

Experimental Ranch Field Day to Highlight Rotational Grazing

The merits of rotational grazing in the Rolling Plains of Texas will be examined near Throckmorton, Thursday, April 25, at the field day of the Texas Experimental Ranch.

The program begins at 9:30 a.m., said Dr. Rod Heitschmidt, associate professor of range management with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station., Texas A&M University System. 


