Molley Pioneer Dies in Lubbock

Miss J. N. (Pearl) Gaines, 91, Matador County pioneer and long-time resident of the South Plains, died Friday at 9 a. m. in Taylor Hospital, Lubbock. She had been ill about 11 years.

Miss Gaines had been a resident of Lubbock 33 years, moving there from Matador where she had lived since 1901. Her husband, who died in 1936, operated a farm in this area in the early days.

She was born July 8, 1869, in Matador. She was a member of the First Baptist Church, Lubbock. Funeral services were held Saturday at Ford Memorial Chapel. First Baptist pastor Dr. J. Ralph Grant, pastor officiated, assisted by the Rev. J. T. Bolding, associate pastor.

Funeral was in City of Lubbock cemetery under direction of Mrs. Bess Patton.

Survivors include five daughters: Miss Virginia Gaines, Miss Mary Gaines and Miss Velma Gaines, all of the home; Mrs. A. Patton, Kress, and Mrs. E. Alexander, Slide; three sons, T. Gaines, Lubbock; J. S. Gaines, Amarillo, and J. H. Gaines, Cotton Center; one brother, three sisters, 12 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren. Attending the funeral services were Matador were Miss Rachel Patton and Mrs. Bess Patton.

AT FATHERS BEDSIDE

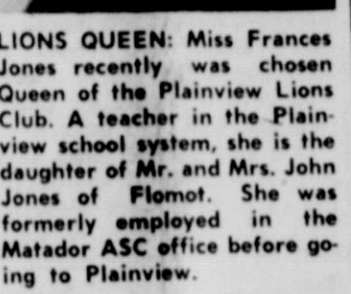

Final Tribute Paid 'Rang' Thornton, 72

BOOTED MEN holding their broad-brimmed hats stood in East Mound Cemetery Monday afternoon and paid final tribute to a pioneer Matador Ranch cowboy, E. H. "Rang" Thornton, 72, who died at Stanley Hospital Saturday night. He had been in failing health for months, but had been hospitalized only two days. Rang Thornton was a cowboy all his life. He started working for the Matadors in the spring of 1906 as a horse "wrangler" from which he derived the nickname that followed him a lifetime.

About 1908 "Rang" Thornton was "promoted" to cowboy and worked continuously with the range wagon until 1919 when he became range boss of a Matador wagon. He worked in this capacity until 1922 when he quit the ranch.

Over a period of years he traded in livestock and worked as a cowhand for smaller ranches. About 1942 he went to work for the Waggoner Ranch south of Electra and later was transferred to New Mexico when the Waggoner interests were extended to that state. He worked for Waggoner until about seven years ago when he returned to Matador. He had made his home at the Matador Hotel since returning here.

Ed Harvester Thornton was born in Dublin, Texas, November 19, 1887, and died October 22, 1960 at the age of 72 years, 11 months, 3 days. He came to this area with his parents in 1890. He was a member of all Matador Masonic bodies, a Scottish Rites Mason and charter member of Khiva Temple. He was unmarried.

Funeral services were held Monday at 2 p. m. in the First Methodist Church here, with pastor Roy Patterson officiating, assisted by Rev. W. B. Vaughn. Interment was in East Mound with arrangements by Eudy-Seale Funeral Home. Masonic graveside rites were held.

Survivors include one brother, Tom Thornton of Guthrie, one half-sister, Mrs. Roy Bradford, Roaring Springs, and two half-brothers, Walter Newman of Ranger and William Newman of Dallas.

Masons were pallbearers and were fellow-officers, Lewis Bostick, Charlie Scaff, Frank Price, Algie Groves, J. D. Craven and Raby Webb. Oration at the cemetery was by Bill Moss, secretary.

Texas Baptists To Convene for 75th Anniversary

Matador Baptists will join more than 7,500 Baptists from over the state, in Lubbock Oct. 31 - Nov. 2 for the 75th anniversary meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

The Convention, meeting only one week before the national presidential election, will probably evade the highly-publicized "religion-in-politics" issue because the denomination's democratic process makes it impossible for one Baptist to speak for another, according to advance news releases.

The main purpose of the meeting, said Convention President M. B. Carroll of Dallas, is to conduct the business of the Convention and to present inspiring messages by some of the nation's top Baptist leaders.

Principal speakers will include Dr. Ramsey Pollard, president of the 9 million-member Southern Baptist Convention; Dr. Gordon Clinard, professor at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth; and Dr. John Haldean, pastor of the Alapattah Baptist Church, Miami Beach, Fla.

Dr. Carroll, who was pastor of Matador's First Baptist Church during 1942-44, will deliver his President's message Monday evening, Oct. 31 at 7:45. The convention will be held in the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum.

Dist. Championship Goes to Mavericks

DIST. CHAMPS five times in a row is the record of the Matador Mavericks, coached by grade school Principal J. E. Edwards. Friday evening the Mavericks claimed the 1960 District Grade School honors when they shut out the Turkey Junior High school football team 42-0.

The Mavericks, in winning their sixth game this season and 25th in a row, rolled up eight first downs to their opponents' one. The added 42 points gave them a season total of 296 while allowing opponents only 50.

The first team line of the Mavericks, Donnie Hunt, John Barnhill, Larry Norris, Richard Campbell, Larry Keltz, Ronnie Cox and Kenneth Pitts, was outstanding in both offense and defense for the entire season.

Friday night the Mavericks (here on Burlison Field) started to work early when they marched 41 yards in four plays for their opening score. Halfback Gary Campbell went the final yard to score. Quarterback Charles Ezzell scored the extra points for an 8-0 lead.

Blocking a Turkey punt on the Turkey 33-yard line, the Mavericks set up their next tally. Scoring play came when Fullback Tommie Green raced around left end and lateraled to Ezzell, who scored. The play covered nine yards.

In the second quarter, Halfback Tim Green climaxed a 30 yard drive with an eight yard burst over right tackle to leave the half time score 22-0.

Only touchdown in the third quarter came when Ezzell tossed a pass to Left End Donnie Hunt for 51 yards and goal. Ezzell raced 58 yards for a marker early in the fourth quarter. Moments later he ran 13 yards around left end for the final score of the game. Tommie Green scored the extra points.

City Collects on Delinquent Bills

Mass collection of delinquent water bills was effected Tuesday by the city of Matador. The method was simple. Water was cut off from delinquent customers and a fee of \$1 was charged to turn it on again after the bill was paid.

The action was the result of the council reaching a decision at the last meeting. Far too many accounts were in arrears and the city needs its funds for operation. The council approved an order to turn off the water if the bill is not paid by the 25th of the month (water bills are due by the 10th of the month).

No exception was made Tuesday with regard to wealth, influence or position. As a result approximately 30 accounts were brought up to date some in arrears for several months.

One member of the council said: "We have no wish to impose a hardship on anyone, but it is unfair to the majority of the customers who pay their water bills promptly, to allow others to 'ride' their account."

"We believe it is businesslike and the only way the city can operate, to require prompt payment of water bills from every one alike," he said.

Ranchers Differ in Coyote Controversy

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Tribune recently printed an article regarding contents found in coyote stomachs based on a paper by Richard DeArment, written in 1941, which indicated that the coyote might be a friend rather than an enemy to the rancher. It brought up immediately a controversy, especially in the area where the coyote has always been considered an enemy to the cattle producer. The following is a reply by E. G. Pope of Lubbock, Assistant District Agent for the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

If the coyote is a friend of the rancher, then the rancher certainly doesn't have an enemy. This article furnished by a rancher which quoted Richard DeArment of the U. S. Department of the Interior Wildlife Service is completely misleading.

"In the first place" the veterinarian controller said, "DeArment is not an employee of the United States Department of the Interior. In the second place information was taken from a study made in 1941. We have studied many things in the past years. We have learned that coyotes have caused more loss to Texas rancher during the past year than in many years—much more than ranchers already know."

"According to DeArment's statistics, sheep and goats proved only 13% of the diet of the coyote.

"Our men and other government trappers working in Texas had over 30,000 coyotes last year alone. Since 1941, when the study was made, Texas government trappers have killed 378,071 coyotes in this state. Would you like to furnish enough sheep and goats to make up 13% of the diet of that third million coyotes?

"As to the large number of white and rats found in the coyote stomachs, these are picked up by the coyote as carrion, and killed by speeding automobiles, but sheep and goats are seldom 'road-killed'. It is hard to talk about balancing species against the other, who balances your bank account when the coyote kills your calves, turkeys and chickens by controlling his coyotes.

"We do our best, and we certainly know that we are helping make Texas a more profitable place to raise livestock and wildlife. We feel that the government hunter is a far better friend of the rancher than is the coyote, despite the opinions of a few armchair biologists."

Records of the federal service show that this year just past was an exceptionally bad one for coyotes killing calves. Rancher Vance Campbell of Motley County is just one of many who have lost high priced calves to coyotes.

"The state of Oklahoma keeps complete records on such matters, and reports that in the year ending June 30, a total of 308 calves valued at \$25,305.00 were killed by coyotes in that state. In March alone, in Oklahoma, 68 calves were killed. The situation in Texas may be equally as bad, although no state-wide records have been kept. The Cattleman Magazine has repeatedly published eyewitness accounts of calves killed by predators in the past six months, so the real ranchers know the score.

"The president of the Texas Cattleman's Association, Dolph Briscoe of Dimmit County well knows the value of predator control. He maintains one full time government trapper on his holdings at his own expense. That one trapper has removed approximately 200 coyotes per month from the Briscoe ranch. It is doubtful that Briscoe would have marketed a fine crop of goats and mohair without the control of that many coyotes. There are many ranchers in North Texas who know that coyote control is a must.

"As to the old argument that coyotes might control rodents, the jackrabbits and the cotton rats increased and multiplied and then died down in numbers in all counties of Texas—where the coyote was controlled and where he was left alone to increase and multiply—in exactly the same ratio. It is possible that a large number of rodents might encourage Momma Coyote to raise a bigger family, but we have no concrete evidence that the coyote ever eats enough of any one rodent species to keep up with the rodents reproduction.

"Our job," says Pope, "is to help the rancher live in harmony with his wildlife neighbors. If the coyote is numerous enough to cause extensive damage to flocks of sheep and goats, or numerous enough to pull down calves—then it is my job to protect the ranchman's interest by controlling his coyotes."
