Plans Complete for County Polio Drive

THREE DROPS of colorless, tasteless liquid on a cube of sugar. That's all there is to it. A few seconds of time may save someone a life of pain, deformity, agonizing death. That is the purpose behind the largest drive in Motley County's history—a drive to immunize 2,000 to 3,000 persons within five hours here Sunday afternoon.

Final plans have been made for the mass effort to banish polio forever from the boundaries of Motley County. A meeting will be held this afternoon to check last-minute arrangements.

MOST IMPORTANT factor in the drive is for everyone to take the vaccine. While polio has been known as an enemy of children, people of all ages have suffered its misery. Anyone, any age may be a carrier and to stamp out the virus everyone must cooperate.

The vaccine center is the American Legion Building here in Matador. The time is 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday, September 16.

Pilot Walks Away When Plane Burns

A 24-year-old Silverton crop dusting pilot walked away from a plane crash five miles north of Flomot Saturday morning with only minor burns.

A wing was torn off his Piper plane and the craft burned. Kenneth Payne, the pilot, was spraying cotton on the Jimmy Reid farm when his plane struck an REA pole guy wire, witnesses said.

Bursts Into Flames

According to witnesses, the plane crashed and almost immediately burst into flames. Payne reportedly broke through the canopy, emerged through the flames and leaped to safety. He was protected by a crash helmet and heavy clothing.

Reid, Gary Edwards, who was working as "flag boy" on the project, and young Edwards' father, Eddie Edwards, witnessed the crash and rushed to the scene.

Payne was taken to a Silverton clinic for treatment of minor burns about the face and was dismissed. He said he was banking for a turn and did not see the guy wire. The plane cartwheeled when it hit the wire.

The accident was investigated by Motley County deputies S. A. Conway and Eld D. Smith. The plane belonged to Farris Martin and Bill Long of Silverton. It was declared a total loss.

Blast Jars Town; Two Men Injured

Two Matador men narrowly escaped death or serious injury Sunday afternoon, when a blast "which many said sounded like a 'sonic boom' jarred Matador.

G. W. Brinsfield, owner of Brinsfield Courts at the west edge of Matador on US Highway 70, and Bob Jameson, truck driver for the Freeman Thacker L-P Gas Company, were treated at Stanley and released.

Brinsfield and Jameson were cleaning a gas refrigerator. They had previously turned off the gas and checked for the possibility of any type of flame.

Mr. Brinsfield was standing just outside the door of one of the rooms in the court and Mr. Jameson was inside proceeding with the cleaning of the refrigerator at the time of the explosion.

Door to the room was splintered by the explosion. Mr. Jameson was hurled or managed to get out of the door in the wake of flame.

Accumulated gas exploding between the ceiling and roof of the building wrecked the ceiling in six courts and damaged much of the furniture.

There was some fire after the blast but it was extinguished with a garden hose without calling the Matador Fire Department.

Source of the flame that ignited the gas is not known. No estimate as to the extent of the damage was available.

Gain Is Noted in Church Attendance

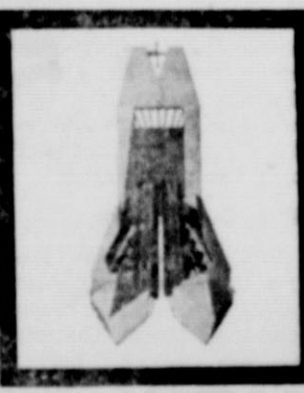

George Knerim is 48 and has had 20 years experience in irrigation, much of it with the Pima Indians in Arizona. His home is in Chandler. His experience exactly fits his present assignment in India where he has been employed by the Indian State government for seven years, in Iraq, Nepal and now in India.

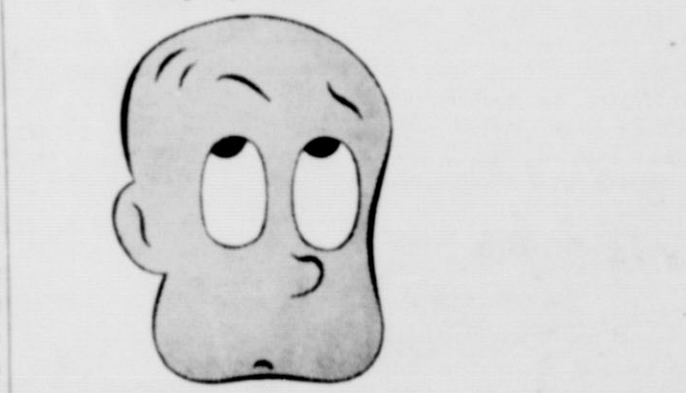

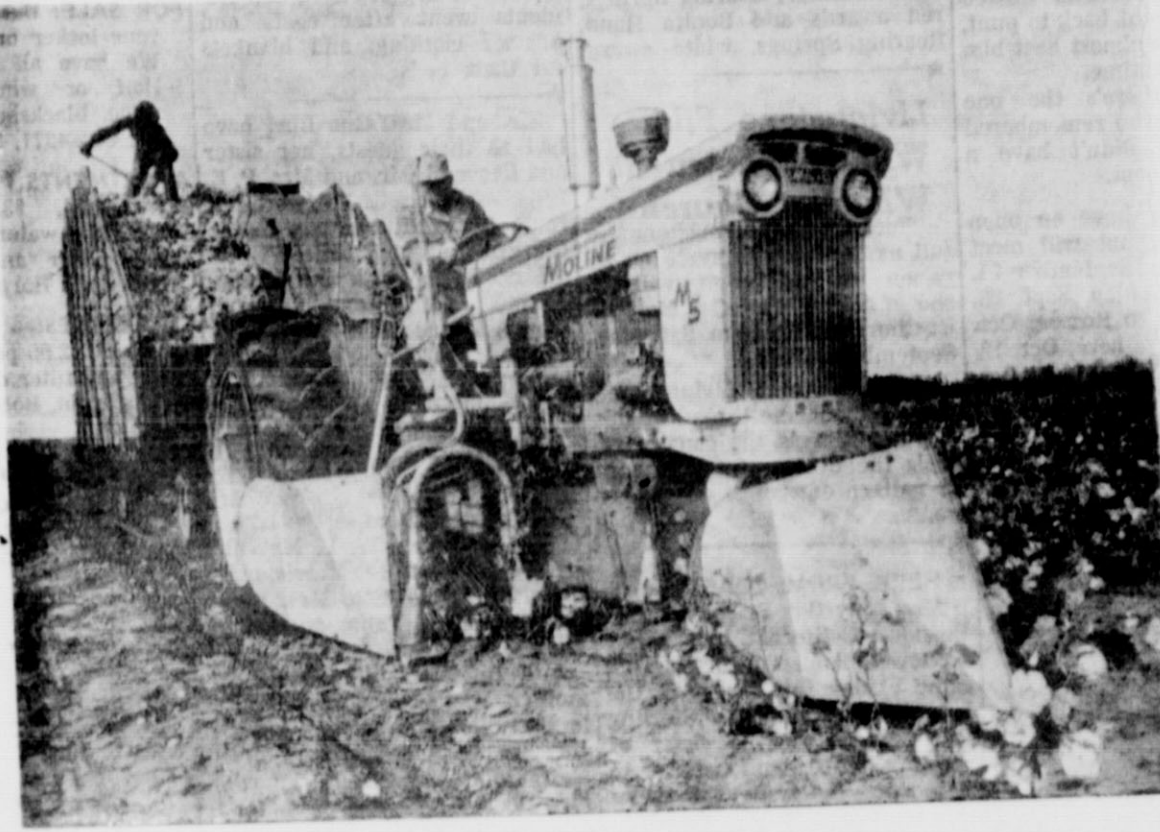

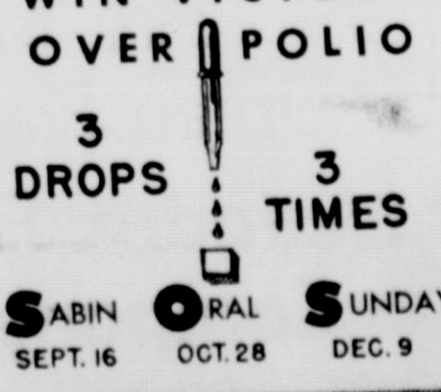

Charlie Scaff, Acting Postmaster, has announced that 1962 Acreage Survey cards will be distributed to patrons of Matador about September 13.
 The Post Office Department assists U.S.D.A. in making this survey each year. These reports, directly from farmers, are the basis for official estimates for Texas acreage of all crops harvested in 1962.
 To be sure this community is well represented in the survey, Postmaster Scaff urges each farmer patron receiving a card to fill it out and return it to post office or mailbox.
