

"Our scientists produced a bomb so compact that there was no need for the great "thrust" which Russia was forced to develop to carry their much heavier instrument. The result was an advantage to Russia in orbiting a large space ship," Cullin declared.

Ray Cullin left Amarillo's KGNC about a year ago for the west coast where his advancement has been meteoric. He is frequently on national television news and radio broadcasts and he is recognized as one of the ablest newsmen in the country.




