**Vote Is
Only 104**

VOTERS avoided the polls Saturday in Motley County. The total vote (unofficial) in the county's seven boxes, was only 104. The one race (state) for the office of Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, attracted a small vote throughout the state. McDonald received 56 votes to incumbent Davidson's 48.

Only one absentee vote was cast and it was for Davidson. North Matador voted 9 McDonald, 8 Davidson; South Matador 19 McDonald and 16 Davidson; Whiteflat five McDonald and six Davidson; Flomot two McDonald and six Davidson; Northfield four McDonald and six Davidson; Roaring Springs 15 McDonald and three Davidson; Union Corner two and two.

It is believed to be one of the smallest county-wide votes in Motley County's recent history. The Tribune "goofed" by failing to publish an election story in last week's issue. Many qualified voters passed up the vote, however, because they were not interested in the race, or did not know anything about the candidates.

An unusual vote in the 2nd Democratic primary resulted in neighboring Dickens County where two candidates for the office of sheriff, tied with 792 each. A county race brought out the heavy vote. Some 25 counties in the state did not hold a 2nd primary election.

**Two Lions Honored
At Luncheon Meet**

HIGH TRIBUTE was paid Tuesday to two members of the Matador Lions Club at the regular luncheon meeting held in the basement of the Methodist Church. Lion J. R. (Rat) Whitworth was presented with an emblem for being "a good Lion" as a gift from Dist. 27-1 Governor. Zone Chairman J. E. Edwards was presented with a plaque after he had been selected "Lion of the Year" by a committee. Both members are well known for their years of service to Lionism.

Attendance at the Tuesday meeting was extremely low, being approximately half of the membership. Vice-President L. M. Cox served as chairman in the absence of Boss Lion Ben Edwards.

Two community-spirited Lions, Freddie Welling, Manager of West Texas Utilities local office and Bob Stanley, manager of Bob Stanley Pharmacy, reported on the Community Development Workshop meeting which they attended in Childress recently. The workshop was conducted by the West Texas Utilities Company.

Lion Stanley explained the remarkable growth of San Angelo as an industrial community. He said it was explained to those attending the workshop that Texas once an agricultural state, is now recognized as a manufacturing state. He said that through modern machinery the farms of Texas have lost half of their population, but are producing more products.

Lion Welling read a list of questions relative to a community being selected as a site for an industry and asked different Lions to answer the questions as they compared to Matador.

No action was taken at the meeting but interest was aroused by the program which could have far-reaching influence on the community.

**Rates to
Increase**

A PENNY postal card costs 3¢ and all other costs have advanced in sale of goods and services. The cost of operating Matador's municipal government is no exception. It is costing more to operate the water system, trash removal and sewer system, than the city takes in monthly in revenue.

Rates are going up, effective June 15. Water, sewer and trash removal will each advance 25¢ or a total of 75¢ for all three. The council meeting Tuesday night, approved the increase as a means of avoiding an increase in taxes at this time. Present water rates were established more than a quarter of a century ago.

Due to the past severe winter, paving on city streets is in bad condition and authorities have advised the council that the strip paving will be lost if it is not repaired this summer. The cost is estimated at \$4,000.

But the cost of operating the city has increased to the place that all available funds have been depleted.

Other neighboring cities have faced the same problem and solved it, at least partially, by an increase in service charges. Many have had higher rates for several years. Minimum water charges in Lubbock are \$2.40, Estelline \$2.50, Rail \$2.50, Crosbyton \$3, Clarendon \$2.50, Quitaque \$2.50 and Petersburg \$2.40.

DEPUTY RESIGNS

Jody Graham has resigned his place as deputy sheriff, it was announced this week by Sheriff Jinks Wilson. He had served as deputy for 3½ years. He will aid his mother in the management of her affairs. His father, the late, Curtis Graham, died of a heart attack ten days ago.

**Heart Attack Takes
Edinburg Educator**

Dr. James Bryan Speer Sr., 63, dean of Pan American College's School of Education at Edinburg since 1952, died at Grandview Hospital there Wednesday, May 25, following a heart attack on the previous Saturday.

Born at Dickens, Sept. 15, 1896, he was a brother of Flomot brother, Joe L. Speer. Another brother, John E. Speer of Amarillo also survives, in addition to his widow, two daughters and a son, and four step-children.

Dr. Speer went to Edinburg from Sul Ross College at Alpine, and prior to going there he had spent the years 1938 to 1946 as superintendent of schools at Canyon.

He was a member of the First Methodist Church in Edinburg, a member of the Masonic Lodge, of Phi Delta Kappa at Texas U., and was a member of the Texas State Teachers Assn., and both the American and Texas Assn. of School Administrators. He was listed in Who's Who in American Education.

**Two Malador Men
Injured Recently**

Two Matador men, closely associated as friends were injured recently in unrelated accidents.

The two, L. H. Dirickson and D. E. Pitts Sr., were on a fishing trip at Cowles, N. M. when Dirickson slipped on a rock as he was returning to the cabin about noon on Wednesday, May 25. His right arm was broken at the elbow, and Pitts conveyed him to Santa Fe to a bone specialist, who put the arm in a cast. The men returned home the following day.

Last Friday evening late, Mr. Pitts climbed up on his garage to remove a tree limb that was scraping the roof, lost his footing and fell about seven feet to the ground, face down. Ligaments were pulled loose in his chest and he sustained several broken ribs. He was treated at Stanley Hospital, where he was fitted with a tight "harness."

The cast was removed from Mr. Dirickson's arm at Stanley Hospital Monday.

**Myron Bethard Visits Here On Emergency
Leave From France; Mother Dies In Calif.**

CWO Myron G. Bethard has been on an emergency leave from his station in France, due to the illness and death of his mother, Mrs. Evelyn L. Gifford, 72, of Durham, Calif.

He left France on May 18, aboard a jet airliner, arrived in San Francisco the following day and was with his mother when she died May 24.

En route to Fort Dix to return to France, the Warrant Officer stopped here for a short visit during the week end with his parents-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Tilson. His wife, the former Eugenia Tilson, remained in France with their five children, Noilene, Jaunice, Stephanie, Myron and Wallace.

Daughter Is Commended

In a school bus accident between Verdun and Nancy, France in March, Jaunice Bethard, 10, displayed unusual coolness and assisted her classmates in their escape from the bus which had overturned.

She later received a letter of appreciation from the Commanding Captain of the US Army 582nd Transportation Company, located on the base, commending her for her assistance.

In telling of the accident in a letter to her parents here, Mrs. Bethard related, "...the accident happened when the bus blew a right front tire, went off the road into a muddy ditch and turned up on its right side. This blocked the front door and the driver had to go out a window and open the rear exit.

"There was only one little girl that was hurt very badly. We all thanked God that it was not serious." Both Jaunice and her sister, Stephanie, were on the bus.

"The 'Letter of Appreciation' dated April 22, to Jaunice from James E. Martin, Captain, said in part:

"It has been reported to me, through the media of official reports, that you conducted yourself in a manner which you may be proud, during and immediately following the bus accident which you and your fellow students were involved in on 29 March 1960.

"It has specifically been reported to me that you, on your own initiative, presented a very calm attitude during this incident and in fact, re-assured all of the other children that there was no danger of fire and that no one should get excited, thereby preventing injury to themselves or the other students during evacuation of the wrecked bus."

"The above action on your part was such that you are to be commended and certainly indicates that you possess traits of calmness and maturity during emergencies which is far beyond that which could be expected of a person your age.

"For this action I would like to express my sincere appreciation in that it very likely prevented serious injuries or shock among the other children. (signed) James E. Martin, Captain, Commanding."

Minister Bob Harp Leaves Texas to Accept California Church Assignment

MINISTER BOB HARP has resigned his position as associate minister of the College Church of Christ in Abilene to preach full-time for the Culver Palms Church of Christ in Culver City, California.

With his wife, Jackie and sons, Scotty and Minister Harp visited here last week with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Harp, went from here to Lubbock to visit his brother and family, Mr. and Mrs. Nor-Harp, before continuing to the west and his new pastorate.

The following article was first published by Bob Phillips, pastor of the Abilene Reformed Church, Matador youth. Young Harp was associate minister of the Broadway Church of Christ in Lubbock for three years, while working on a degree at ACC.

Two-and-a-half years, with time out for two years in the service. Transferring to ACC, Harp was here until 1951, and that spring was offered a summer job at Camp Shiloh, Mendham, N. J.

"The camp is mainly for youngsters from New York City and some adjacent areas, and it seems to do them a lot of good," Harp comments, "but I think that I received more help than anyone else that summer, from a spiritual standpoint."

Children Become Relaxed

Camp Shiloh is a former mansion with 52 rooms, and the country life there is wonderful for boys and girls from the city. "They came there tense, nervous and bitter," Harp said, "and in just a week or two we saw them become much more relaxed and more likeable."

The seeds which had been planted at ACC took root at Camp Shiloh. When Harp was offered a "temporary" job in New York City's east side by Eddie Grindley, the camp director, he took it, planning to stay for three months. Instead, he stayed for two years.

Harp's work consisted at first in helping to establish a Church of Christ on 83rd St., and in trying to keep contact with

young people who had been at Camp Shiloh.

Wife Is Counsellor

In 1952, he returned to Camp Shiloh as assistant director, and in December of that year he and Jackie LeCoutre, whom he had met in 1951 at the camp, where she was also working as a counsellor, were married in the Camp Shiloh chapel.

Their's was the first marriage to be solemnized there, though there have been a number since.

Wildwood Church of Christ in Mendham, which is about three miles from the camp, also began using the chapel as its church.

When Bob and Jackie married, they set up housekeeping in the second floor of the church mission building, which was a former funeral parlor. Their "apartment" was the room where caskets had been displayed in former years.

About a month later they moved to a tenement section about two blocks from the Bowery, and lived there the remainder of the time they were in New York.

Following another summer in Camp Shiloh, the Harps moved to Millbridge, Me., about 60 miles from the Canadian border, where Bob had the full responsibility of a church for the first time.

"They are wonderful people up there, but anyone who moves in is considered as something of a stranger, no matter how long he stays there," Harp commented about the area.

Helped By Texas Church

The Millbridge church had only about 45 members, and Harp received part of his support from the Southside Church of Christ in Fort Worth.

When Harp moved from Millbridge to Bangor in 1955, his position was taken over by Charles Huffman, another ACC ex-student whose home had been in Fort Worth.

The Harps' first child, John Scott (Scotty), was born while they were in Millbridge. He was less than a year old when the family moved to Bangor.

Harp spent a year doing general church work in Bangor, then moved back to Texas as associate minister of the Broadway Church of Christ in Lubbock.

He spent three years, working mostly with young people.

The Harps' second child, Eric, was born in Lubbock in 1957. Bob had been looking for an opportunity to get back to Abilene, and when he had the chance to become associate minister at College Church, he took it.

But his goal is still the mission field, even though he enjoys his work here. He just feels that he is called for the other field.

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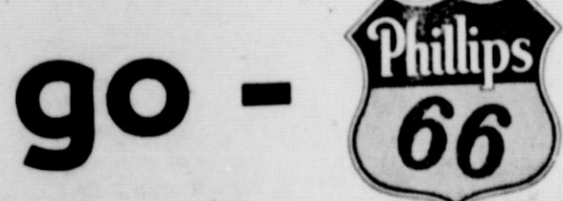
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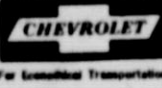

The increased costs for labor and chemicals used in operating the laboratory were listed as primary cause for the rate increase.

most convenient method for determining fertilizer need, and as a guide for investing more profitably in a lime and/or fertilizer program.

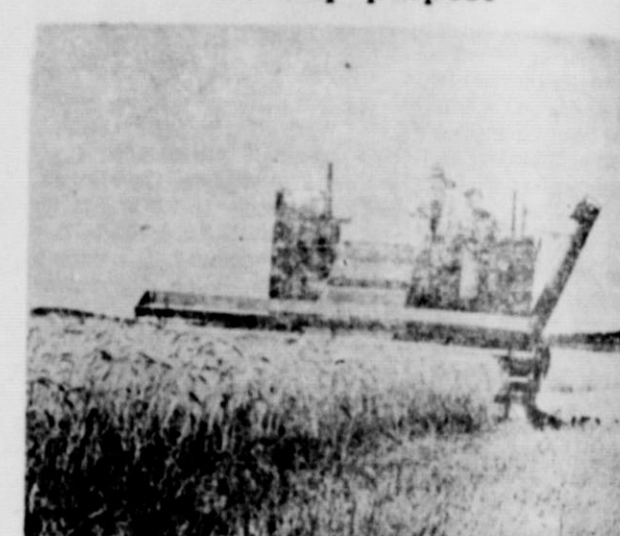
