FORMER RESIDENT KILLED IN WRECK

Friends and relatives from Matador drove to Seminole Tuesday to attend funeral services at 3 p.m. for Mat Wilely Fulfer, 38, of El Paso, who was killed instantly when the car in which he was riding overturned two times 28 miles northwest of Cheyenne, Wyoming Saturday. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Forster Fulfer of Seminole, former Matador residents, with whom his daughter, Miss Wilely Fulfer, lives.

Mr. Fulfer was a passenger in a car driven by James Warren Pruet, 35, of Glade Springs, Va., according to United Press International. The Wyoming State Patrol said Pruet lost control of the car on a curve and the vehicle overturned twice. Both men were thrown to the ground. Pruet received minor injuries but Fulfer died at the scene.

Born at Matador, November 8, 1922, Wilely Fulfer was reared here, moving with his parents to Seminole a number of years ago. Other survivors include the wife, three step-daughters, and two sisters, Mrs. Jake McKinley, El Paso, and Mrs. Ben Phifer, San Antonio. Going from here to attend the funeral were Mesdames Olive Russell and Velma Fulfer, Mrs. Ed Whitaker, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Edwards and Mr. and Mrs. Wade Berryman, Curtis Graham, Green Bostick and Mrs. Lewis Bostick, and Mrs. Ben Keltz, who accompanied her daughter and husband, Mr. and Mrs. James Holladay of Vernon.

COME TO CHURCH EASTER

City Begins New "Trouble System"

If you have any problems to discuss with the city administration, you are requested to call the city hall and ask City Secretary Nell Brotherton to place your request or suggestion on the council's agenda.

Each request will be numbered and will be considered in the order received, Mayor Bill Seale said this week.

"We are trying this system in an attempt to better serve the community," Mayor Seale said. "We want the people to make suggestions and we appreciate advice. We are new in office, but we feel that Matador belongs to the people who make their home here. It is also their privilege and responsibility to seek to improve conditions. We are merely in the position of administration of the wishes of the majority."

"Any logical suggestion for the benefit of Matador will receive our consideration. In event of an emergency situation, we will call a special meeting of the council, rather than wait for the regular meeting."

Mayor Seale said the council would appreciate all business concerning the city, be registered for consideration at the regular meetings, rather than individual approach to members.

Small Increase In Car Registration

Motley County car registration has shown a slight increase over 1959, according to records of Sheriff, Tax Assessor & Collector Jinks Wilson's office.

Compared with registrations a year ago Monday the county had seven more cars and 12 more trucks and pickups. Total cars registered on the same date was 918 in 1959 as compared with 925 Trucks and pickups registered on April 11, 1959, totaled 508 as compared to 520 Monday.

Methodists To Hear The Easter Story

Evening services Sunday at the First Methodist Church will highlight "The Easter Story" which will be presented by the choir in combined music and narration, beginning at 7 o'clock.

Tornado Spawns Death

DEATH spawned in a cyclone cloud struck about 8 p.m. Tuesday in the small West Texas community of Sunnyside and claimed three persons. More than two dozen were injured. Sunnyside is about 100 miles west of Matador.

The twister struck suddenly. The entire area had been under a storm alert from the US Weather Bureau for some time. A Baptist church in which a brotherhood meeting was in progress, was destroyed. The cyclone reduced half a dozen homes, a store, a gin plant and several dozen cars to a pile of rubble.

Another twister out of the same storm system hit Friona and injured three people when a trailer house was overturned.

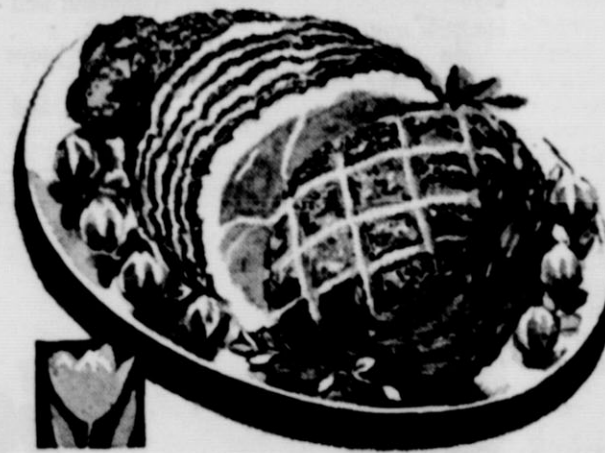
