Forgeries End with Young Boy's Arrest

A GUTHRIE school boy turned in his books Tuesday. He will not need them any more. Books are furnished at the Gatesville boys' school of correction. The boy is 15.

He will be tried here Friday for the forgery of six checks, totaling \$87. Four of the forged signatures were on Ira Brooks of Paducah and two on Jim Pollard. Four of the forged checks were passed at the McDonough concession stand at Old Settlers, one at the Fina Station here and one at Campbell Chevrolet.

The boy had previously been released as a juvenile delinquent to his parents because of a burglary incident.

Sheriff Jinks Wilson solved the case which had left the string of checks without any apparent trace. The boy admitted writing the checks when confronted by Alfred Watson, operator of the Fina Station and Sheriff Wilson.

An attempt is being made to place the boy in Boy's Ranch. Sheriff Wilson said that all of the men who lost money on the forged checks offered to make any concession if it would help the boy escape a future of crime.

The case will be tried in County Judge Elbert Reeves' court. It is assumed that in event Boy's Ranch will not take the youth, he will be sent to Gatesville since there is no alternative as far as the law is concerned. Because of the previous burglary incident the boy sentenced himself by forging names on checks. If he is sent to Gatesville the term will be for six years.

The youth was released into the custody of his parents who are responsible for bringing him here Friday morning for trial.

First Bale Ginned

FIRST BALE of 1960 cotton reported in Motley County was ginned by D. P. Keith and ginned about 5 p.m. Wednesday, August 31, by the Red Ball Gin at Roaring Springs.

The 512-pound bale was ginned from 1880 pounds of pulled Lankart 57 cotton, from about 12 acres. Mr. Keith, whose farm is about 3 miles southeast of Matador said he believed two or three more bales are open in the same field of early cotton.

The bale of cotton was purchased by the gin at 40c per pound. The seed were also purchased at \$40 per ton rate. Caldwell Smith, manager of the gin, said he believed the cotton would grade strict middling 1-1/2 inch. It was rated on the market at about 32.97c per pound. Mr. Smith said merchants are contributing to a gift fund as is the custom for the first bale ginned each season.

Red Ball Gin processed a second bale early Monday. It was grown on irrigated land by Chas. Long, about 3 miles north-west of Roaring Springs. The bale of 2070 pounds of pulled half and half cotton produced a 625-pound bale.

First Bale Here

First bale ginned in Matador was also raised by D. P. Keith. Yesterday morning the West Texas Gin here ginned 2550 pounds of pulled cotton to produce a 660-pound bale. The 1120 pounds of seed sold at the rate of \$40 per ton.

Ernest Elliott, gin manager said he would guess the cotton to class middling 15/16.

City May Build Swimming Pool

The City of Matador may build a swimming pool to be financed through revenue bonds. The project was discussed Tuesday night at the regular meeting of the council.

Mayor Bill Seale said there has been much interest in a pool as means of providing recreation for young people here as well as adults.

In event the pool is built, the money for its construction would be derived through a revenue bond issue. The bonds would be paid through revenue derived from the pool and would not affect the present tax structure, nor would property be taxed to pay the indebtedness.

Mayor Seale said the street re-capping work will get under way next week and that several blocks of new streets will probably be built by the property owners. Several others are planning curb and guttering.

Anyone interested in any type of paving including driveways, streets, curbs and gutters, etc. are requested to call the city hall.

The score was 32-0 in favor of the Matadors. It was the third straight time the Matadors have shut out Silverton and the team's seventh win in a row over the Owls.

The Matadors mounted another drive in the second period but were halted on the Silverton 3-yard line. The halftime score was 16-0.

Chained Locomotive Threat Brings Check

IT NEVER REALLY HAPPENED, but T. T. Bouldin, attorney for the Motley County Railroad once threatened to chain a locomotive at Roaring Springs to the track if claim against the Q&P Railway was not paid at once. The claim was paid.

The incident is from the archives of memory of R. D. Jones, pioneer lumberman of this area who returned Aug. 25 to attend Old Settlers Reunion at Roaring Springs.

Jones, whose current address is a Cattle Hotel, Paducah, Mo., was the incident in a letter to the Roaring Springs Old Settlers Association. Excerpts from the letter, which preceded the incident, are as follows:

"I bought the H. H. Hardin lumber yard in Paducah and operated the R. D. Jones lumber yard until 1921. I also put in a lumber yard in Roaring Springs when that was opened up. I had several years of material on the first train that arrived in Roaring Springs and rode the train as a passenger with D. E. Decker of Roaring Springs when that was my general attorney for the 'Q' for years. I had the first closed lumber yard in Matador on the south corner of the square.

"I was on the site of Roaring Springs, along with my yard master, A. K. Hall and his friend, Victor Chalk, before the townsite was ever laid out. I remember that quail was plentiful that year and on week ends Roy Carter's restaurant in Matador was overflowing with hunters. Everyone was served quail.

"About the time the 'Q' was extending into Roaring Springs I was visited by a committee of leading ranchers and townsmen with a request that I buy \$500 stock in the Motley County Railroad Co. I suggested that I had rather donate a check for \$250 whereupon my good friend A. B. Echols said: 'We won't accept that. We have assessed you to buy this amount.' I gave the check and the stock came along later.

"I do not remember what was the final destination of that stock. As hard times began to overtake me, I remember giving the stock to my wife as a birthday gift. It was becoming of doubtful value then and when it became a total loss, I may have swiped it and burned it so

that my wife would not learn of its real worth.

Sells Crossties
"When the contracts for the crossties were opened, I was low bidder and furnished all the crossties for the Motley County Railroad. On the morning bus from Matador on the morning bus from Paducah.

"We hauled lumber for the Matador yard to a spot in the lane east of Roaring Springs townsite and I slept in a tent at the location before the town was opened.

"I financed the addition of a second and third story to the frame hotel which stood about the middle of the block on the west side of the square in Matador. This enterprise did not pay off and I was forced to take over the building and I never recovered all of my investment.

"After Roaring Springs had opened up and I had built the large, closed shed yard in Matador, I shipped sheet iron by local freight from Paducah to cover the building.

"The Paducah agent did not know that the 'Q' and Motley County Railroad had not been able to agree on a division of freight rates. The 'Q' took the shipment to Roaring Springs for storage. My lumber was wetted from the rains and elements, and one day T. T. Bouldin, with two or three of the directors of our railroad, came to me and wanted me to sue the 'Q' for damages for carrying a shipment beyond the junction point and holding it.

"I did not want to sue but was admonished by these good customers of mine that I had better sue.

"Whereupon T. T. Bouldin interceded that I need not be bothered with the suit since my local manager could testify to the facts.

"The case was appealed to the Supreme Court and affirmed. One day T. T. Bouldin asked me if I had ever gotten my money from the 'Q'. After my negative reply, he asked me to his office in the bank building, and called officials of the 'Q' at Quannah and advised them that he would chain down a locomotive at Roaring Springs at noon if the judgement was not paid by 11 a.m. that day. The 'Q' gave him most of the time back. The money or credit was wired to the bank in ample time.

"This angered the Q&P and from that time on, I was required to pay all freight in currency. This operation resulted in the 'Q' receiving all the small change I could muster as payment for freight.

"On August 1 that year I received notice that four demand notes of \$3,000 each would mature on September 1, at the expiration of 30 days notice. I was never able to recover from the emergency and the Kirby Lumber Company caused me to deed the yard currently invoiced at \$50,000 net worth to them. They in turn sold the yards to the line yards of the area and they were dismantled.

"These are some of the highlights of the memories that have crossed my mind since reading the account of the Old Settlers reunion. I expect to arrive in Matador on the morning bus from Paducah.

Early Filing of Social Security Claims Advised

Advance filing of claims for social security benefits is now being encouraged according to an announcement today by John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security district office. Mr. Hutton explained that early filing of applications for retirement benefits will result in prompt receipt of the first check.

"Inquire before you retire" is a theme we've been emphasizing for several months now, in an effort to ensure speedy delivery of the first benefit check," he pointed out. He went on to emphasize that retiring workers would do well to call at their nearest office one to two months ahead of their retirement date and get their applications in early.

Mr. Hutton explained that benefit claims require some handling in the social security office before they are certified

Section 12 pertains to the Municipal-State Cooperative Meat Inspection Program which is gaining popularity in Texas by cities and meat packers alike.

to the Treasury Department for payment. The worker's earnings record and evidence of his age must be obtained. "Getting your claim filed ahead of your retirement will allow time for the completion of these necessary details," he continued, "so that when you have stopped work, your first social security check will arrive when you need it most."

"Generally speaking, some proof of age and an earnings statement (Form W-2) or a last year's Federal income tax return should be brought along when you come to apply for your social security," he stated. Other documents may be necessary in some cases. Mr. Hutton emphasized in conclusion that no appointment is necessary.

A representative of the Lubbock social security office will be in Matador on Tuesday, Sept. 13, at the First State Bank at 9:30 a.m. and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to social security.

An inspection program must be developed by the municipality as required by the State Department of Health, "Regulations Governing Meat Inspection."

Since the beginning of the cooperative program, Division of Veterinary Public Health meat inspectors have surveyed 100 meat packing plants for approval upon request by the local health officer of the area.

Formal approval or disapproval of the individual plants are then made by the State Health Department.

The thirteen cities that have passed ordinances including the required provisions are: Amarillo, Lubbock, Pecos, Vernon, Wichita Falls, Whitewright, Fort Worth, Dallas, Mount Vernon, Palestine, Waco, Luling and Houston.

Included in the program are all types of meat production including beef, mutton, goat, pork, poultry, rabbit and game birds. The effectiveness of the program is enhanced by the cooperation of the meat packing industry in Texas.

In addition to the 13 cities approved, 11 more are in the process of drafting the required ordinances.

The advantages of the Municipal-State Cooperative Meat Inspection Program, aside from assuring safe quality meat products, affords greater opportunity for intra-state shipment of meat products.

An approved plant may ship its products anywhere in Texas, however, meat processed by an unapproved plant may not be shipped into a city with the complying ordinance.

Matadors Rated As '9B Team to Beat'

Last week Lubbock Avalanche-Journal sports writer Bill Hart visited Matador, made some pictures of the Matador Matadors and wrote his own story of the club's prospects in the District 9-B Race. The Tribune has lifted his story verbatim from the Aug. 25 issue of the Avalanche. Here it is:

The opponents of the Class B powerhouse Matadors may be pleased to know that only 19 candidates are out for football this year.

But this 19 is actually more quality rather than quantity. Of those out, 15 are lettermen and nine are starters from last year's team which won six and lost five, including the Dist. 9-B championship.

Matador is a football town and has lost the district championship only twice in the past seven years. The teams that beat them out went on to win the regional crowns and that is as far as Class B teams can go.

Coach Charles Johnson in his second year as head coach, definitely feels that Matador is the team to beat in the district race this fall, barring injuries.

Stronger Than In 1959
He thinks his club is going to be stronger than a year ago, but he also feels that Turkey and Estelline are going to be better, too.

The squad this year is the smallest in many years at Matador, but not the smallest in history. Back in the '30's, Matador only had 13 players out one year and won the regional crown. Johnson is hoping at least three more boys will come out as soon as school starts.

Several of Matador's players will see action at two positions this year. Jimmie Green will alternate between end and half-back, Jim Welling between guard and end, Dink Wilson between quarterback and half-back, Ken Davis between end and guard and Buddy Davis between end and tackle.

Eight Starters Back
Johnson has eight offensive regulars back and six defensively. Green, fullback Guy Campbell, halfback Ros Bearden, tackle Gale Stafford, guard Eddie Timmons and tackle Buddy Davis saw action both ways, while Pete Davis, a tackle, was a defensive starter.

In addition, Welling was a part-time starter for the Matadors.

Stafford and Campbell have started the past two years on offense for the Matadors, while Campbell has been a regular on defense for three years. Barton and Bearden have been defensive regulars for two seasons.

Campbell Top Scorer
Campbell was the team's top scorer last year with 84 points, while Green had 54, Wilson 42 and Bearden 30, although missing part of the year because of injuries.

Johnson figures his running attack to be stronger than a year ago as all have more experience now. Matador didn't throw much last year and may change that some. Gary Lancaster, a sophomore, has been chunking well and Wilson has improved a lot.

The schedule is tougher, too, as four Class A schools are on the slate. "We had a couple of breathers last year, but they are not on our schedule this year," Johnson commented, then ad-
