Letter to a Driver

As schools open again this year, Matador and other youngsters over the nation will be on the streets. The following is copied as a reminder to drivers to use extra caution.

"A few weeks ago, I saw a little girl struck by a car as she tried to cross the street. I saw a father race toward her and hold her to him as she struggled in the agony of death. I saw all the plans that had been made crumble and I saw the look of despair that came over his face. I could only offer a prayer that such a thing might never happen again.

"Today my daughter, who is six years old, started off to school. Her cocker spaniel, whose name is Scott, watched her leave and whined his belief in the folly of education.

"Tonight we talked about school. She told me about the girl who sits in front of her, the girl with yellow curls, about the boy across the aisle who makes faces, about the teacher who has eyes in the back of her head, about the trees in the school yard, and about the big girl who does not believe in Santa Claus.

"We talked about a lot of things, some important, some unimportant.

"When her doll gets broken, or her finger gets cut, or her head gets bumped, I can fix them. But when she starts across the street, then Mr. Driver, she is in your hands.

"Much as I wish I could, it's not possible for me to be with her all the time. I have to work to pay for her home, her clothes and her education.

"So, Mr. Driver, please help me to look out for her. Please drive carefully. Please drive slowly past schools and intersections. And please remember that sometimes children run from behind parked cars.

"Please don't run over my little girl."

Ray Cullin Is Lions Speaker

MUCH-PUBLICIZED MISSILE GAP is a fault in U.S. technology and not alarming, according to Ray Cullin, of Hollywood, Calif., nationally-known NBC television newsman, principal speaker Tuesday at the regular meeting of the Matador Lions Club and son of Mr. and Mrs. George Cullin of Matador. "Our scientists produced a bomb so compact that there was no need for the great "thrust" which Russia was forced to develop to carry their much heavier instrument. The result was an advantage to Russia in orbiting a large space ship," Cullin declared.

Ray Cullin left Amarillo's KGNC about a year ago for the west coast where his advancement has been meteoric. He is frequently on national television news and radio broadcasts and he is recognized as one of the ablest newsmen in the country.

"We did not think about the necessity of a larger booster," Cullin said, "but the entire space effort is at about the same point as was aviation when the Wright brothers first took their plane off the ground and I am convinced the X-15 joint operation flight of Bob White is more significant than Russia's latest achievement.

"He flew his plane 54 miles away from the earth at speeds of as much as 4,000 miles per hour. He was able to bring it back and land it much as the landing of conventional plane.

"On the other hand the Russian's two-man shot did not indicate any change from the first orbital shot. There is perhaps no great deal of reason for wanting to reach the moon except the developments that will come out of the knowledge... we have in process thrusts seven times as great as the Russians have developed and if a human foot is ever placed on the surface of the moon it will be through the efforts of our technology.

"Strong faith has made our nation strong," Cullin said, "and it will continue to be guided by a Greater Hand to remain ahead.

The views of Scott Carpenter who saw the Handiwork of God in space are to be compared with the Russian who said he did not see any evidence of God in space. The greatness of this nation was born and has endured through faith..." Cullin was introduced by Lion J. E. Edwards.

lege scholarship, a trip to 4-H Congress at Chicago, or many other valuable awards, a record is a must. Instructions on record keeping have been given to all 4-H members, and assistance may be secured from adult leaders, junior 4-H leaders and myself. This year, 11 senior records were submitted, and are being judged for district honors.

Many Motley County farmers used fertilizer this year, and now is a good time to note results. If there is a yellowing down the midrib of leaves, nitrogen is needed. If there is a purple case of leaves, phosphorus is needed. If the tips and margins of the leaves are yellow, potash is needed. A soil test is important for the determination of needs, and this observation test will show if enough plant food is being applied. Proper fertilization will increase net profits.

I attended the State Convention for County Agricultural Agents in Dallas Aug. 9-11. Purpose of these meetings is to strengthen the programs in the different counties, and to enable the agent to serve the people of the county more efficiently.

From time to time, district meetings are called to present new findings to agents. This information is then passed on to the people of the counties for their use.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:
