## COUNTY PIONEER, MRS. W. R. TILSON CLAIMED BY DEATH

Death has come to another of Motley County's early pioneers. Mrs. W. R. Tilson, 85, who came to Whiteflat as a bride in 1893, died Wednesday afternoon in a Denton hospital after suffering a heart attack the previous day.

Funeral services were held here Friday at 3 p.m. at the First Methodist Church, with Rev. Mrs. Ruth Cooper, Whiteflat Methodist pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. L. W. Tucker. Interment was made in Matador East Mound Cemetery under the direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Guy Kimbell, Scott Robbins, J. Tom Hamilton, Claude Matney, Howard Edmondson and Levi Wilkinson.

Mrs. Tilson was born Salie Williams, at Lehigh, Penn., July 5, 1874. She died May 11, 1960 at the age of 85 years, 10 months and 6 days.

She came to Texas in 1879 with her parents, who settled at Brenham where they lived until moving to Vernon in 1882. Two years later they moved to Childress, where she was married to W. R. Tilson, on Oct. 8, 1893. Her father, T. A. Williams helped organize Childress County.

Establishing their home in the Whiteflat community, Mr. and Mrs. Tilson lived there until his death in 1937. Their seven children were born and reared there, and to the advancement of much to the advancement and progress of community life both at Whiteflat and in Matador.

Following her husband's death, Mrs. Tilson continued to live here for several years before

"Seek to obtain and keep social and spiritual adjustment and to evaluate the importance of true values," Minister Bill Decker of the Matador Church of Christ told the Matador High School 1960 graduating class in sermon during the Baccalaureate service held Sunday night in the school auditorium. "Many in these troubled days have no peace of mind," Minister Decker declared, "they need to turn to the Bible—'Prayer Perfect' by the High School Choir; announcements by Supt. Bert Ezzell; hymn, 'Amazing Grace,' congregation; 'The Lord's Prayer,' High School Choir; and benediction by J. E. Edwards. Mrs. L. D. Wilkerson played the Processional and Recessional.

## Matador FFA Rates High in Area Meet

Matador Future Farmers of America chapter won a third place and two members took high honors Saturday in the Area I FFA Convention held in Amarillo.

Andy Fish became one of the top ten finalists in state-wide competition for the \$1200 college scholarship given by the Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas, and Carl Thompson placed fourth in area competition in the Texas FFA Electric Awards program. He will receive a \$20 cash award.

Andy won first in Area I competition and will compete again in the state competition. He will also receive a \$50 savings bond at a later date. His application was based on four years of work aimed at the care and management of wildlife on his home ranch.

The FFA Electric Awards program is sponsored by most of the electric utilities companies operating in Texas and is based on the student's participation and activities involving electrical work both in shop class and on the home farm.

The Matador chapter received a check for \$50 as third place winner in area competition based on electrical achievements by the total membership and sponsored by the Southwestern Public Service Company of Amarillo.

Those attending the Area I convention were Andy Fish, Carl Thompson, Bundy Campbell, Jimmy Welling and Bill Moss. Voag teacher and chapter sponsor to whom much credit is due for the outgoing record made by the Matador chapter under his leadership.

## Special Election Gets Heavy Vote

A surprisingly heavy vote was cast Tuesday in the special city election, to elect two unopposed members to the council. Douglas Pitts Jr., one of the candidates on the ballot, received 151 votes. John Irwin, whose name also appeared on the ballot, received 161 votes.

Evidence of a spirited "write-in" campaign was shown with 27 votes for Howard Edmondson, and 19 votes for Lewis Bostick. Frank Stafford received one vote, as did W. W. Clements (already a member of the council). Leon Smallwood received two votes. A total of 184 ballots were cast in an election first estimated to interest 50 to 100 voters.

A rumor circulated last week to the effect that the colored sector of Matador would attempt to "write-in" a member of the council, may have influenced the number of votes cast. No Negro votes were cast Tuesday, although a number voted in the regular city election held in April.

Jan Barton, Matador 4-H club member was named first place winner in the District III scholarship contest sponsored by the Farm Bureau.

Records have been submitted for state competition, with the winning record qualifying the winner for a \$250 scholarship.

## Infant Girl is Killed In Highway Wreck

DEATH waited for the small foreign car at Cunningham curve. It was done in an instant. The car went out of control and rolled off U.S. Highway 70 at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Dianna Lynn Alexander, age 2½ months, apparently died instantly. She was tossed out of the vehicle and over a four-wire barbed wire fence, crashing to the ground about three feet beyond the fence.

Her parents, A-3C and Mrs. Charles Robert Alexander, were only slightly injured. Alexander, an assistant Air Force chaplain is 19, and his wife is 18. They were returning to Sheppard Field, Wichita Falls, after visiting his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert K. Shaw of Clovis, N. M.

One of the first to arrive at the scene of the accident was Merritt Faulkner of Wichita Falls, former Matador resident. Within a short time a Eudy-Seale ambulance had brought the child's body to Matador. The dazed and grief-stricken young couple were without funds.

Mayor Bill Seale remembered that Sgt. Bill Tilson was still in town and called him. Bill Tilson, who has been in the Air Force 18 years and familiar with emergencies, is presently stationed at Dyess Air Base, Abilene.

In the meantime Faulkner called the insurance agent in Wichita Falls who held a policy on Alexander's car. Things happened rapidly in this small West Texas cattle country town. Sgt. Tilson contacted Wichita Falls Sheppard Field. Alexander's leave was extended 15 days. The Red Cross authorized Billy Watson, Red Cross emergency committee chairman here, to issue a check for \$250.

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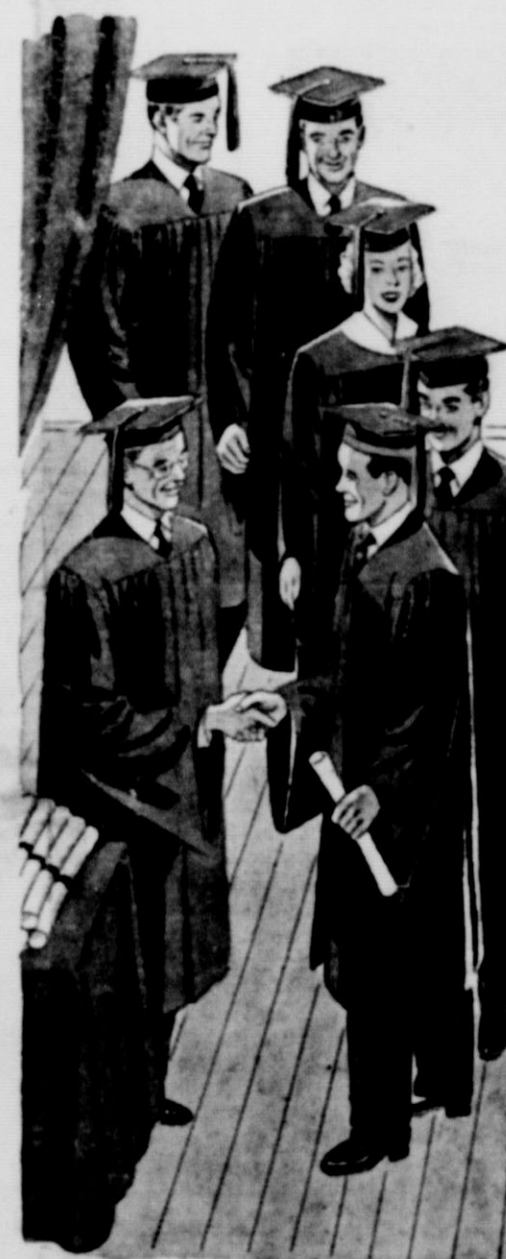

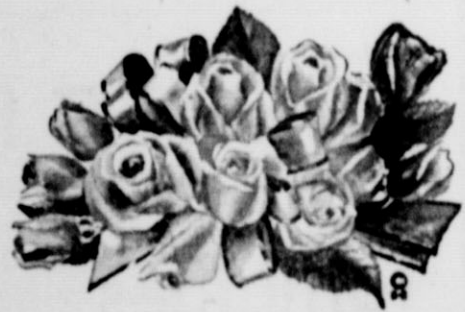

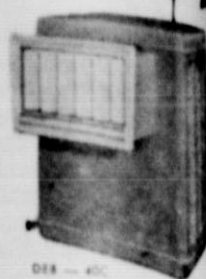
