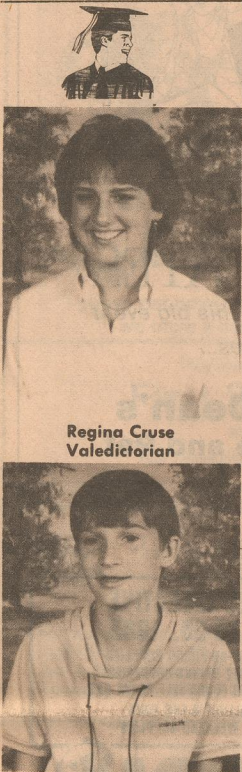

Tippin Instructor At ACLS Course

St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock was the scene of an Advanced Cardiac Life Support Course this past Saturday and Sunday.

Roy Tippin, R.N., F.N.P., Director of Motley County Clinic, was among the instructors teaching both nurses and physicians from St. Mary's and other outlying cities.

Tippin's area of instruction included drug therapy for the cardiac arrest victim and testing the participants on their abilities to correctly interpret an EKG (electrocardiogram) and initiate the proper drug therapy.

Approximately 34 nurses and/or physicians attended this study which was sponsored by St. Mary's, Lubbock County Emergency Room Nurses Association and the American Heart Association.

New Business In Matador

Officials of Ancira Casket Co. have announced that a major distribution point for west Texas, eastern New Mexico and southwestern Oklahoma will be opened in Matador. Mr. Paul Gray, at Seigler-Mynatt Funeral Home, will also be the manager of Ancira's Matador office.

Ancira is an importer of steel caskets made in Monterrey, Mexico and Mr. Gray states that, "To our company's knowledge, we are the only ones in the United States importing Mexican-made caskets for major distribution in the southwest."

Gray said that initially the caskets will be warehoused in buildings owned by the funeral home but, because Ancira has

successfully negotiated with Belmont Company of Crane, Missouri to be its distributor for the state of Texas, larger warehousing facilities may be needed.

A major portion of Ancira is owned by Roy L. Ward and Co., Inc., who is a partner in Seigler-Mynatt Funeral Home. Ward and Co. are the owners and operators of several Texas funeral homes and have their general offices in Lubbock.

Gray said that "Matador was chosen as our West Texas distribution point because of its central location within the territory. Ancira is pleased to bring a new business to Matador and we look forward to a long relationship."

Lest We Ever Dare Forget

(Editor's Note: The following is a reprint of an editorial which appeared in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, Monday, May 30, 1977)

Today America hears the verse for "Taps":
"Day is done - Gone the sun -
Goeth Day - Cometh night.
"And a star - Leadeth all -
Speedeth all - To their rest."
Today we pray that the rolls of our war dead will not grow longer. For theirs is the democracy of the dead.

The Sad Dust of our heroic fallen is sacred, deep among the never-to-be-forgotten on this Memorial Day. Or any day.
They fell in Europe and on the islands of the South Pacific, on the bleak high ridges of Korea and in the sodden paddy fields of Vietnam.

Aboard the sunken Battleship "Arizona" a tablet listing Pearl Harbor casualties reads:
"May God make His face to shine on them in lasting peace."
Loving hands have brought them home from many lands, across many seas, our young soldiers dying. Today we wonder if they hear, for eternity, our hail and farewell.

If only we could erase the memory of war. It is the fact of death and suffering that carries the meaning of war. Everything else seems so far away.
Death, twisted lives, the torture of blindness and/or cruel wounds that tear men to pieces. These are the realities of war. And only these.

How much death and agony there is that man can cause; how little he is able to cure.
America is not made strong by her factories, railways, highways and libraries. Her real strength is her inner spirit. A nation can be well armed but it cannot be stronger than its beliefs. And

those beliefs cannot be fabricated to suit a moment, a policy or a person.

"Courage is a virtue because it combines with most other virtues in any man or nation," wrote Winston Churchill. But courage also is a private thing. Perhaps it can be defined as doing what conscience dictates, but doing it because - no matter how hard, painful or dangerous - you believe it is right.

May America's search for peace remain everlasting. Humanity cries out for peace. This is the cry of decency and hope that comes as one voice from the deepest heart and soul of our nation.

War is not a triumphant thing. It is cold and cunning death that triumphs in war, takes each man suddenly as his eyes grow cloudy and his chin drops. Or as he strains against a harness and his arms quiver, alone in the sky.
One man, lest we forget. Lest we forget.

One man. He is lost to everyone who loved him, and to the world - a world he might have lived to change.

He will never see morning again, feel the warmth and vigor and companionship of a wife, write a note or sing a song, or come home.

Death takes a man standing within inches of other men who are saved. No one knows why. Not even the fortunate ones who do come home to the arms of those they love.

How difficult it is to see any pattern in life when one can see no selection in death. It is especially hard when death has come and that it is, as the British say:
"Goodnight, forever."

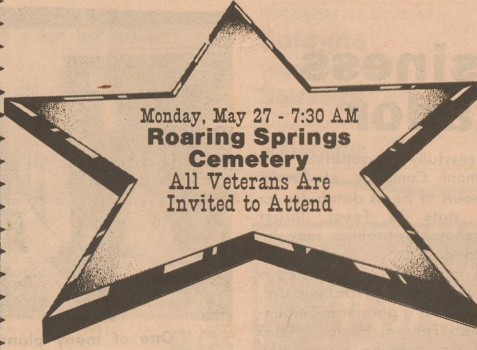
Through observation and experience the older men had an insight into the situation which

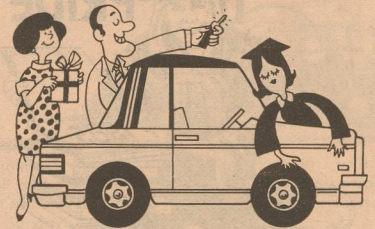

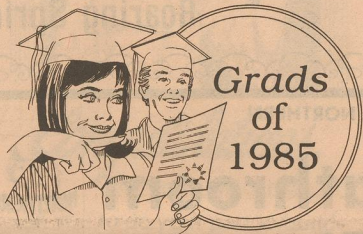

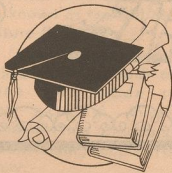

1841, "Death Watch on the Quintufue," when the expedition, starving and under attack by Kiowas, was camped at Camp Resolution near Quitaque. A silver tray, engraved with past winners' names and with her name added, was presented to Mrs. Potts during the awards ceremonies.

Winning first place with their entry in the scrapbook category were committee members, Mrs. Furman Vinson, chairman, of Flomot, Mrs. Gene Harris of Plainview, Mrs. William E. Moore of Lubbock, and Mrs. Douglas Blackburn of Hobbs. The members used the numerous clippings, photographs, and memorabilia of the club's activities from the last two years to make an outstanding scrapbook. The newspaper-sized scrapbook was covered with a quilted and monogrammed cover.

Competing on a state-wide basis against all DRT chapters including some larger and more active, the local chapter was proud to be recognized for being second in the amount of publicity turned in, amounting to almost 1,800 inches. Many area newspapers, but especially THE MATADOR TRIBUNE, helped the chapter win this award by printing information about the club's activities including Teacher Appreciation Work-

Pecan growers in Motley County as well as homeowners with backyard trees need to be on the lookout for casebearers--those perennial pests that can completely destroy a pecan crop if not controlled.

Based on various prediction models as well as trappings and scouting reports, casebearers should be showing up on pecan trees in Motley County on about May 24.

Normally, casebearers damage nuts within a two-week period--starting the first week of May in southern and coastal areas and the first week of June in northern and western sections of the state.

The origin of the celebration is unknown but could go back to the Toltec or Mayan ceremony in which maidens were honored as potential mothers of warriors. However, the probable origin is a Spanish custom to present the daughter to society and signify that she is ready to begin dating.

For Americans of Mexican descent, friends and relatives are involved by being "padrinos" (godparents or sponsors). They contribute the money which pays for the dress, cake, photo album, knife set, parasol, photographers and the dance hall.

There is also religious significance as the Catholic Church considers a girl's "quince" as a reaffirmation of her religious vows. There is a special mass where ring, crown and medallion are blessed. The medallion represents a protector from the person shown on the medallion.

In this area, the medallion usually represents Our Lady of Guadalupe.

After the ceremony, the dance is begun by some practiced, choreographed steps. Then the guest of honor has the first dance with her escort or father.

To time spray applications for casebearer control, first check for eggs on a daily basis. Eggs are usually found on the tips of nutlets and are about the size of the ball in a ball-point pen. The

eggs are white when first laid, then turn red over a three-to-five day period before turning white again after hatching.

Apply an insecticide the third day after the first eggs hatch to kill the larvae before they enter the nutlets. Since the larvae will hatch over a week-long period or more, a second spraying may be necessary.

Insecticides recommended for casebearer control include diazinon, Pydrin, malathion and Zolone.
