Funeral services for W. E. Ebbi Thomas, 71, long-time resident of this area were held at 2 p.m. Sunday at the Northfield school house. Mr. Thomas died Friday about 10 a.m. en route to the Childress General Hospital, following a heart attack at his home.

Church of Christ Ministers Deas Johnson of Turkey and Travis Gilland of Bowie officiated. Burial was in the Northfield Cemetery under direction of the Newberry Funeral Home, Childress.

Survivors are his wife, the former Bessie Kincaid, to whom he was married December 28, 1946; two sons, Billy Dan Thomas of Lone Pine, Calif., and John of Northfield; two grandchildren, Aaron and La Tone Thomas of Lubbock; five brothers, Nolan, of Childress; Allan, Northfield; Vincent and Raymond, of Amarillo; and Lee Thomas of Peru, Indiana; and one sister, Mrs. Izora Lister, Lovington, N. M.

Mr. Thomas was born Oct. 11, 1890 at Bridgeport, Texas and was about three months old when his parents moved to this area. He had been a resident of the Northfield community since 1919, and was a member of the Church of Christ.

First Bale Is Ginned

FIRST BALE of 1962 cotton was ginned here Friday afternoon by West Texas Gin. It was weighed in at 2 p.m. The cotton was grown by Carl Cooper on the L. M. Cox farm about eight miles northwest of Matador. The cotton was planted April 25, almost four months to the day prior to the ginning.

From the 2120 pounds of (slightly green) snaps, a bale of 460 pounds was produced. West Texas Gin purchased the cotton at 40¢ per pound. The bale produced 730 pounds of seed.

Merchants and business firms contributed cash and merchandise in the amount of \$158.50 as a "first bale" award. Mr. Cooper has asked the Tribune to express his appreciation for all contributions to the award fund.

Bale at Flomot
Second bale of 1962 cotton was ginned at Flomot Saturday by the H & H Gin. It was grown by Sam Ross Wayne Hunter, manager of the gin advised the Tribune that 2080 pounds of seed cotton produced a 440-pound bale and 840 pounds of seed.

Tullia Youth Victim In Train-Car Crash

SUDDEN DEATH awaited Jerry Morris, 19, of Tullia when the car in which he was riding collided with a Q. A. & P. diesel freight engine at 5:40 Saturday afternoon, at the Loop 42 crossing in Roaring Springs.

He was thrown by the impact directly in front of the four unit diesel engine pulling 58 freight cars and his body rolled between the tracks for more than 160 feet, before the train could be stopped.

Jimmy Marshall, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Marshall of Plainview, also in the car was brought to Stanley Hospital in an Eddy-Seale ambulance where he was treated for minor bruises, lacerations and shock. The car, which was knocked several feet from the point of the impact on the highway, was demolished.

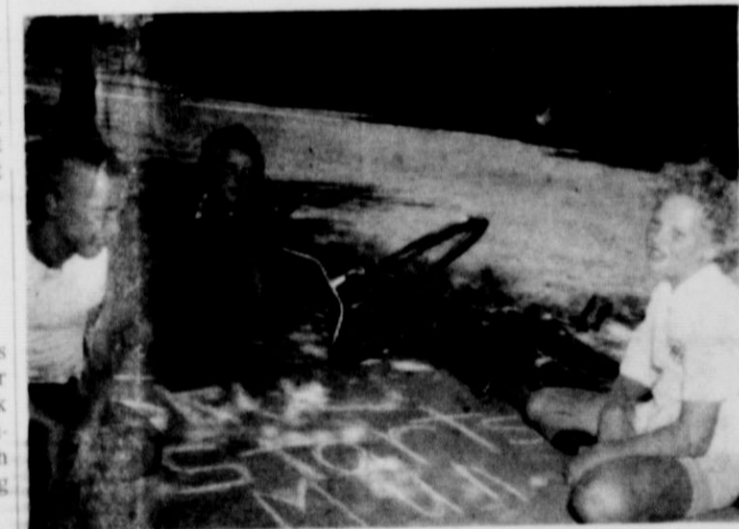
Jerry Morris was born in Matador and had attended school in

Matador School to Start Classes Sept. 3

THE FEEL OF AUTUMN is here and with it is the beginning of another school term. Matador schools will open Monday, September 3, it was announced this week by Superintendent Bert Ezzell. Classes will start promptly at 9 a.m. Students will follow a regular schedule of classes, buses will operate on their regular routes and the lunchroom will serve lunches.

Lunchroom meal prices have been set at 25¢ for students and 50¢ for adults. Supt. Ezzell declared. Students will pay 2¢ for extra milk and adults will pay 5¢ for the extra serving. Milk will be served with each meal and the first serving is included in the price of the meal.

Supt. Ezzell said the 25¢ price for student meals may have to be raised if the income is not sufficient to meet expenses.

Registration is this week, when approximately 400 students are expected to enter high school and grade school. Seniors will register tomorrow (Friday, Aug. 31) at 8 a.m. Juniors will register at 9 a.m. and

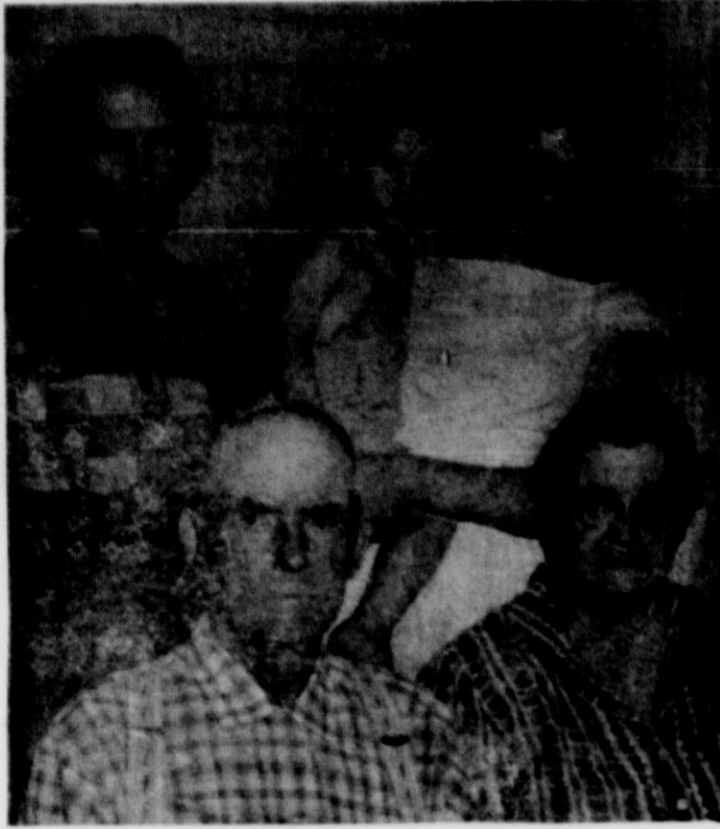

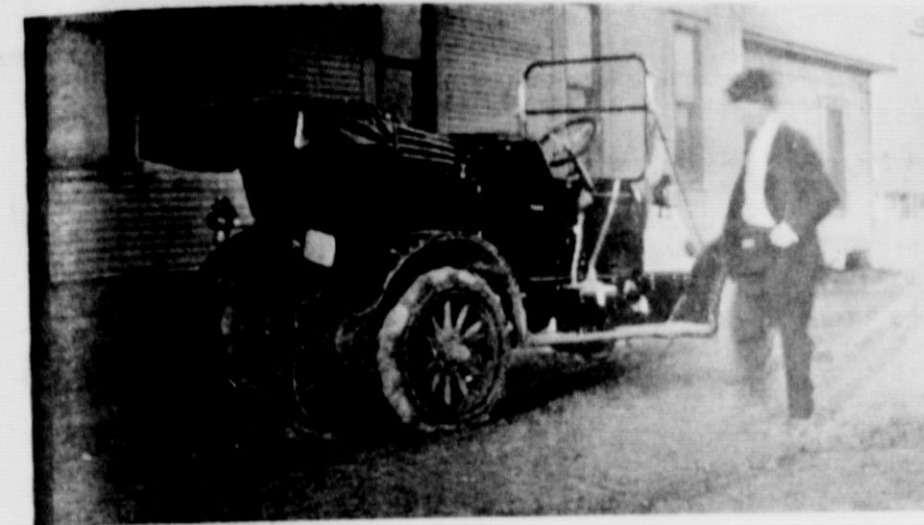

In high school Grizzle was editor of the school yearbook. During his junior year he was president of the Student Council and Future Farmers of America and

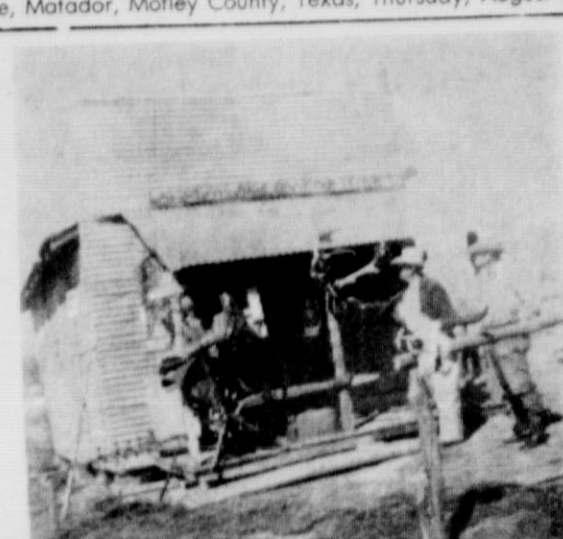

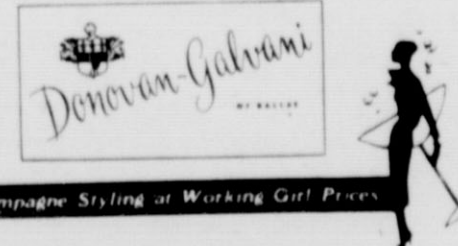

E. H. Gafford Once on Border Patrol During Raids Made by "Pancho" Villa

(Delayed from Pioneer issue)

E. H. Gafford, a veteran of World War I, and later a cowboy on the Matador Ranch from 1923 until 1950, once served on the Border Patrol at Laredo during the time Francisco (Pancho) Villa, Mexican revolutionary leader was marauding the countryside.

Mr. Gafford came here intending to stay two months but remained to make this his home for over a quarter of a century. He attended the first reunion of early settlers of Dickens and Motley counties, and has not missed a reunion since. His plans are to attend today.

Born in Jack County, August 28, 1887, he was still a baby when his father, Sam D. Gafford, a Methodist missionary preacher died at Seymour, in 1888. The next year his mother moved to Dickens County, to the home of a relative, Joe Jackson who had filed on land at Cottonwood East of Afton.

The Soldier of Fortune was

29 years old when he joined the Border Patrol in 1916. A year later he was in Germany with the American Expeditionary Forces. He had volunteered for service and left from Fort Sam Houston with the 82nd Division. General Pershing was also on his way overseas, aboard the same ship.

After his return home, he came to Matador to work for the Old Settlers. When the Old Settlers was organized in 1923, under the trees at the "springs," Gafford, with other cowboys rode across from Dutchman Camp to attend.

In 1928 the bachelor cowboy was "batching" at Russellville when he decided to get married. He and Miss Flora Jewel Burkes were married at Floydada by Judge Dean.

When Gafford retired from the ranks of Matador cowboys in 1950, he was given his favorite horse, "Chum," by John Mackenzie, manager of the vast ranch holdings.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

A Range Management Conference will be held in the Student Union Building at Texas Tech in Lubbock on Friday Sept. 7 starting at 9:00 a.m. which Motley County stockmen are urged to attend. There is no charge for the conference which will cover range problems, range improvement work, range research on the Texas Experiment Ranch at Throckmorton, and ranching operations in this area. Livestock producers know that range management pays, and this meeting is an opportunity to share the findings of others.

If you have been applying insecticides to control cotton insects and have not obtained satisfactory results, check on the following items. Are you following recommendations in the cotton insect control guide? These poisons and rates have been checked, and found to do the job.

The minimum rate is for small cotton, and must be applied to cover the plant. The maximum rate is for large cotton, and again, this must be applied for large cotton to cover the plant and provide protection.

If insecticides are applied by plane, add at least 50% to the recommendations, as more poi-

son is required to cover plants. For boll weevil and bollworm control, interval between applications is very important. A five day interval is recommended for most infestations, but if a check shows that new punctures are found, this interval should be reduced to four days, or in case of heavy infestations, three days.

Weevils normally feed for two or three days before starting to puncture forms, and as there is a residual effect of insecticides for about two days, the five day interval will control most infestations, but if this interval is not doing the job, reduce the interval. Recommendations are found in the guide work, if all instructions are followed. Where controls are not being obtained, farmers should check to see which item they are not following correctly. Worms can be controlled with one or two applications, depending on

the presence of eggs but for weevil control, the plant must be protected for at least 21 days, thereby requiring four or five applications. If a person does not intend to follow these guide lines, he will probably save money by not using any poison at all.

Our national meeting will be held in Las Cruces, New Mexico, this year on August 26-30. At the time you are reading this, I should be attending this meeting. I have attended four national conventions prior to this one during my 14 years as a County Agent, and have found each to be an interesting and educational program. We are given official time for these meetings, but the agent must bear the expense.

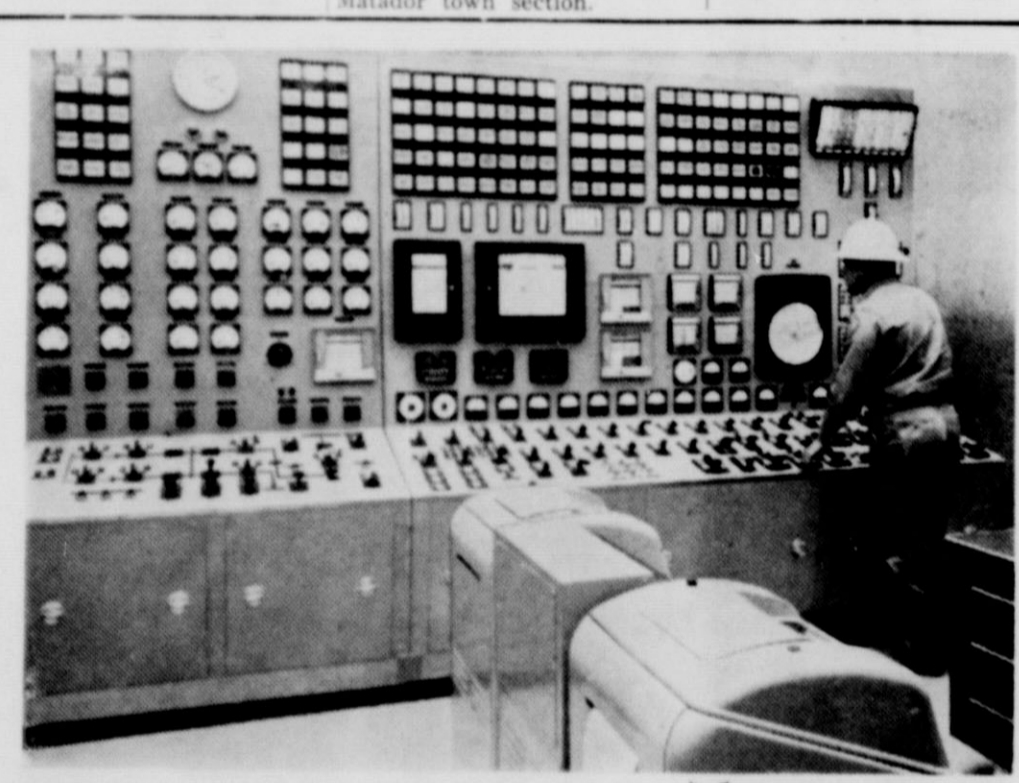
