Mrs. Melvin Brogden, who is
Motley County's weather
observer for the National
Weather Service, has recorded 5 Weather Service, has recorded 5 74/100" for the month of October and 32 23/100" for the year. Although Clay Jameson, Maintenance Supervisor for the Highway Department, has the same October reading, he recorded approximately 4 inches more (36 3/100") for the year to date.

Jameson said that there had been no road damage but normal erosion in other areas. "This close to the Caprock, it either washes in or washes out"
Jameson stated. The Highway
Department's main concern at
this point is a bridge approach
near Northfield where the
department has been working to
alleviate any problem there.

According to Ray Minkley, Motley County Agent, "It never rains too much in west Texas." Although it is not good for the cotton crop on the stalk at this point, the rain does help the wheat according to the county. point, the rain does help the wheat according to the county

wheat according to the county agent.

Say Minkley" Although it is not good for the cotton farmer right now, it does help the rancher by filling his pond for his cattle and promoting the grass growth which the cattle utilize."

James Gillespie, District Conservationist, confirmed that the over abundance of rain in October has caused structure damage county wide. Gillespie explained that there is severe damage to top soil which will be repairable but obviously not replaceable. "From a conservation standpoint, the rain has been good for the rangeland providing adequate moisture during the growing season" Gillespie continued.

The Conservationist pointed out that when observing the fields in Motley County, almost all have some wash-outs but those farmers who have practiced conservation techniques in their fields have had the least if any damage.

"We need some sunshine and some warm weather" declares Scotty Abbott, County Executive Director of ASCS-USDA in Matador. Abbott feels that the recent heavy rains are hurting Conservationist pointed

Matador. Abbott feels that the recent heavy rains are hurting the grade of the cotton crop this year which will make the price decrease. Although he could not say how bad the damage is, Abbott did confirm that it (the rain) is not helping.

Perhaps the excess rain this month has robbed some cotton farmers of their smile. It has also created problems for them as they try to harvest their crop. But springs does come and this deep moisture will perhaps be labeled a blessing when next year's crop a blessing when next year's crop is planted and those optimistic smiles will reappear.

Beefmaster Story One Of Profit Lions Club Learns At Meeting

Beefmaster production is a profitable agribusiness by cross breeding cattle that produce good beef in larger quantities, Matador Lions CLub members learned at it Oct. 15th meeting. Speaker was local breeder, Stuart Dixon, President of the Panhandle Beefmaster Breeders and a director of Foundation Beefmaster Association. Of the 12 directors of FBA, only three are from Texas.

Introduced by Lion Alan Bingham, Mr. Dixon presented a video film explaining the organization and operations of Beefmaster development, which began in the early 1930's by Tom Lasater and his father, Edward C. Lasater, South Texas ranchers. The Foundation now operates from New Mexico and Colorado and covers 29 states and four foreign countries in production.

"There are no generic animals, and every breeder has to have his own name or ranch prefix before the title of beefmaster," Mr. Dixon said as he further explained that the Lasaters began by cross breeding Hereford and Brahman cattle. Later they crossed Shorthorn with Brahman and then experimented with a three-way cross of Shorthorn-Hereford/Brahman cattle.

Mr. Dixon stressed the six

Mr. Dixon stressed the six essential characteristics in the development of the Beefmaster breed, as shown on the film: disposition, fertility, weight, conformation, hardiness and milk production. "With these essentials, Tom Lasater essentials, Tom Lasater developed an outstanding breed of cattle which has gained popularity and acceptance throughout the beef producing areas of the world," which Mr. Dixon distributed.




