## EARLY DAY COWBOY DIES IN OKLAHOMA

W. Shelton McCall, 79, pioneer West Texas Cowboy, who later served 19 years on the Oklahoma City, Okla. police force, died August 25, in Polyclinic Hospital there, friends here learned this week.

Mr. McCall worked for the Matador Ranch when he was about 17 years of age. He worked for A. G. Ligertwood, ranch manager, for about 25 years, and will be remembered by many early-day residents of this area.

He was born in Coleman County, Texas and first moved to Oklahoma City at the close of World War I. He joined the police force in 1922 and retired in 1941.

He moved to California in 1943, where he was employed by the Navy during the war years and later worked for the Los Angeles Transit Co. He returned to Oklahoma City in 1954 following his retirement.

Mr. McCall and his late wife who died two years ago, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1957. He was a member of St. Luke's Methodist Church.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Saturday, August 27 in Hahn-Cook Funeral Home, followed by burial in Oklahoma City's Rose Hill Cemetery.

Surviving are his daughter, Mrs. Celia Beeziey, of the home at 2521 NW 17; a foster daughter, Mrs. Lorraine Viscardi, Rochester, N.Y.; and four sisters, Mrs. Alice Johnston, Edmond; and Mrs. Letha Newman, Mayme McCall and Mrs. Ruby Ayers Lynn, all of Oklahoma City.

## Count One Quail

### Enrollment About Same As Last Year

A QUAIL entered Matador High School Tuesday, but couldn't be counted on the enrollment tally. He was one day late, anyway. Exceedingly tame, the quail did not want to leave. Teachers and students captured the bird and evicted him.

Enrollment was about the same as 1959, Supt. Bert Ezzell said, with a total in both elementary and high school, of 303. Grade school enrolled 223 and high school 80.

The freshmen class is small this year (17), however figures indicate more in future years. The 8th grade (freshmen next year) has 31 members. The 7th grade has 20, the 6th 37, the 5th 19, 4th 34, 3rd 28, 2nd 21 and the first grade 31.

At Roaring Springs, Supt. M. J. Schofield reported a total enrollment of 179 (high school 57 and grade school 122).

Enrollment by grades is as follows: first 20, second 11, third 14, fourth 15, fifth 15, sixth 13, seventh 17, eighth 15, ninth 15, tenth 12, eleventh 14 and twelfth 16.

No reports were received from the Flomot school. The enrollment of the county's two colored schools totaled 72, with 49 at Matador and 23 at Roaring Springs.

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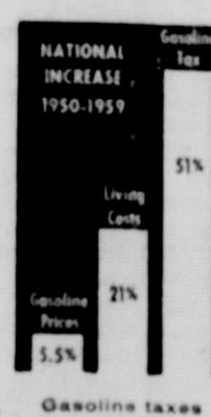

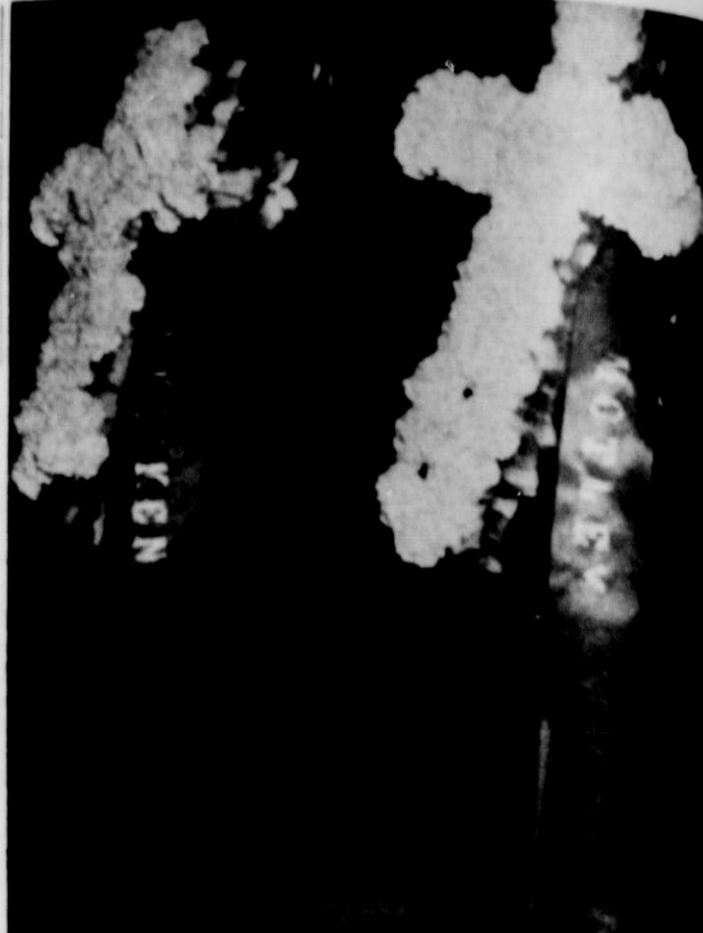
