Essie Ballard was born July 8, 1881 at Cape Girardeau, Missouri and moved with her parents to Haskell Texas at an early age. She was married to J. H. Meadors, at Haskell July 6, 1895 and they moved to Dickens in 1912 where they engaged in the grocery business. Her father, the late W. C. Ballard was a former Dickens County judge.

Following her husband's death in 1940, Mrs. Meadors continued in the grocery business. She died June 16, 1962 at the age of 80 years, 11 months and 8 days. She was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Joe Spikes, Lamesa, Mrs. J. E. Cozby, Lubbock and Mrs. Willow Street, Dickens; one son, Cecil Meadors, Dickens; four grandchildren and five great-grandchildren; and a brother, J. J. Ballard, Winnemucca, Nev.

Damage In Wake of Beligerent Storms

A STORM CYCLE hounded the Panhandle of Texas for the past week, in some instances bringing beneficial rains, but to a large part of the area bringing alarm and widespread damage.

The beligerent storms started Friday by driving much of the above the city. The tower at the Amarillo Air Base was evacuated when a funnel was cited overhead. Torrential rains, damaging winds and destructive hail made a crazy-quilt pattern of the northwestern part of the state.

A sandstorm Friday and Saturday damaged crops extensively in this area while water stood in terraces in the fields. Farmers worked almost around the clock to replant washed-out fields during the brief planting season remaining. Some, who had been unable to plant because of scant moisture, worked to get seed in the ground, only to have it washed away before their work was completed.

Some hail has been reported in the Flomot area but generally the county has escaped serious hail damage. Here in Matador, climax of the storm series arrived about 10 p. m. Saturday with high winds and dust out of the south. Tree limbs were twisted off and some property damage was reported. The high winds caused a short in the fire siren, which resulted in alarm among the citizens that a tornado was approaching. Some estimates were that the winds reached 70 mph.

Late Monday another dust storm arrived from the north which brought about a half an inch of rain here, but damage to crops in the north portion of the county. Mrs. Tom Moore of the Northfield community said the Monday night wind was the hardest she had ever known. Rainfall at her home was 2.40 inches during the storm. She said Northfield crops were seriously damaged.

Election to Decide School Integration

ECONOMIC PROBLEM of spending between \$6000 and \$8000 per year to maintain a separate colored school for less than a dozen students, may cause the legally qualified voters of the Roaring Springs Independent School District to abolish the dual system. They will go to the polls Saturday (June 23) to decide the issue.

The election was called after a special meeting of the school board late in May, acting on a petition of 68 voters. Notice of the election was posted in three places in the district prior to the 10-day requirement.

The election will be held in the Green Building in Roaring Springs with Alfred Dye and Mrs. J. D. Mitchell serving as officers. A notice of the election is also published in this issue of the Tribune.

Manner of holding the election will be governed as near as possible by the election code of Texas. Immediately after the election, officers will make returns of the result to County Judge Elbert Reeves for safe keeping and the Commissioners Court will canvass the returns and notify the board of trustees of the results.

The votes of the special meeting of the school board to hold the election was unanimous. Members are Clyde Williams, Hollis Godfrey, Avery Payne, J. M. Thacker and Dean McInroe, secretary.

Patton Springs Schools in faced with the same problem last year, voted for integration, and integrated classes were held the past school term without incident.

Theatre Ownership Change Announced

A deal was culminated Tuesday in which Wade (Mutt) Berryman purchased the interest of his partner, Frank Price, in the Rogue Theatre here, the Matador Drive-In south of town and the Spring Theatre in Roaring Springs (operated in the fall months).

Mr. Berryman has assumed full control and management of the three properties. He did not make announcement of a change in the policy of operation. The consolidation of ownership was by mutual agreement.

Mr. Berryman said the box-office at the Drive-In will open 30 minutes before show time. Firemen Will Alter Storm Alert System

AFTER the Saturday night fiasco of the Matador storm alert system, in which high winds shorted the fire siren time after time and kept about half of the city population in storm cellars for hours, a change has been made.

Citizens are advised that the fire siren will be used only in the case of a fire. In the event of a storm alert or other emergency the Matador Volunteer Fire Department's red emergency truck will criss-cross the city north and south and east and west, sounding the "penetrator" siren with which the truck is equipped. Sound of the "penetrator" can be heard against strong wind much farther than the fire siren.

During a storm alert or "bad cloud" condition, at least two firemen will be watching conditions and keep in contact by short-wave with Deputy Ed. D. Smith and the Highway Patrol.

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

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Boll Weevils may be a problem in Motley County this year, as research has proven boll weevil females can produce hatchable eggs in the spring from fall matings. We had a considerable build up in the boll weevil population late in 1961, and some of the weevils lived through the winter, therefore an early hatch is to be expected.

Motley County 4-H members can start planning for the annual summer camp at Roaring Springs, which is held with Dickens and Kent counties. Dates are Tuesday July 31st, and Wednesday, August 1st. Curly Hays of West Texas Utilities will be on hand to direct the swimming program, and educational sessions will be provided in the fields of Wildlife, Plant Life, and Entomology. Detailed instructions will be mailed to all members at a later date.

Boys and girls of Motley County who plan to exhibit animals in the 1963 Livestock Show will be concerned with the decision of the Motley County Livestock Association relative to animals that will be sold after the show. All classes will be placed 1, 2, 3, 4, and only the animals receiving one of these placings will be eligible for the auction. The show will be held on the Saturday preceding the Plainview Stock Show.

The screw-worm control program seems to be making progress, as in many counties south of us, producers report that the number of cases has been greatly reduced. Of late several cases have been reported in Motley County, and assistance of all livestock producers is needed if the program is to be a success. Livestock should be checked of-

ten, and all cases treated immediately to help stop the spread of the screw-worm fly. Producers who do not have a mailing carton for screw-worms are urged to pick up one at my office. The cartons contain a vial for collecting the screw-worms, an information sheet for giving the date worms were found, the type of animal infected, and a postage free mailing sleeve.

One of the latest developments in the grain sorghum field is the introduction of dwarf hybrids. Boone Simpson of Northfield planted one of these in 1961, was well pleased with the results. Herb Martin and Alfred Martin of Flomot have received dwarf seed to plant for demonstrations this year. Farmers interested in grain sorghum production are invited to watch these plots.

Motley County 4-H members failed in their bid for a trip to the Texas Leadership Training Lab to be held at Bastrop in August, placing 2nd in District 3 competition. Records were submitted by Pat Cooper, Barbara Bird and Tommie Green, Matador, and A. J. Dye, Shirley Stafford and Gary Grizzle, Roaring Springs. All are members of the Junior Leaders Club, that was organized in 1959 to help younger 4-H members with their demonstrations and records.

The cotton variety demonstration planted by Sam Ross, Flomot, on May 21st was lost due to bad weather. Plans are currently being made for a late planting test. This test will be planted June 15th, and will include Western Stormproof, Lankart 57, Lockett Blightmaster, Qualla 10, Perfection Storm proof, Northern Star 5, Parrott, Lockett 4789, and Lankart 611.

Social Security Representative Scheduled Here

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security office will be in Matador on Tuesday, June 26 at the First State Bank and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to social security. He is scheduled at 9:30 a. m. John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock Social Security office points out that there is a question in the minds of some farmers concerning tax reports for crew leaders and crew members.

Generally, he said, if you employ someone to do farm work and pay him as much as \$150 cash wages in a year, or if he works on 20 or more days for cash wages figured on a time basis, hourly, daily, etc., you must make a social security tax report.

The crew leader is the employer of any crew of workers he furnishes to do farm work and is responsible for keeping a record of the name, address, and social security number of each crew member.

If the crewleader and farmer

have a written agreement that the crewleader is the farmer's employee however, the members of the crew are the farmer's employees also and the farmer is responsible for deducting the tax and making the required reports for wages paid.

Hutton said that free pamphlets for crew leaders and farmers are available at this time and can be obtained by writing his office at 1616-19th Street, Lubbock, or calling PO 3-0456 and asking for pamphlet OASI-25g.

John Connally Won In 141 Counties

DALLAS — John Connally carried 141 of the state's 254 counties in winning the Democratic nomination for governor in the June 2 runoff election, a tabulation of county returns by the Texas Election Bureau showed Saturday.

Connally's opponent, Don Yarborough, carried 113 Connally won nomination by some 26,000 votes.

The returns demonstrated the closeness of the election. Connally carried Victoria County by one vote, 1,716 to 1,715. Yarborough carried Franklin County by three votes, 582 to 579. Connally carried Williamson County by four votes, 2,516 to 2,512.

Strong on Coast
Yarborough's main strength was along the Gulf Coast and in East Texas. He carried his home county, Harris (Houston), as well as Jefferson (Beaumont-Port Arthur), Galveston, Orange, Lubbock, El Paso Travis (Austin) and McLennan (Waco).

Connally dominated the other population centers and South and West Texas. He carried three major counties heavily—his home county, Tarrant (Fort Worth), Dallas and Bexar (San Antonio).

Connally came out of those three counties with a combined majority of more than 47,000 votes—almost double his total statewide majority.
