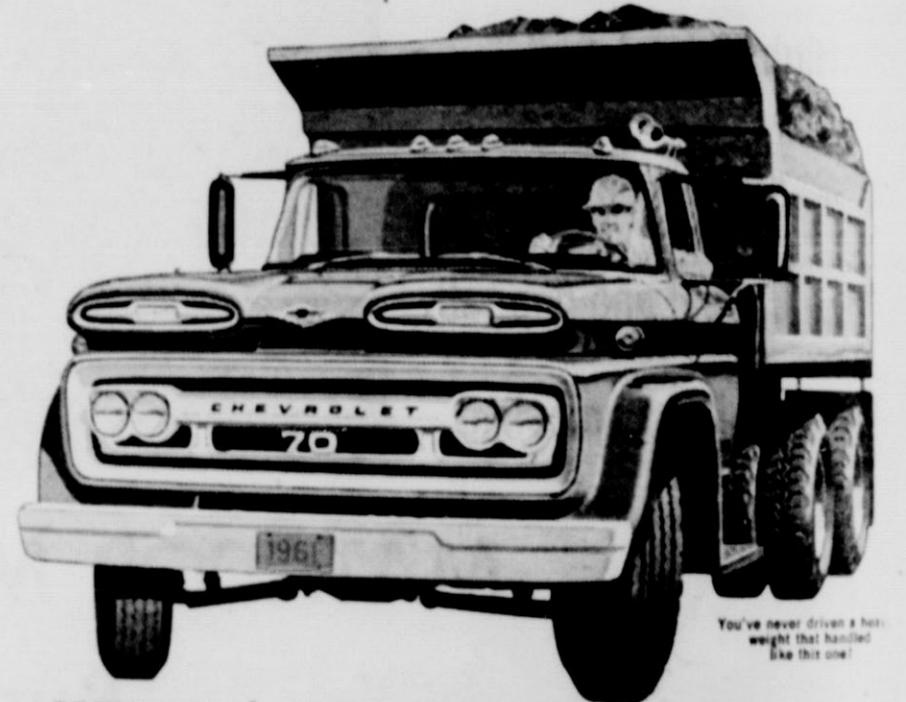

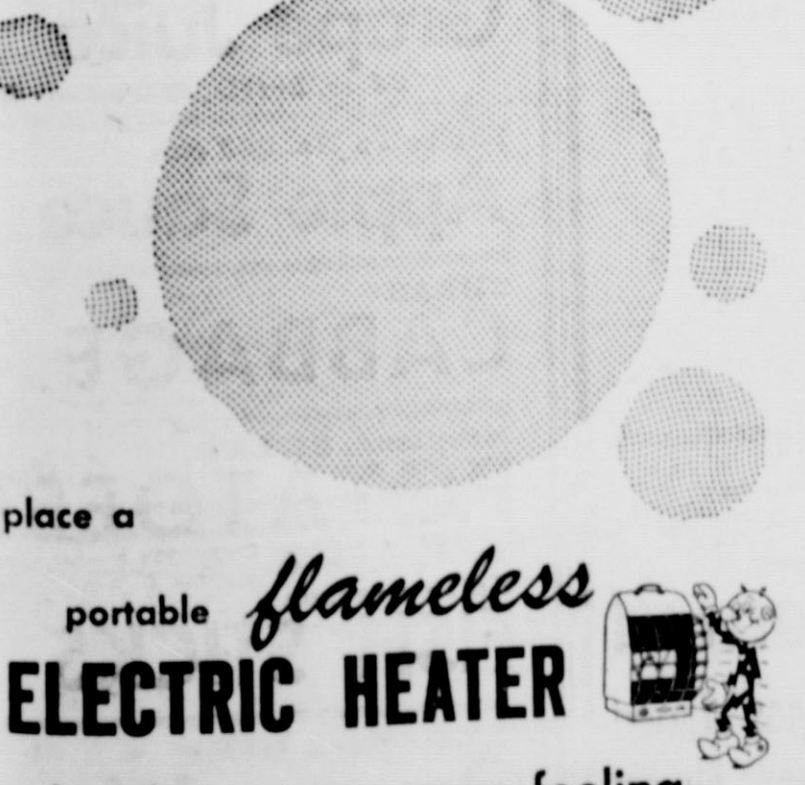
