

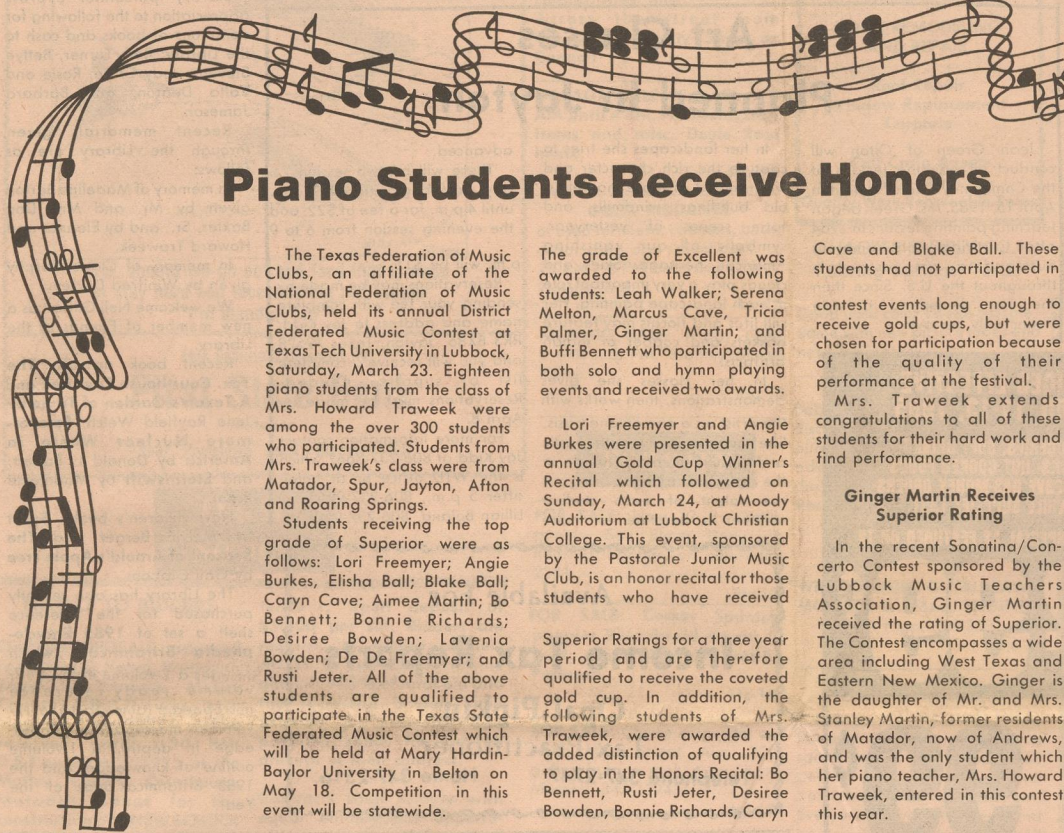

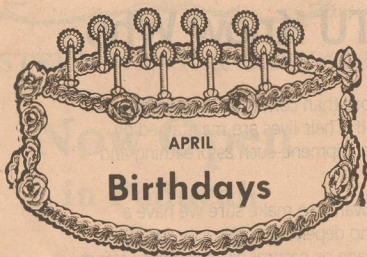

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M.C. Reaps Benefits From Regional EMS

During the past several years, this region has benefited from a special grant program which has made possible dramatic improvements in emergency medical care on the South Plains. This grant was obtained and administered by South Plains Emergency Medical Services, Inc. (SPEMS), a non-profit regional corporation formed in 1977 to help ambulance services upgrade their level of care and to organize regional hospitals and EMS services into a cooperative network.

Much of the current attention to the improvement of emergency medical care in the US can be traced to the report, **Accidental Death and Disability: The Neglected Disease of Modern Society**, published by a committee of the National Academy of Sciences in 1966. It identified trauma as the leading cause of death among persons under age 45; heart attack is the Number 1 killer for older persons. Returning Vietnam vets added further impetus as they sought to apply the successful combination of field treatment and rapid evacuation to a hospital to accident victims here in the US.

As a field of medicine, EMS barely existed 10 years ago. For many areas of the South Plains, it barely existed 5 years ago. In the mid 1970's, the improvement of emergency medical care was named as one of the top health care priorities for this region by

South Plains Health Systems, the regional health planning agency. As a result, South Plains EMS was organized in 1977 by interested persons who recognized that the kind of care available here was not keeping pace with the advances which were becoming available elsewhere as a result of better techniques and sophisticated technology. Initial grant funding to support this project was obtained in 1979. All South Plains counties and communities were contacted and encouraged to participate in the development of the regional EMS system. A combination of grant funds and local matching funds made possible:

1. a regionwide 24 hour EMS radio communication system putting ambulance personnel at the scene in direct contact with their local hospital or with one of the three major hospitals in Lubbock for consultation with a physician about treatment for the patient.

2. the establishment of an EMS training program which has trained nearly 1000 persons, mostly rural volunteers, in life saving skills. As a result of this widespread training, almost all South Plains communities meet or exceed the recently upgraded ambulance staffing requirements demanded by state law.

3. the purchase of many thousands of dollars in patient care equipment for ambulances. It is this sophisticated portable

equipment which in effect brings the emergency room to the patient, preventing needless deaths by immediately correcting treatable problems.

4. an active regional EMS organization which meets regularly to set policy and establish standards of care. Input is received from physicians, nurses, EMTs, hospital administrators and elected officials in order to encourage and assist every EMS service to attain and maintain a high quality of care.

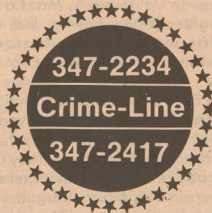
The result of this investment is a good Basic Life Support system in this region. Motley County has been an active participant in upgrading its services and helping to develop the regional system. As a result of its involvement with SPEMS, a radio paging network was installed, enabling EMTs to be dispatched to the scene of the problem more quickly.

The Motley County ambulance is equipped with an EMS radio which allow the EMTs on board to communicate directly with their hospital destination. In addition, several items of patient care equipment were bought for the ambulance. All this was done using less than \$1900 of the county's funds.

A number of EMS training programs, sponsored jointly by Motley County EMS and SPEMS, were held for the benefit of local EMTs. The county today is proof of what a small county with a limited tax base can do to bring a vital life-saving service to its citizens for a very small monetary investment by cooperating with other communities that want to make similar progress.

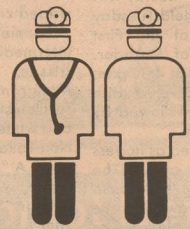
