### Thanksgiving Game Collars Top Honor

IT WAS A BEAUTIFUL DAY. Most of the population of Matador was in Vernon Thanksgiving afternoon to witness the juggernaut Matador Matadors football machine roll over the Newcastle Bobcats and win the Region III, Class B championship, hands down. The score was 36-8. The Matadors ended the season with 11 wins, 1 tie, under the able coaching of Charlie Johnson and Don Macon.

The Matadors rushed for 278 yards and passed for 138, giving them a total of 416 yards. Newcastle's feared passing was good for only 134 yards. Their rushing total of 23 yards gave them a net yardage of 157 yards. The Matadors led in first downs, 20 to 7.

Guy Campbell pounded out 220 yards on 39 carries to lead the Matador attack. His total was more than the entire Newcastle yardage, both passing and running.

Gary Lancaster threw seven passes and completed four for 138 yards and two touchdowns. He gained 25 yards rushing, scored one two-point conversion and passed for another, intercepted two passes, and played a strong defensive game.

The Matadors defense was outstanding with Dale Dixon, Dink Wilson, Jimmie Welling, Gary Lancaster, and Kenneth Davis as standouts.

The Matadors took the opening kickoff and set a 73-yard scoring march in motion. Campbell carried 7 times for 59 yards during the drive. He swept right end for the final six yards and a 6-0 lead. Lancaster faked twice and then kept around right end for the extra points.

With 3:10 left in the half Lancaster tossed a pass to Green, who raced for the TD. Campbell cracked left guard for a 16-0 halftime lead.

The Matadors moved 60 yards in the third quarter for their next touchdown. Campbell ended the drive with a 5-yard burst over left guard with 4:38 left.

Push Bobcats Back  
The Matadors pushed the Bobcats back to their 1-yard line in the fourth quarter, but Newcastle punted to their 32. The Big Red moved inside the 20, but a penalty put them on the 30. Campbell gained two yards, and then Lancaster tossed a 28-yard scoring pass to left halfback Dink Wilson. The score came with 7:46 left.

Moments later, Lancaster picked off a Newcastle pass and returned it to the Newcastle 35-yard line. A 15-yard penalty put the ball on the 20, and Lloyd Martin gained 5 to the 15. Campbell then burst over left guard and raced for the touchdown with 6:03 left. Lancaster passed to Wilson for a 36-0 lead.

A confusing series of pass interceptions and fumbles then plagued both teams until Newcastle recovered a fumble on the Matadors' 10-yard line. A pass interference penalty moved them to the 1-foot line, and quarterback John Hulse sneaked over for the tally with 19 seconds left. Hulse passed to Bobby Pounds for the extra points.

All first place winners will compete in the Area I contest to be held in Plainview, Saturday, Dec. 3 when first place winners from seven districts will compete for state honors.

First place winners of the Area competition will go to the State contest on Dec. 10 at Sam Houston College in Huntsville. In the Farm Radio contest the team presents a farm program designed for a 15 minute broadcast. Roaring Springs Radio team members are Ronnie Davis, A. J. Dye and Roger Ashley.

B. L. Peacock, vocational agriculture instructor and Chapter sponsor, expressed his appreciation to the people of Roaring Springs for their cooperation in vo-ag work. "I would like to thank J. T. Swim especially for helping with the transportation, and also for the fine dinner we had," he declared.

"It is support of the people of a community that helps make a strong FFA Chapter," Peacock pointed out.

### Tournament Dates Set for Next Week

The annual tournament here is probably the oldest tournament in number of years to be found in this section of the state. The first tournament was held in 1931 and has continued every year since that time with the exception of the war years in the 1940s.

The tournament will get underway at 2 p.m. Wednesday when the Roaring Springs and Ralls girls meet. Twenty-four games will be played in the four days, with six games on Wednesday, six games Thursday, eight games Friday, and the four championship games on Saturday.

Games will start at 2 o'clock on Wednesday and Thursday, 12 p.m. Friday, and 4 p.m. on Saturday. All semi-final games will be unreeled on Friday afternoon and Friday night.

Following the opening game between the Roaring Springs and Ralls girls, the boys teams from the same schools will meet at 3:20. Paducah and Patton Springs girls will play 4:40 to be followed by a game between the boys teams of the same schools.

The Matador girls will meet the Estelline girls at 7:30 on Wednesday and the Matador and Estelline boys will collide at 8:40.

Announcement was also made last week that the Matador boys basketball team will open its season next Tuesday night, (Dec. 6) when they meet Paducah here. The Paducah and Matador girls teams will also clash.

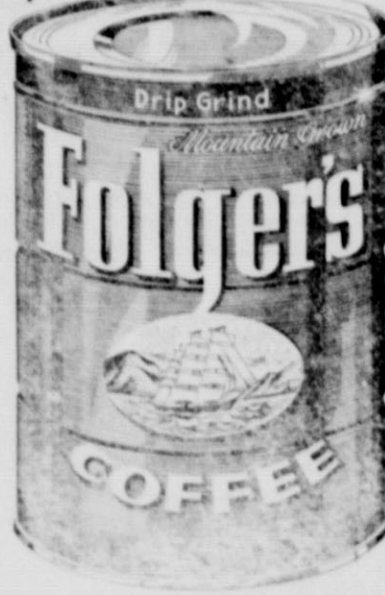

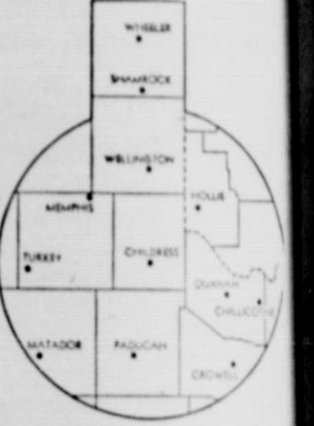
