Plans Complete for County Polio Drive

THREE DROPS of colorless, tasteless liquid on a cube of sugar. That's all there is to it. A few seconds of time may save someone a life of pain, deformity, agonizing death. That is the purpose behind the largest drive in Motley County's history-a drive to immunize 2,000 to 3,000 persons within five hours here Sunday afternoon.

Final plans have been made for the mass effort to banish polio forever from the boundaries of Motley County. A meeting will be held this afternoon to check lastminute arrangements.

MOST IMPORTANT factor in the drive is for everyone to take the vaccine. While polio has been known as an enemy of children, people of all ages have suffered its misery. Anyone, any age may be a carrier and to stamp out the virus everyone must cooperate.

The vaccine center is the American Legion Building here in Matador. The time is 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday, September 16.




