

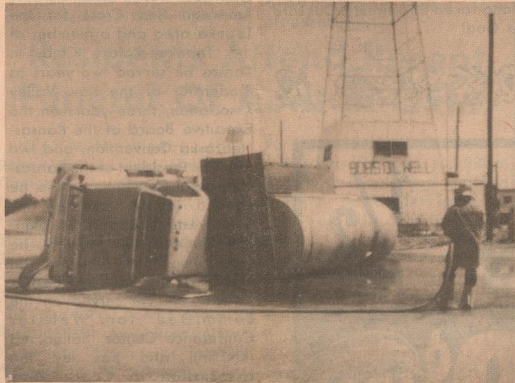

Near Catastrophe!

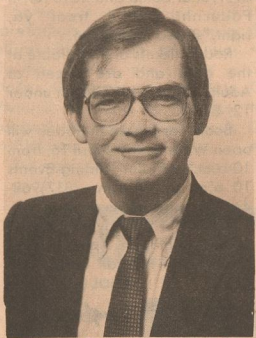

Matador Receives Grant For Older Tornado Victims

A contract between South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) and the city of Matador for a maximum of \$29,249 federal dollars has been made.

The purpose of this contract is to provide funds to pay for renovation and repair to homes that were damaged by the May 1, 1984 tornado. The repairs are

to be made to homes in which the homeowner is sixty (60) years of age or older, a moderate or low income person and is a resident in that home. The authority of this contract derives from the Older Americans Act of 1965.

in local civic work, member of Matador Lions Club, Lockney Rotary Club, President of Lockney Chamber of Commerce, President of the Seminole Ministerial Alliance, Board Member of Permian Planning Commission in the Midland-Odessa Texas area. He was a Board Member of Permian Basin Camp in Stanton, Texas, and served as a Director on the Church Loan Board in 1969-1974 for the Baptist General Convention of Texas. He was vice chairman of Topeka Ministerial Alliance, Board Member of American Red Cross for the Topeka area and a member of the Topeka Rotary Club. In Kansas he served two years as Moderator of the Kaw Valley Association, three years on the Executive Board of the Kansas-Nebraska Convention, and two terms as President of the Kansas-Nebraska Convention. Also he served as a trustee of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. In 1978-79, he served on the Committee on Boards of the Southern Baptist Convention. He served on the committee for Webster Conference Center, Salina, KS (KNESB), and has led the association in Cooperative Program giving and baptisms sixteen of the last eighteen years. He also has served on mission committees in several Baptist associations.

Rev. Hawkins is a native of Bovina, Texas, born February 2, 1930, and is married to the former Louise Moody of Bovina, Texas who also attended Wayland and Southwestern Seminary. They have two children--Nancy, a teacher in Lubbock and Keith who live in Ft. Worth.

In 1965 the Hawkins went to New Zealand to participate in the Trans-Pacific Crusade at the invitation of the Home Mission Board. They served two churches in Christchurch, New Zealand. Afterwards they toured Australia, Philippines, and Hong Kong; and at the invitation of the New Life Committee in Texas, preached in Tokyo, Japan meetings. During the past 23 years, he pastored churches with Black, Hispanic and Anglo missions. He established seven mission chapels in Kansas, and organized two others into churches in Kansas. He established outreach in 18 high-rise apartments and nursing homes in Topeka.

He is presently serving as area consultant for the Foreign Mission Board to recruit churches for Partnership Evangelism. He also organized International Crusades (now in Dallas) in FBC, Seminole, Texas in 1971. He established a television ministry in Topeka and northeast Kansas in 1976, involving daily thirty-second spots and live television. He wrote and produced about 2,000 thirty-second spots for television and several hundred for radio. He directed and produced radio devotionals and Sunday School lessons for the past seventeen years.

The program, which followed a dinner, featured a film and information on the West Texas Utilities Oklahoma station, currently under construction. Charles Adami from the Vernon WTU office was guest speaker.

After Mrs. Robert Dickson, club president, welcomed the guests, special music was presented by Mesdames Patsy Tippin, Donna Hoyle, Betty Vandiver and Elaine Risser. They sang *You Light Up My Life* and *You Are My Sunshine*, and were accompanied by pianist Frances Dixon and organist, Margaret Stanley.

Introduced by Jesse Turner, local WTU manager, Mr. Adami explained the operation at Oklahoma in the various phases from 1973, when the idea for the new coal-fired installation was first considered, until 1979 when

a site was purchased for the new power plant. The film showed the progress as construction got underway. The facility is expected to be completed by the end of next year, at an estimated cost of \$500 million dollars, Mr. Adami said.

West Texas Utilities furnishes electric power for all, or a portion of 52 Texas counties, extending 600 miles from Red River on the north to the Rio Grande on the south, according to Mr. Adami. The area covers 53,000 square miles, or about one-fifth of the state of Texas, he said. Especially interesting to the listeners was the statement that the coal, which will be brought by train loads from Wyoming, will be pulverized to the consistency of fine powder before it is used for generating power.

Mrs. Dickson thanked the committees who planned the menu and table decorations. Baskets of lilacs enhanced the tables, with a large arrangement of lilacs and irises at the head table. County Agent's Corner

Experimental Ranch Field Day to Highlight Rotational Grazing

The merits of rotational grazing in the Rolling Plains of Texas will be examined near Throckmorton, Thursday, April 25, at the field day of the Texas Experimental Ranch.

The program begins at 9:30 a.m., said Dr. Rod Heitschmidt, associate professor of range management with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A&M University System. The ranch is 11 sections on the Throckmorton Ranch of the Swen R. Swenson Cattle Co. It is on U.S. Hwys. 183 and 283, 10 miles north of Throckmorton and 20 miles south of Seymour.

"Particular emphasis will be given to the do's and don'ts of managing a rotational grazing system," Heitschmidt said.

Speakers will include Dr. Earl C. Gilmore, resident director of research at the TAES center at Vernon; Dr. Bill Pinchak, TAES

range animal nutritionist; Heitschmidt, and range management research associates John Walker and Steve Dowhower. All are on the staff of experiment ranch.

Other speakers will include Dr. Mort Kothman, professor of grazing management and range nutrition; Dr. Jerry Stuth, associate professor of range management, and Dr. Robert Knight, assistant professor of watershed management, all from Texas A&M.

Also on the program are Dr. Nelson Adams, livestock specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Vernon; Dr. Richard Connor, professor of agricultural economics; and Dr. Wayne Green, department of animal science, Texas A&M.

A dutch treat lunch will be served at noon, Heitschmidt said.

The other forefather with this unusual honor is Collin

McKinney, only this time, they reversed it. The town has his last name; the county his first. And, wonder of wonders, McKinney is in Collin County.

Then there's poor old Philip Dittit. They named a county after him, but they spelled it "Dimmit" instead of "Dittit." There's also a town named "Dimmitt" up in the South Plains, but it wasn't

But the map does pose some puzzles. For Example:

Some of the logic our forefathers displayed in naming places in this big state was flawless. Dallas, the city, is in Dallas, the County. Victoria is in Victoria, El Paso in El Paso, Lubbock in Lubbock, Childress in Childress and so.

But wait. Houston, the city, is in

Houston County, right? Wrong.

Houston is in Harris County. Crockett is the county seat of Houston County up in East Texas, and Crockett County? It's way out in West Texas, surrounding the city of Ozona.

Take the name Johnson. Johnson City logically ought to be in Johnson County, but it's not; it's in Blanco County. Johnson County is up in North Central Texas. There's a town named Burleson in Johnson County, but Burleson County is in Central Texas and the town of Caldwell is in it. Caldwell County is a hundred or so miles away and Lockhart is its county seat.

There's a Smith Point, a Smithville and a Smithland on the map, none of which are in Smith County. Tyler is in Smith County; Tyler County includes the city of Woodville but Wood County is up in Northwest Texas, nowhere near Woodville.

There is a place in Wood

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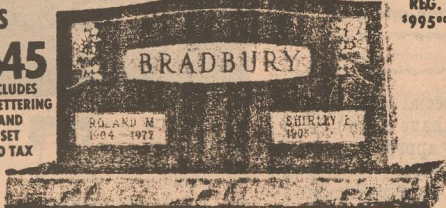
